Advent Worship Services

It may not seem like it now, but Advent is right around the corner. We wanted to get this information about our Advent services out to you early and often. We are going to do things a little different this year. Yes, like the opening article says, things change.



Advent is the four Sundays prior to Christmas. Some years it's the four Sundays in December; it depends on how the calendar falls. This year the last Sunday of November, the 30th, is the first Sunday in Advent. Those services will be as usual, 8:45 and 11:00.

But the Sundays in December will be different! Mark it down now so it doesn't slip up on you. All of our worship services in December will be combined at 10:00am. Read that again...all of our worship services in December will be combined at 10:00am. The Sunday School hour will be at 9:00, or if your class chooses you can meet at 11:00. December 7 (besides it being a date which will live in infamy) will be in Craven Hall. December 14 will be the children's nativity in the sanctuary. This has become a beautiful tradition when the sanctuary is filled with little children as we relive the Christmas story being acted out by our children.

December 21 is the Chancel Choir Christmas Cantata. The music is more powerful with a filled sanctuary. Then, December 28, the last Sunday of the year, will be in Craven Hall. We've deliberately chosen to equally divide the Sundays into the two different worship spaces.

Advent is the beginning of the new church year. We want to begin this new year unified, as one body of Christ, worshiping together. December is also the culmination of celebrating our 175th year as Maple Springs. As we have celebrated in different ways this year, let us bring things to a culmination by worshiping together.

Please make plans to join us in worship each week if at all possible. Each service will be different. When we worship together, as one body, we are in fellowship together, celebrating our life together, worshiping the living God together.

So, to recap:


- December 7 worship together in Craven Hall
- December 14 worship together as the children present the Nativity in the
 Sanctuary
- December 21 worship together as the Chancel Choir presents the Christmas Cantata in the Sanctuary
- December 28 worship together in Craven Hall on the final Sunday of 2025

Again, all worship services will be at 10:00am. Your class may plan on 9:00 Sunday School, or 11:00 if that works better for your group.

This does not mean that we are doing away with any services. Sometimes I am asked if the I I:00 service will be done away with. The answer to that is an emphatic NO! We are celebrating and worshiping together as one unified body during this special time of year.

Embrace the change! Let us worship together.

Life and Lessons in the Garden

We on the Plants and Flowers Ministry team have learned throughout the summer that Nutsedge, a native grass, has a strong will to live – and to take over our garden! We are not going to let it!

For those who aren't familiar with Nutsedge, it is what looks like grass on steroids in the quadrant of the garden near the sidewalk in front of the three crosses. It has been alternately thriving, then pulled up, then thriving again, then pulled up or burned, and the ground covered with both clear and black plastic in an effort to suppress it. We learned through this process that fire doesn't kill it, and the clear



plastic acts like a greenhouse for the Nutsedge which was going strong underneath. Not the result we were seeking! But the black plastic DID work, and that's the technique we'll be employing for the next few months to hopefully come out triumphant in the spring – with clear soil, ready for planting something, anything, <u>besides</u> Nutsedge. We know it really isn't doing anything presently to enhance the beauty or functionality of our new garden, but we're learning! Thanks for your patience as we do so.

And as we learn, we thought it would be nice to share some of this growing knowledge with other churches in the area. We have seen a quick and wholehearted response from the local pollinators when they were offered a place to feast, rest, shelter, and reproduce. We have learned that we can be one small part of the solution to the current worldwide biodiversity crisis by converting our small patch of lawn to native plants.

On Saturday, October 25th, we held a workshop here which included a presentation about, and time spent in, our garden. The workshop was attended by representatives from three churches in our surrounding area who are interested in doing something similar to what we

have done here at Maple Springs. We hope that, in addition to other churches learning from this process to increase pollinator habitat and thus pollinator health, that you (the congregation) will do so as well, and then choose to plant and grow native plants at your homes!

Henderson Settlement Reflections

It has happened again! As I drove away from Frakes, Kentucky on a beautiful Friday Fall Day, I felt thankful, I felt fulfilled. Over the course of the week, I saw God in action through hours of work, of fellowship, of faith, of service, of appreciation, and of love.

Beginning work in earnest on Monday morning, three teams set out to the community around Henderson Settlement. Over the course of the week, we rebuilt steps and porches, we removed vinyl siding only to discover structural damage beyond repair, delivered the hard facts to the owner, made temporary but necessary repairs, built a raised platform over a deteriorating pad so the homeowner had a place to relax, and removed a dilapidated well house replacing it with a well-constructed and well-insulated one. On our final day of work members of the team did work on the houses in which we stayed. We replaced doors, mirrors, and cleaned decks and outdoor furniture.

All the while we shared our faith and our friendship with the members of the community and each other. We connected, learned their history, were impressed with their strength, their resilience, and their gratefulness. Their spirit and their actions gave us as much as we gave them!

