



Dinner Church - April 2, 2026 - 5:30pm

For Maundy Thursday, liturgical time aligns with biblical time. Day turns to night for us and for Jesus and the disciples. Our bodies need food at dinnertime, like theirs; our tired feet need care, like theirs; our wavering hearts need courage, like theirs. As needs and timelines align, it is the perfect opportunity for congregations to worship in a way like Jesus and the disciples did at the Last Supper: with dinner church.

The dinner church framework we are using offers the opportunity to have a richly embodied Maundy Thursday experience. The centerpiece of the liturgy is a shared meal, with the celebration of the eucharist taking place on the same evening. Although the intent of this dinner church liturgy is to help you experience the sensory and emotional contours of Jesus' final night, it is not to reenact the Last Supper. Instead, the timeline of worship moves in step with scripture as the evening deepens.

At all times, and especially during Holy Week, God is all in for us: God's heart, body, and spirit fully committed. God is all in for our whole selves: the parts that get sore at the end of a long day; the parts that need nutrition and nourishment; the parts that need the inspiration of the Spirit. Maundy Thursday traditions, scripture, and the celebration of the eucharist combine in this all-in experience.



Dinner Church History, A Whole Meal

The first eucharist was a whole meal. Gospel accounts of the Last Supper tell of Jesus offering bread and wine to his disciples with an accompanying blessing and a reminder that they are part of his own body, broken and shared. But the meal, which took place on the first night of Passover (in Matthew, Mark, and Luke) or on the eve of Passover (in John), was more than bread and wine. There was extended conversation with tough questions and unsettling answers as the disciples wrestled with the implications of Judas' betrayal. There was prayer and music. And there was food: enough for Jesus and the disciples to eat and be satisfied.

In 1 Corinthians 11, Paul's admonitions offer a window on the eucharistic practices of the church in Corinth. Like many Christian communities ancient and modern, the Corinthian Christians aspired to be a community that crossed lines of economics and class, but they struggled with the reality. Paul noted that when they gathered, "one goes hungry and another becomes drunk" (1 Corinthians 11:21). He issued a corrective: "So then, my [siblings], when you come together to eat, wait for one another. If you are hungry, eat at home, so that when you come together, it will not be for your condemnation" (11:33-34). If the wealthy, who had plenty of food at home, kept coming hungry to the table and leaving full, the poor would not get enough to eat. It appears that the eucharistic meal practiced by the community in Corinth was intended to feed bodies, not just minds and spirits. First Corinthians reflects a communion meal of meaningful nutrition. Ideally, the Corinthians' eucharist would bring their community closer to the justice envisioned by Jesus: a world in which rich and poor sat beside one another and were satisfied.

The *Didache*, a teaching document compiled in the first century, also assumes that the eucharist takes place in the context of a real, full meal. Scholars are not in full agreement whether the entire meal was considered to be the eucharist or whether the sacrament only pertained to its opening and closing eucharistic prayers. However, in the *Didache's* telling, this meal was also meant to be nourishing. The writer instructs the leader to pray a prayer of thanksgiving following the meal with the words, "When you have had your fill..." (*Didache* 10.1). Real physical hunger was meant to be satisfied.^[1]

Bread and wine were always the meal's central substances, and over the centuries, eucharistic practices shifted away from full meals and toward consumption of smaller portions of the elements. Still, some Christian traditions preserved or recovered the custom of eating a heartier meal in the context of liturgy. When the Moravian church was renewed in the eighteenth century, its leaders looked to first-century eucharistic meals as they created the tradition of the lovefeast. In a Moravian lovefeast, hymns are sung and simple foods, such as coffee and buns, are served to the congregation. Moravians do not equate the lovefeast with the eucharist, and the lovefeast is not a sacrament, but it serves an important role in cultivating a spirit of fellowship among those who gather.^[2]



The contemporary dinner church movement also recalls first-century practices. Dinner church customs vary widely between congregations and are highly contextual, attuned to the particular needs of each worshipping community. However, it is common for dinner church to include music and hymnody, scripture and preaching, and the celebration of the eucharist itself. We will incorporate some of these items into our Dinner Church!

Passover, but not a seder

The biblical accounts of the Last Supper take place during Passover or on its eve, but the meal and prayers do not constitute a seder. Modern Jewish seder meals first originated during the rabbinic period following the Second Temple's destruction and coalesced more clearly during the medieval period. When Jesus and his disciples gathered for a final meal, they were not observing a Passover seder as modern Jews do. Modern seder practice has a rich Jewish history all its own, and it does not belong to Christians.

The Ministry in Medical Mission received a February 2026 newsletter from Peter-Marc, the administrator at Dr. Manno's Sante' 2000 clinic. This update is now posted on the Haiti bulletin board.

Update

A few key bits of information from his update: At the time that Peter-Marc wrote to us they were seeing about 30 people per day. A number of those patients are diabetics. They have expanded the clinic to include 10 beds, which allows them to keep patients over night when that makes sense. They saw more than 150 diabetics in those first two months or 2026. They had 57 patients that utilized those 10 beds.

Haiti

The solar systems that your donations helped to support a few years ago have allowed them to have a stable power supply during these difficult times in Haiti that allows them to now function 24/7. Thank you again for that support.

