### Featured Elements of Worship: Repeated Elements and Advent Hymns

You may have noticed that our Introit and Unison Scripture Reading are the same this week as last week. Though we sometimes have typos in the bulletin, this is not such a case! Throughout the season of Advent, we are using these particular elements every week. *Christ Be Our Light* pairs perfectly with the lighting of the candles on the Advent wreath, and Romans 5:1-5 is a passage that touches on all four themes of Advent: Hope, Peace, Joy & Love. The goal is that in using these elements four straight weeks, might add to the growing anticipation of Christmas that Advent encourages.

And what about Christmas carols? Why don't we sing more of them during Advent? Well, it certainly can be tempting to skip right over Advent and immediately begin singing our favorite Christmas carols. After all, there are so many songs to sing and only a short season to sing them. (Why don't we sing Christmas carols at other times of the year? Good question!) Have patience. For just a few short weeks, we are going to postpone the full use of carols so that we can sing songs about longing, wishing, looking and waiting for Jesus. Stay tuned though...Christmas is coming!

## **Meditation for the Week**

As the great writing prophets of the Bible knew, sin has 1,000 faces. The prophets knew how many ways human life can go wrong because they knew how many ways human life can go right. You need the concept of a wall on plumb to tell when one is off. These prophets kept dreaming of a time when God would put things right again.

They dreamed of a new age in which human crookedness would be straightened out, rough places made plain, the foolish would be made wise, and the wise humble. They dreamed of a time when the deserts would flower, the mountains would run with wine, weeping would cease, and people could go to sleep without weapons on their laps. People would work in peace and work to fruitful effect. Lambs could lie down with lions. All nature would be fruitful, benign, and filled with wonder upon wonder. All humans would be knit together in brotherhood and sisterhood. And all nature and all humans would look to God, walk with God, lean toward God, and delight in God. Shouts of joy and recognition would well-up from valleys and seas, from women in streets, and from men on ships.

This webbing together of God, humans, and all creation in justice, fulfillment, and delight is what the Hebrew prophets call shalom. We call it peace. But it means far more than mere peace of mind or a cease-fire between enemies. In the Bible, "shalom" means universal flourishing, wholeness, and delight, a rich state of affairs in which natural needs are satisfied, and natural gifts fruitfully employed, a state of affairs that inspires joyful wonder as its Creator and Savior opens doors and welcomes the creatures in whom He delights. Shalom, in other words, is the way things ought to be.
