Unison Scripture Reading...Exodus 13:11-16

¹¹ "When the Lord brings you into the land of the Canaanites, as he swore to you and your fathers, and shall give it to you, 12 you shall set apart to the Lord all that first opens the womb. All the firstborn of your animals that are males shall be the Lord's. 13 Every firstborn of a donkey you shall redeem with a lamb, or if you will not redeem it you shall break its neck. Every firstborn of man among your sons you shall redeem. ¹⁴ And when in time to come your son asks you, 'What does this mean?' you shall say to him, 'By a strong hand the Lord brought us out of Egypt, from the house of slavery. 15 For when Pharaoh stubbornly refused to let us go, the Lord killed all the firstborn in the land of Egypt, both the firstborn of man and the firstborn of animals. Therefore I sacrifice to the Lord all the males that first open the womb, but all the firstborn of my sons I redeem.' 16 It shall be as a mark on your hand or frontlets between your eyes, for by a strong hand the Lord brought us out of Egypt."

Luke 2:21-38

²¹ And at the end of eight days, when he was circumcised, he was called Jesus, the name given by the angel before he was conceived in the womb.

²² And when the time came for their purification according to the Law of Moses, they brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord ²³ (as it is written in the Law of the Lord, "Every male who first opens the womb shall be called holy to the Lord") ²⁴ and to offer a sacrifice according to what is said in the Law of the Lord, "a pair of turtledoves, or two young pigeons." ²⁵ Now there was a man in Jerusalem, whose name was Simeon, and this man was righteous and devout, waiting for the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit was upon him. ²⁶ And it had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Christ. ²⁷ And he came in the Spirit into the temple, and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him according to the custom of the Law, ²⁸ he took him up in his arms and blessed God and said,

- ²⁹ "Lord, now you are letting your servant depart in peace, according to your word;
- ³⁰ for my eyes have seen your salvation
- that you have prepared in the presence of all peoples,
- ³² a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and for glory to your people Israel."

³³ And his father and his mother marveled at what was said about him. ³⁴ And Simeon blessed them and said to Mary his mother, "Behold, this child is appointed for the fall and rising of many in Israel, and for a sign that is opposed ³⁵ (and a sword will pierce through your own soul also), so that thoughts from many hearts may be revealed."

³⁶ And there was a prophetess, Anna, the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was advanced in years, having lived with her husband seven years from when she was a virgin, ³⁷ and then as a widow until she was eighty-four. She did not depart from the temple, worshiping with fasting and prayer night and day. ³⁸ And coming up at that very hour she began to give thanks to God and to speak of him to all who were waiting for the redemption of Jerusalem.

Meditation for the Week

Now that the devil, the world's tyrant, has been slain, we don't come to an earthly feast, my beloved friends. We come here to an eternal and heavenly feast. We don't celebrate a mere shadow; we come to a feast of truth. In the Old Testament Passover feast, they ate the flesh of a dumb sheep, anointed their door-posts with its blood, and pled for God's help against the destroying angel. But now we eat the very Word of the Father; the doorposts of our hearts are sealed with the blood of the New Covenant, and we celebrate the grace the Saviour has given us, when He said, "Behold, I have given you authority to tread on serpents and scorpions, and over all the power of the enemy" (Luke 10:19). Death no longer reigns; it has been displaced by life, since our Lord said, "I am the Life" (John 14:6). Everything therefore now overflows with joy and delight, as Scripture says, "The Lord reigns, let the earth rejoice!" (Psalm 97:1). When death still reigned, "sitting down by the rivers of Babylon, we wept" (Psalm 137:1). We lamented, feeling the bitterness of our bondage. But now that death and the devil's kingdom have been overthrown, everything richly overflows with joy and delight! Now God is known, not only in Judea, but throughout all the world: "their voice has gone forth, and the knowledge of Him has filled all the earth" (Psalm 19:4, Habakuk 2:14).

The consequence of all this, my beloved friends, is plain: we must come to such a feast as this, not with dirty garments, but having dressed our minds with holy clothing. In order to do this, we need to clothe ourselves with our Lord Jesus; and then we'll be able to celebrate the feast with Him.
