



Unison Scripture Reading....1 Corinthians 15:20-28

Our intended dominioin, failed by Adam, fulfilled in Christ ²⁰ But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep. ²¹ For as by a man came death, by a man has come also the resurrection of the dead. ²² For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ shall all be made alive. ²³ But each in his own order: Christ the firstfruits, then at his coming those who belong to Christ. ²⁴ Then comes the end, when he delivers the kingdom to God the Father after destroying every rule and every authority and power. ²⁵ For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet. ²⁶ The last enemy to be destroyed is death. ²⁷ For "God has put all things in subjection under his feet." 



Communion at Calvary

If you are our guest in worship today, we welcome you both to Calvary and to the Lord's Table. Our celebration of the Lord's Supper is <u>open to all</u> who have trusted in Christ as Savior and follow Him as Lord, that in partaking they might experience spiritual nourishment and growth in grace.

Mindful not only of Scripture's promises, but also of its cautions regarding the Lord's Supper, we generally discourage <u>children</u> from partaking of the sacrament. Regardless of age, it should be shared only by those people who understand and give ascent to the historical and personal significance of the cross of Jesus Christ.

When the bread is passed to us by the Elders, each person wishing to participate is asked to remove a piece from the tray and hold it while others are being served. Then, as a symbol of our common union with Christ as one body, we shall all partake together.

When the cups are distributed, each person wishing to participate is asked to remove a cup from the tray and, as a symbol of our individual trust in Christ, to drink on our own.

We encourage worshippers to use the time during which others are being served for the thoughtful reading of Scriptures or quiet meditation and prayer.

May God nourish our spirits as we worship Him through partaking of these elements in faith, as a sign and a seal of the covenant of grace.

Featured Element of Worship: The Nicene Creed

In the early years of the Christian church, there were some who suggested that neither Jesus nor the Holy Spirit were truly God. Several Councils, including one in Nicea (A.D. 325) and another in Constantinople (A.D. 381) were convened to discuss the intricacies of belief in a triune God. The Nicene Creed was one of the results of these councils. A keen observer will note the similarities between it and the Apostles' Creed. The similarities are due to the fact that Nicaea took the Apostles' Creed as their basic outline, expanding upon the above-mentioned doctrinal issues so that the Creed, which before was nebulous on those subjects, could be made crystal clear.

Meditation for the Week

To say that God waits on our prayers is not to make the majestic King of glory dependent on us but to recognize the glory of the wisdom of God and his unfathomable greatness.

We gain some measure of understanding by noting how God's plan and purpose unfold in time-and-space history. God works in two ways: immediately and mediately. When he acts immediately, God acts directly to do something. For example, when Jesus turned water into wine, he did so immediately, without an intermediary such as grapes or fermentation. When God acts mediately, he uses means. An illustration of this would be when he parted the Red Sea at the time of the exodus from Egypt. God did not just instantly part the sea and dry a pathway for the escape of his people. Rather, he caused a wind to blow throughout the night to separate the waters. That wind was a means, showing God's control over elements of nature to effect his purposes.

Here's where we find the place for our praters in the advancement of God's kingdom. Prayer is a means by which God enfolds us in the outworking of his eternal plan. Prayer is God's means for God's ends. God executes his plan and accomplishes his purposes through the mediation of our prayers as his people. Prayer is intended by God to engage us in the accomplishment of his purposes for his own glory and goals.

We can say that in praying we can expect God to do something he would not have done had we not prayed, not to limit God but to exalt the glory of his unfathomable providence that governs all causes, mediate and immediate. In other words, to suggest God waits on our prayers does not make God smaller. It makes him bigger than we could ever possibly fathom. Who is like God, governing means and ends, including the acts and prayers of his creatures, without violating their free agency and still maintaining their responsibility and culpability?

We can take it even a step further: God's sovereign plan not only does not invalidate responsible action, it *establishes* it because that is the way God has designed things. Our prayers are not intruders on God's plan but instruments in that plan.