I am so thankful to you, Maple Springs, for making the Henderson Settlement Mission possible! Their community knows our name and recognizes our commitment to giving a helping hand to a proud, yet economically depressed area. I am also thankful to the team of I4 individuals who gave a week of their time and varied skills to make life a bit easier for our new friends. I can honestly say that in my years of association with the Maple Springs delegation, I have always been proud of the quality of work, the sincerity of heart, the relationships shared, and the dedication to Christ exhibited.

We plan to return to Henderson Settlement next fall. Reservations have been made for September 27- October 2, 2026. In the following months we will be sharing reflections and pictures of this year's trip. In 2026 will be hosting a representative of the Settlement to share more of its history and mission. We will be inviting you to join us in September! Please consider it.....you too will feel thankful and fulfilled.

Tuesday Morning Women's Bible Study



Hello Maple Springs Family!

I just wanted to take a few minutes to give everyone updates on what's going on in our kitchen in Craven Hall.



We continue to make gradual updates and have

gotten new covers for the dish carts, new metal rolling carts (thank you to Maple Springers), new dish towels (thank you to the Circle of Friends), and updated the baking and serving utensils as well as re-organized the storage drawers.

We appreciate all the hard work of keeping the kitchen clean after it is used but there are still some situations where food or other containers are being left out on the counters after the kitchen is used. A few concerns are as follows:

- Carts are not being wiped down and left dirty after use. They need to be cleaned and returned to their original storage place after use.
- Dirty dishes are being left in the sink for someone else to clean and put away.
- Sink is left with food or other material and not being cleaned after use.
- Please do not leave towels hanging over the counters to dry. Please put the hamper underneath the utility sink.
- Any food that is stored in the Pantry MUST be in a sealed container, not just a Ziplock bag. Rodents can easily chew through a plastic bag, so all opened items need to be secured.
- REMINDER that FOOD left in the refrigerator must be labeled and dated, otherwise it will be thrown out.
- The refrigerator is checked weekly and anything that has an expired date on it will be thrown away. NO food is to be left out on the counters after an event, without a name and date on it. If it has not been claimed or removed within a week, it also will be thrown away.

Your kitchen team is working hard to make sure the kitchen remains well functioning and in good order. If you have suggestions or wish to donate, please reach out to myself or Lynn Bailey prior to making sure we don't have more of what we need.

UM Creation Care Tips



Reverse the words, "thanks giving," to reshape your observance. **Develop a gratitude list**. As you make an entry, give thanks to God for that blessing in your life. Regularly reread your record of God's bounty and find peace in it despite all the disruptions swirling around you.

Black Friday, Small Business Saturday, and Cyber Monday are part of our culture of relentless advertising and overconsumption, which fills our landfills. **Be thoughtful about what you buy** and from whom. Discern wants versus needs. Look for environmentally focused companies with ethical practices. Consider packaging, durability, and sustainability in the products you choose.

Enjoy your Thanksgiving celebrations, **starting with a sustainability mindset**: reusable dinnerware, cloth napkins, less meat/more plant-based foods, a plan to use leftovers, a kitchen set up to maximize composting and minimize trashing, even washable rags for cleanup instead of killing trees for paper towels. Earth will be thankful you did.

Put your money to work for justice. When you buy organic, you guarantee more farmers can grow healthy, safe food. When you buy fair trade, you provide living wages and fight poverty. When you bank with a community bank or credit union, you are investing locally and likely not funding fossil fuel projects. Choose justice.

In Luke 18:1-8 Jesus tells the parable of the widow and the unjust judge. The judge "who neither feared God nor had respect for people," finally relented because of the widow's

persistence in asking for justice. She didn't give up, and neither should we! Keep bringing injustice to planet and people to the attention of the powers that be. **Write letters, sign petitions, make calls,** speak up, stand up, step up.

The average American family uses 500 plastic snack bags annually, which are non-degradable and may contain BPA. To cut waste and keep plastics out of food and the environment, **choose eco-friendly alternatives**, including reusable silicone bags, paper sacks, bamboo boxes, and glass containers.

Microplastics are lurking in your closet. Clothes made of polyester, acrylic, nylon or other synthetics or synthetic blends shed microplastics when washed. Avoid adding to the problem by washing fewer times, handwashing, or using the gentle cycle. Purchase already washed items from thrift stores or new ones made from natural materials. **Read the labels before you buy.**

Your recycling—if it's in a plastic bag—won't be recycled. The bag will be pulled off the line and trashed because there is no time to open and empty it, and plastic bags cannot be allowed to go through because they tangle up the equipment and cause shutdowns. **Learn and follow the rules for your local recycling facility.** Give thanks for those who work there.

Investigate Oral Care Free Recycling Program for options for disposing of used or empty toothpaste tubes and caps, toothbrushes, toothpaste cartons, toothbrush outer packaging, and floss containers. Consider creating a drive or drop off site through your congregation.

Are you regularly in a queue to pick up a child or grandchild from school? Fluctuating temperatures can entice you to turn on the engine one day to run the air conditioner and the next to crank up some heat. Emissions from idling cars, however, send particulates into the air, which research has shown affects the cognitive performance of children. **Keep the engine off while you wait.**