The posted newsletter also introduces us to a couple of their patients that are being helped through the Agape Fund which helps the many who cannot pay for their care. Congregation Council Minutes 03/17/2026

1. Welcome and Sharing of Highs and Lows: Members shared as they desired.

2. Devotion and Opening Prayer: Palanca – Centered on The Lord’s Prayer and its meaning.

3. Approval of February 17, 2026 Meeting Minutes: The meeting minutes were approved via email.

4. Treasurer’s Report/ Financials

- 1. Deb provided the following information: for February income was \$24,871 compared to our budget of \$21,813 (\$3,058 above plan) and expenses were \$20,871 compared to our budget of \$21,317 (\$446 under plan) for a net gain of \$3,504. Year-to-date 2026 is \$3,357 ahead of plan.

5. Pastor’s Report

- No report since Pastor Luke is not available due to his Father’s death. The officers related that Pastor Luke attended the CAT meeting via Zoom long enough to express appreciation for the prayers for his family and the support through church leadership stepping up to do the tasks which need to be done in his absence.

6. Team Leader Reports

- Christian Education:** Sunday School is going well averaging 6-8 children. No Sunday School on March 29 or April 5. First Communion class was on 3-15 with 5 students and 3 parents in attendance. One additional student wasn’t able to make it but will make up on own time. Sherri Waller helped with teaching about the Sacristy Room and how communion is prepared. We will host bread baking on Wed 4-1 at 6pm for these families and any youth/confirmation students that want to participate with First Communion for these children will be on Maundy Thursday. 20 kids are registered so far for preschool thru 4th grade VBS on 6-22 to 6-25 from 8:30 a.m. – 12:30 p.m.
- Church Properties:** The van is due back this week. If anyone would like to be a certified driver, contact Marty. The exit signs need to be illuminated, and fire extinguisher annual inspections done.
- Palanca Deacons:** Nothing new to report.
- Welcome:** Our 3rd annual Spirited Sunday gathering, will be on Sunday, April 19th from 3 – 5 p.m. at the River Inn with music by Crimsen Tied. More team members are needed for this year.
- Fellowship:** The menu plan is finalized for the Dinner Church service on Maundy Thursday. There is no charge for the meal, however, to get an approximate number for the caterer, those planning to attend will be asked to sign up in the Narthex. On Easter Sunday, coffee and refreshments will be available in the Fellowship Hall from 9 - 11. Volunteers are needed to donate refreshments; a sign-up sheet will be posted in the Narthex. Sunday coffee in the Narthex will continue, with donation of treats always welcome!
- NHCP:** No report
- Stewardship Team:** The Team would like to add 2 – 4 new members. Fresh ideas on how to approach stewardship at OSLC are needed. Thanks to all the volunteers who helped to shovel and deice the walks this winter season.
- Worship, Arts & Music:** Music teams continue to work through Lent and prepare for Easter Sunday. New wireless microphone adapters have been acquired for the Praise and Worship team and will be installed during Holy Week for Easter. The annual organ tuning will be on 3-26 and 27.
- Youth Ministry:** Middle School Youth Group continues to grow, we’ve had up to 24 kids. Spring sports will begin soon, so numbers will decline. We will lose 7 kids at the end of the year as they move to HS. They want to come back as a senior high youth group to continue with this ministry! The 3-11 Lenten service "All in for Wonder" was led by the youth. Confirmation students read prayers and scripture. Middle School Youth presented an iMovie in which they were recorded asking "I wonder..." statements. Six middle school students were available afterward for discussions. We were successful in finding more people to help with donating desserts or food, assisting with MSYG and we collected over \$100 to help pay for materials, activities and food. Our Team "wondered" what the middle school kids would like to see in the future. The majority of students would like to see something continue for them in HS and thought Wednesdays were a good day for it, share food with the Middle School group and move to different places within the church after that. Other ideas and options were shared! Our youth had presentations on Antarctica by Mary Krohn and Pastor Luke brought his therapy dog, Nemo. Nemo's trainer, Jennifer, shared how she trains dogs. Assisting Jennifer may be a future service project for our group. Youth Group will not meet on 3-25 or 4-1 students are on spring break.

- Community of Hope: serving coffee and refreshments in the Fellowship Hall from 9:00-11:00.
- Rental Space: Nothing new to report.
- NHCP Steering Committee: A grant has been discussed for converting the space to a day care.
- Establishing Core Values for Mission: On hold until after Easter. Agreed to move this to the action items list.
- Lutefisk dinner 2026 planning: The information run in the March Messenger will be run again in April. No one has come forward to commit as facilitators. Thoughts on other things to try? Suggested by CC—a joint dinner with Zion or if anyone knows of a potential facilitator (3 – 4 needed) contact Bob and he will have the one on one discussion.
- Zoom at Congregation Meetings: quorum and voting: Section 10.08 of our Constitution is the language pertinent to this topic. The officers recommended that we have Zoom access for all Congregation meetings with the provisions that
 - A devoted AV person is at the meeting to assure viable two way communications so as to not hinder discussion or voting.
 - The meeting leader is to confirm all those physically present at the meeting use a microphone for discussion and questions. If that is not possible, the leader must repeat the discussion and questions so those attending the meeting virtually have access to the information.
 - Those voting members who connect via Zoom are to be counted as part of the quorum and can vote.
 - The CC agreed.

8. New Business

- Painting Narthex paneling: a small group of people have expressed interest in seeing the Narthex paneling painted and trim installed similarly to what was done in Fireside Room. Andy Elias looked at the job with a painting contractor and the cost was estimated at \$3,000. Connor will explore formation of a sub-committee.
- Our Savior's Handyman Group: Pastor Luke requested this ministry group be formed. We met in February and March. Bob is the Facilitator and Duane Buytaert has agreed to be the Work Coordinator. There are three volunteers who have agreed to get involved with completing work projects. Need more work project volunteers—any suggestions?
