SECOND READING: 2 Thessalonians 3:6-13

A reading from Second Thessalonians.

⁶ Now we command you, brothers and sisters, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, to keep away from every brother or sister living irresponsibly and not according to the tradition that they received from us. ⁷ For you yourselves know how you ought to imitate us; we were not irresponsible when we were with you, ⁸ and we did not eat anyone's bread without paying for it, but with toil and labor we worked night and day so that we might not burden any of you. ⁹ This was not because we do not have that right but in order to give you an example to imitate. ¹⁰ For even when we were with you, we gave you this command: anyone unwilling to work should not eat. ¹¹ For we hear that some of you are living irresponsibly, mere busybodies, not doing any work. ¹² Now such persons we command and exhort in the Lord Jesus Christ to do their work quietly and to earn their own living. ¹³ Brothers and sisters, do not be weary in doing what is right.

⁵ When some were speaking about the temple, how it was adorned with beautiful stones and gifts dedicated to God, [Jesus] said, 6 "As for these things that you see, the days will come when not one stone will be left upon another; all will be thrown down." ⁷ They asked him, "Teacher, when will this be, and what will be the sign that this is about to take place?" 8 And he said, "Beware that you are not led astray, for many will come in my name and say, 'I am he!' and, 'The time is near!' Do not go after them. 9 "When you hear of wars and insurrections, do not be terrified, for these things must take place first, but the end will not follow immediately." 10 Then he said to them, "Nation will rise against nation and kingdom against kingdom; 11 there will be great earthquakes and in various places famines and plagues, and there will be dreadful portents and great signs from heaven. 12 "But before all this occurs, they will arrest you and persecute you; they will hand you over to synagogues and prisons, and you will be brought before kings and governors because of my name. 13 This will give you an opportunity to testify. 14 So make up your minds not to prepare your defense in advance, 15 for I will give you words and a wisdom that none of your opponents will be able to withstand or contradict. ¹⁶ You will be betrayed even by parents and siblings, by relatives and friends, and they will put some of you to death. 17 You will be hated by all because of my name. 18 But not a hair of your head will perish. 19 By your endurance you will gain your souls."

* Elizabeth of Hungary, renewer of society (†1231) Born a princess of Hungary, Elizabeth was betrothed in childhood to Ludwig of Thuringia and raised at the Wartburg Castle, where she later became his wife. Though their marriage was brief, it was marked by deep mutual devotion and a shared concern for the poor. After Ludwig's death, Elizabeth faced exile and hardship but remained steadfast in her faith. She used her remaining resources to build a hospital in Marburg, where she personally tended the sick and destitute. Remembered for her compassion and courage, Elizabeth's life embodied the gospel call to serve Christ in the least of these, transforming privilege into mercy and charity into justice.







LAMB OF GOD




COMMUNION DISTRIBUTION

Christ, our Host, welcomes all to this table of grace. Here at St. Mark's, we believe that in the bread and wine, Jesus is truly present drawing us into a community of love and mercy. You do not need to be a member of this congregation to receive. Come as you are, for the gifts of God are for you.

To receive, come up the center aisle to the altar rail. If you need a gluten-free wafer, please take one from the paten on the small table at the head of the center aisle. You may kneel or stand at the rail, filling in from the center toward the sides. Receive the bread from a communion minister, then choose either a glass of red wine or white grape juice from the tray. Place your empty cup in the tray at the side aisle as you return to your seat.

If you are unable to come forward, communion can be brought to you in your pew. Simply let an usher know.

When giving the bread and cup, the communion ministers say: The body of Christ, given for you. The blood of Christ, shed for you. and each person may respond: **Amen.** The assembly stands.
