

A. That I am not my own, but belong—body and soul, in life and in death—to my faithful Savior, Jesus Christ.



Featured Element of Worship: The Lord's Prayer

Why do we pray the Lord's Prayer each week? If we are not careful, it certainly can lead to mindless repetition in what seems to be nothing more than a traditional ritual. But we do not pray it each week simply because it is a tradition. The Lord's Prayer gives us the perfect pattern of how to pray, and, when prayed from the heart, it guides us into the type of communication with God that he desires. While it does include petition ("Give us this day our daily bread."), this is not the Prayer's primary focus, as so often can become the case with our prayers. Rather, the glorification of God and the proclamation of his glory take center stage, with the goal being that our hearts' affections would be shaped and redirected into a God-centered and God-exalting posture. Beyond this, note that all the first person pronouns are plural ("our" and "us" and "we"), not singular ("my" and "me" and "I"). This reminds us that we stand before God not simply as individuals, but as members of a community and fellow-citizens of his kingdom, joined together by our common union with Christ. Each time we pray the Lord's Prayer, may we remember where we stand in relationship to God and to one another!

Meditation for the Week

(At Lazarus's tomb), Jesus wept. He did not use the concept of Romans 8:28 as a club, telling Mary and Martha, "All things work together for good so you should really look for the silver lining here. It's actually a good thing your brother is dead." He didn't treat their loss as anything other than what it was—a loss that triggered the tears of God.


But Jesus did not weep as those who have no hope. He told Martha, "I am the resurrection and the life. He who believes in me will live, even though he dies; and whoever lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" (John 11:25-26).

You may shiver as you walk through the shadows of death, but the shadow itself is cast by the bright light of the resurrection. "Weeping may remain for a night, but rejoicing comes in the morning" (Psalm 30:5). One morning you will rise, and every tear will be wiped away from your eyes (Revelation 21:4). So go ahead and weep, but only as one who knows how your story ends. It doesn't.
