Featured Element of Worship: Purple Paraments

You may have noticed that after having been green for a season, the paraments on the pulpit, lectern and communion table are once more purple today, signifying the season of Lent. This season in the church calendar is one of introspection and repentance, as we move toward Holy Week. The 40 days of Lent (the days between Ash Wednesday and Easter, excluding all Sundays) parallel the 40 days Jesus spent fasting in the wilderness, during which he withstood the temptations of Satan.

Traditionally, some Christians have partaken in various fasts during Lent to symbolize their repentance. What is more important than anything we could do though, is remembering what Jesus has already done. Not only did he die for our sins; he also lived a holy life on our behalf. By the grace of God, the holiness and perfection of his good works are credited to us to us when we trust in him! This Lenten season, let us consider Christ's holy perfection, our sin which sent him to the cross, and the truth of 2 Corinthians 5:21 – "For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God."



Meditation for the Week:

The threefold misery of men introduced by sin—ignorance, guilt, and tyranny and bondage by sin—required this conjunction of a threefold office. Ignorance is healed by the prophetic; guilt by the priestly; the tyranny and corruption of sin by the kingly office. Prophetic light scatters the darkness of error; the merit of the Priest takes away guilt and procures a reconciliation for us; the Power of the King removes the bondage of sin and death. The Prophet shows God to us; the Priest leads us to God; and the King joins us together and glorifies us with God. The Prophet enlightens the mind by the Spirit of illumination; the Priest by the Spirit of consolation tranquilizes the heart and conscience; the King by the Spirit of sanctification subdues rebellious affections.
