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Sermon Topic: Cultivating A Rhythm of Generosity, for “the Least of These”

What is a “Rhythm of Generosity”? It is a patterned lifestyle of regularly investing treasures, time, and talents to meet the needs of those who are “poor”—financially, physically, mentally, or relationally. It is ideally anonymous, sometimes sacrificial, but always compassionate, and it’s modeled after Jesus’ words and actions. **In short, a *rhythm of generosity* could be defined as “living intentionally to give unselfishly”.**

Questions for reflection and discussion (perhaps with your life group):

1. In your thoughts, words, and actions, are you more likely to seek to refresh/restore the poor, or to condemn them? Is it sometimes difficult to look past the destructive decisions some might have made?
2. What can we learn from Jesus’ words and actions toward the marginalized in the gospels?
3. What treasures are you willing to examine and reallocate in order to start a rhythm of generosity?
4. What specific talents do you possess which could be used to help a person in need?
5. How might your family, or life group, or circle of friends carve time to give periodic help to an organization that ministers to the marginalized?
6. Ponder/discuss this promise: “You will be enriched in every way so that you can be generous on every occasion, and through us your generosity will result in thanksgiving to God.” - **2 Corinthians 9:1**

Follow-up Q & A with Susan Blouch, Executive Director of the Lebanon Rescue Mission:

Q: How do you balance providing immediate needs with longer-term goals for a guest?

A: “It’s not fair to say to someone, ‘All you need is Jesus.’ We strive to get people out of chaos, in a clean & safe environment. Next, we have conversations: “Tell me about...” We continue serving until clients ask, “Why do you care?” By being like Jesus for guests, trust is built...We don’t change lives; we point guests to the One who will!”

Q: What opportunities exist for volunteers who want to help with the Rescue Mission?

A: “In addition to donations of cash and goods-in-kind, volunteers are needed; for example, get on our driver’s list (insurance & vehicle are provided), and take a guest to the Driver’s Center so that he can get a driver’s license. Chat with him as you chauffeur!”

Q: What is something else that should be taken into consideration in helping the needy?

A: “Don’t be a hero in attacking homelessness; for the safety of your family, point the homeless person to organizations like LRM. And remember not to look merely outside the church walls in being a ‘hope ambassador’. The Lord calls us to take care of our families and those in the body of Christ first.”
