Featured Element of Worship: Liturgical Pattern

Have you ever wondered why Calvary's worship service follows the liturgical pattern it does? It is not random, and it's not just a matter of "That's the way we've always done it." The very intentional pattern is as follows:

- · First we have Announcements. Having taken care of this "business of the church," we begin with an Introit that settles us and prepares our hearts to worship with one another, followed by a Scriptural Call to Worship, which ushers us into the very presence of God Almighty.
- Our Opening Hymn then is generally one that proclaims the glory and goodness and holiness of God.
- In light of his holiness in particular, at least one thing should be evidently apparent to us: We are not holy as God is holy, as he has called us to be. This should drive us to repentance, and that is why our next element is our Confession of Sin, both corporately and individually.
- · Having confessed our sin, what we desperately need is a reminder that though we are sinful, our sin need not define us. In Christ Jesus, forgiveness is ours, so the pastor offers this Assurance of Forgiveness from Scripture.
- · In light of this forgiveness, we respond with either the Doxology or the Gloria Patri, songs of praise and thanksgiving that have been part of the worship of the people of God for many centuries.
- The remaining elements lead up to the Sermon, where we open God's Word, and listen to God's voice, so that we might be shaped by the gospel.
- · We respond to the sermon with another hymn, worshiping the God from whom we've just heard, followed by a Benediction (a Scriptural blessing from God). As we leave, we do so with a Parting Hymn that reminds us that though we are leaving, we do so as members of one Body, with a Spirit that joins us together until we return for corporate worship once more.





Sermon Text...Ephesians 4:1-16

¹I therefore, a prisoner for the Lord, urge you to walk in a manner worthy of the calling to which you have been called, ² with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another in love, ³ eager to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. ⁴ There is one body and one Spirit—just as you were called to the one hope that belongs to your call— ⁵ one Lord, one faith, one baptism, ⁶ one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all. ⁷ But grace was given to each one of us according to the measure of Christ's gift. ⁸ Therefore it says,

"When he ascended on high he led a host of captives, and he gave gifts to men."

⁹ (In saying, "He ascended," what does it mean but that he had also descended into the lower regions, the earth? ¹⁰ He who descended is the one who also ascended far above all the heavens, that he might fill all things.) ¹¹ And he gave the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, the shepherds and teachers, ¹² to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, ¹³ until we all attain to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to mature manhood, to the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ, ¹⁴ so that we may no longer be children, tossed to and fro by the waves and carried about by every wind of doctrine, by human cunning, by craftiness in deceitful schemes. ¹⁵ Rather, speaking the truth in love, we are to grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ, ¹⁶ from whom the whole body, joined and held together by every joint with which it is equipped, when each part is working properly, makes the body grow so that it builds itself up in love.

Meditation for the Week

Meanwhile, the cross comes before the crown and tomorrow is a Monday morning. A cleft has opened in the pitiless walls of the world, and we are invited to follow our great Captain inside. The following Him is, of course, the essential point. That being so, it may be asked what practical use there is in the speculations which I have been indulging. I can think of at least one such use. It may be possible for each to think too much of his own potential glory hereafter; it is hardly possible for him to think too often or too deeply about that of his neighbor. The load, or weight, or burden of my neighbor's glory should be laid daily on my back, a load so heavy that only humility can carry it, and the backs of the proud will be broken. It is a serious thing to live in a society of possible gods and goddesses, to remember that the dullest and most uninteresting person you talk to may one day be a creature which, if you saw it now, you would be strongly tempted to worship, or else a horror and a corruption such as you now meet, if at all, only in a nightmare. All day long we are, in some degree, helping each other to one or other of these destinations. It is in the light of these overwhelming possibilities, it is with the awe and circumspection proper to them, that we should conduct all our dealings with one another, all friendships, all loves, all play, all politics. There are no ordinary people. You have never talked to a mere mortal. Nations, cultures, arts, civilization—these are mortal, and their life is to ours as the life of a gnat. But it is immortals whom we joke with, work with, marry, snub, and exploit—immortal horrors or everlasting splendors. This does not mean that we are to be perpetually solemn. We must play. But our merriment must be of that kind (and it is, in fact, the merriest kind) which exists between people who have, from the outset, taken each other seriously—no flippancy, no superiority, no presumption. And our charity must be real and costly love, with deep feeling for the sins in spite of which we love the sinner—no mere tolerance or indulgence which parodies love as flippancy parodies merriment. Next to the Blessed Sacrament itself, your neighbor is the holiest object presented to your senses.
