Good Friday Meditation...John 10:11-18

¹¹ I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. ¹² He who is a hired hand and not a shepherd, who does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and flees, and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. ¹³ He flees because he is a hired hand and cares nothing for the sheep. ¹⁴ I am the good shepherd. Explanation of Tenebrae Service

Tonight's Good Friday service is what is called a Tenebrae Service. *Tenebrae* is a Latin word, meaning "shadows" or "darkness." A Tenebrae Service, therefore, is one which is characterized by diminishing light. Light is a symbol of joy and life, while darkness is a symbol of mourning and death. Jesus, who is the Light of the World, came that we might have life in him, but when he was crucified, we read in Luke 23:44, "there was darkness over the whole land." So it is that throughout the service tonight, candles will be extinguished and the sanctuary will progressively become more dark as we work our way through our readings of Scripture.


It is worth noting that this is a reversal of sorts of what happens during Advent. In that season, we light a candle each week, leading up to Christmas Eve when we light the Christ Candle, signifying his birth in human flesh. Tonight, we will extinguish those very same candles one-by-one, realizing Good Friday as an "anti-Advent" of sorts. Whereas in Advent we anticipate the light of Christ breaking into a world darkened by sin, tonight we remember when that light was overcome (at least for a time) by the darkness of sin and death.

You will notice that the chancel area of our sanctuary is far more bare than usual, pointing to the fact that this is an occasion of somber penitence and reflection. Flags, flowers, paraments, and other items are absent, focusing our visual attention on the aforementioned candles, the communion elements, and the cross placed upon the communion table.

One other item you should note is that there will be a *Strepitus* marking the conclusion of our service. *Strepitus* is another Latin word, meaning "great noise," and traditionally in Tenebrae Services that noise represents either the earth quaking at the death of Jesus, or the sound of the tomb being closed. In our service tonight, that sound will be made on the timpani. At this time, some lights will come back on so that you are able to see your way out of the sanctuary. Please depart in silence, meditating upon all that Christ endured for our sake and on our behalf.
