Featured Element of Worship: Green Paraments

You may have noticed that in addition to the Christmas decorations no longer adorning our sanctuary, the paraments on the pulpit, lectern and communion table have changed from the white that we had during Christmas and Epiphany to the green that we currently see. We use various liturgical colors to point us to different acts in the life of Christ and to remind us of different seasons in the life of the Church. Green is used during what is called "Ordinary Time" and, as a result, it is the most commonly used color in the liturgical calendar. The color green signifies growth, and this current season traditionally continues the theme established on the day of Epiphany, namely that Jesus is not just King of the Jews, but is King of kings and Lord of lords, the Sovereign of all creation. The people of God therefore are to take the message of the Gospel to all the world, rejoicing that Christ Jesus as the Lamb of God has "ransomed people for God from every tribe and language and people and nation, and (has) made them a kingdom and priests to our God." (Revelation 5:9-10, ESV)



Meditation for the Week
