In November our thoughts often go to thanksgiving. Certainly our American holiday of thanksgiving is on our minds. I love thanksgiving; it is my favorite holiday. We have many things to be thankful for at Maple Springs. Sometimes we just hear numbers in terms of the budget – the dollars and cents of operating. If we stop there we can sometimes forget about the many wonderful things happening in the life of our church which we have to be thankful for.

You've likely heard the expression, the numbers don't lie. Here is a sampling of some numbers we experience at Maple Springs. At Vacation Bible School we had 75 children participate. On a typical Sunday afternoon 22 children are active in DIRT, the children's ministry opportunity. The youth program is growing again and we had 7 youth go through confirmation and join the church this past year. We have also welcomed 38 new members during the past 12 months! Additionally 12 children and youth participated in "On the Move" mission camp this summer, as well as others who participated in the youth retreats.

We also tried something new this year with a "back to school bash." On a hot Saturday morning in August we served over 100 children from the community with a fun day where they could also get the necessary school supplies to help them start the new school year. We are reaching our neighbors in a variety of ways – the numbers don't lie, as the expression goes.

There are other numbers that we need to be reminded of as well. We had 18 participants go on the Henderson Settlement mission trip in September. We are now also the host church for the 3 UMAR houses with residents worshiping with us on a regular basis - sometimes as many as 15 who join us at the 11:00 service. Additionally, the UMAR Sunday School class is also being held with 4 Wake Forest students assisting those with exceptional needs. We are building bridges and fostering relationships.

In February and then again in October we had “connection” groups ranging from book/Bible study to small groups studying the United Methodist Social Principles, to painting, to hiking, yoga and more. The numbers don’t lie, as the expression goes.

More numbers – we collected and delivered to our storm ravaged neighbors nearly 300 flood buckets. Over 100 of those buckets you donated. Maple Springs was one of the collection points for our district so the other buckets we delivered came from other area churches. Additionally, you donated over \$20,000.00 to go directly to storm relief from Hurricane Helene! These are numbers to celebrate as we continue to reach out to our neighbors in powerful ways.

Our food pantry continues to serve more and more of our neighbors. We are on pace to serve well over 10,000 of our neighbors this year. The numbers and the need are staggering. (See a separate article from Bill Blackburn about the food pantry). Serving this many people takes people! We regularly have between 30 – 40 volunteers serving in the pantry. It takes a minimum of 16 per week just to make it happen. What a wonderful ministry this is.

And of course, we are known in the area as the pumpkin church. We



have just completed our 46th year of selling pumpkins. This year our net income was just over \$17,000.00, which is money that is put right back into helping fund our many mission opportunities.

To make all of this – and much more happen since I just hit the highlights – it takes other numbers. It takes our financial support. This year our giving is up over last year. Thank you! But our expenses have outpaced our giving. In 2024 our operating budget was \$856,000.00. We are on target to meet that budget and to meet all our financial responsibilities. However, we have had several major unplanned expenses in addition to the usual ongoing expenses. Unfortunately, an unplanned roof repair project alone was in excess of \$70,000.00. Other operating expenses continue to increase as well. But thankfully, due to your generosity, we have managed to not only keep up, but fund these repairs and the vital lifegiving ministries that make us the church that we are.

We have much to be thankful for. Let's not forget that in this season of thanksgiving and this season of planning financially for next year. We want to continue to invest in our staff that makes these wonderful ministries happen day in and day out, week in and week out. No, the numbers don't lie.

Thank you for your continued support, your financial gifts, your presence in worship, either in person or online, and other activities. Thank you for taking seriously the words we say when we join the church, that we will “faithfully participate in (the) ministries by our prayers, presence, gifts, service, and witness.”

We are a wonderful witness to the love of Christ in our community and beyond. For that I give thanks.

The Social Principles are the official social positions of The United Methodist Church sanctioned and adopted by The United Methodist General Conference, Charlotte 2024. As we consider and discern our voting decisions this election see how important issues align with our social principles.

“ Social Principles p.32: Our involvement in political systems is rooted in the Gospel imperative to love our neighbors, to do justice, and to care for the vulnerable. As United Methodists, we acknowledge that love requires responsible political action and engagement aimed at the betterment of society and the promotion of the common good.

Political issues are complex; there are no easy answers and no perfect candidates. The gospel challenges us to set aside partisan presuppositions and pray for wisdom to use our sacred vote as best we can towards the common good. We will not all agree on the best ways to better society, but we can all commit to vote as disciples of Jesus Christ, guided by love for God and neighbor.

Social Principles p.29: We utterly reject laws, policies and social practices that marginalize, discriminate and/or encourage the use of violence against individuals, communities or other social groups based on perceived racial, ethnic or tribal differences.

Social Principles p. 38: We affirm the dignity, worth and rights of migrants, immigrants and refugees, including displaced and stateless people. We oppose all laws and policies that attempt to criminalize, dehumanize or punish displaced individuals and families based on their status as migrants, immigrants or refugees.

Social Principles p.39: Because all people are of sacred worth and certain basic human rights are due to everyone, we are committed to supporting the equal rights, liberties and protections of all people, regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity.

As you pray about your vote, will you consider our sacred responsibility to

- protect the civic rights of all, including freedom of speech, religion, movement, due process and fair treatment under the law
- protect the political rights of all, including voting rights
- address and dismantle systemic racism, in all its forms
- prioritize humanitarian concerns in domestic and foreign policy

Social Principles p.36: We affirm health care as a basic human right and vow to work toward expanded access to all forms of medical treatment, including preventative, therapeutic, and palliative care. Additionally, we believe that everyone has a right to decent living conditions, including adequate food and water, safe housing and a healthy environment.

- protect and expand access to affordable mental health services
- strengthen food assistance programs and address needs for safe, affordable housing





Through September of this year, the Food Pantry has served over 2600 family units (representing 7400 individuals). That's a 29% increase over 2023! What's surprising though is that of those 2600 family units, 70% of them have visited us only once or twice this year. That means that most of our neighbors who visit us are using us as an "Emergency Food Pantry" and that's why most pantries were established over the years...to help families when they have that sudden need. Yes, we are happy to serve those who come every month due to financial hardships but we are also here to serve that "one-time need".

So, why do they come to see us? An obvious reason is our location as we are very visible to the passing public. More importantly are the following: we are a client choice pantry and they choose their foods, our pantry shelves are full due to your donations of food or finances, they feel and appreciate the prayers of our church, and we have a reputation of being a kind place to visit. So THANK YOU to all who help us serve those one-time visitors or those who come every month. We could not do what we do without your donations, your prayers, and your kindness!

Give thanks for those in agriculture and who seek to work in harmony with nature. Before you eat, ask a blessing especially for all who provide the foods that sustain life. Be mindful of those who labor in the fields especially in high heat; speak up for justice for their health.

Give thanks for those who see, hear, and stand with marginalized peoples as they endure the brunt of a changing climate. Respond to disasters, definitely! Also, speak up for the necessary changes to avoid the suffering.


Give thanks for the laws, regulations, and organizations that protect or restore the natural habitats of God's creatures. With those protections, numerous marine and land animals have come back from the brink of extinction. Support those efforts so that wildlife can thrive.

Give thanks for people who donate leadership, time, and money to help organizations that marshal the many for a greater impact as catalysts of change. Individuals can't do all, but all—together—can. Choose your group(s) to support in some way.

Give thanks for those people who plant trees and gardens that nourish pollinators. Fall is a good time for planting many species. Look for places where you can add a tree or three or sow some wildflowers, for example. If you involve children in the event, you will also be sowing seeds of caring for nature.
