MESSAGE FROM PASTOR EDWIN A Place to Belong

In July, I got to fulfill a dream I've had since I was a child: to go to Holden Village. My parents came with me, fulfilling their own ambition from their college years to visit that remote mountain retreat. There were plenty of magical moments: hiking to beautiful vistas, sharing stories and laughter, quiet afternoons with a book in hand.

But one moment in particular stays with me. We were gathered for worship, using Holden's Prayer Around the Cross. As the community sang, folks moved gently through the space, some lighting candles, others offering or receiving prayer, some simply kneeling in silence. I sat there with my parents, and I felt something rare: a great thinning of the unseen, unspoken things that often weigh on us.

It wasn't just the retreat setting that renewed my spirit. What moved me most was the sense of closeness, closeness with God, with my family, and with the gathered body of Christ. We embraced one another without speaking, but in that moment something deep settled in me. I felt like a child again, singing Holden Evening Prayer ('86), held by grace and by love, and by my parents. That moment offered me a profound sense of belonging.

Maybe you, too, long to belong. Maybe you are carrying weariness or worry and are yearning for peace, renewal, courage, or clarity. Maybe you're not sure what you need, but you know you're craving something more than another appointment on the calendar. Something deeper, something holy. You don't have to go to the mountains to find it!

That sense of sacred belonging — of connection, peace, and renewal — can be found right here in the body of Christ. That's what church is meant to be. Not just a place to "do ministry" or attend programs, but a space to rest in God's presence and in each other's care. We continued next page

Learning for All Ages

Elsewhere in this newsletter you'll find information about Godly Play Sunday School, Alleluia Choir, Confirmation and other youth learning activities. Here is the Fall schedule for the Sunday Forum:

SUNDAY FORUMS

Sunday Forum meets most Sundays from September through May, between services from 9:45–10:30 am in the conference room. Each week features a different topic, from deepening our understanding of our Christian faith to hearing from ministry partners who are living out God's call in practical, hands-on ways. The variety of speakers and subjects keeps our conversations lively and engaging. All are welcome to join in learning, sharing, and growing together.

September 7: Rally Day, no Sunday Forum

September 14: Shalom Ministries with St. Mark's members.

Dedicated to serving the poor and homeless here in Spokane, Shalom Ministries provides over 60,000 meals annually through their Dining with Dignity program. Their Pathways initiative offers job and life skills training, mentoring, and housing assistance. Shalom Ministries continues to be a beacon of hope, fostering healing and renewal by extending hospitality and dignity to some of our most vulnerable neighbors.

September 21: Manzanita House with Patricia Castaneda and Sam Smith.

Since its inception in 2021, Manzanita House has assisted immigrants and refugees from over 105 countries, collaborating with more than 64 community partners to provide comprehensive support and stabilization services. The name reflects the resilience of the individuals they serve, drawing a parallel to the hardy manzanita tree known for its ability to thrive in challenging conditions.

September 28: Spokane Riverkeeper

Spokane Riverkeeper is a nonprofit engaged in the vital work of protecting the health and dignity of the Spokane river. As advocates for clean water and environmental restoration, they will help us explore how caring for our watershed connects to our call to steward creation. Come learn how we can be good neighbors to the river that runs through our community, then join us for a service project after the late service and help keep our river clean.

October 5: International Companion Synod Partners with Pastor Ezekiel Mwambungu.

We welcome Pastor Ezekiel Mwambungu from our companion synod, the Ulanga-Kilombero Diocese in Tanzania. Join us to learn more about this global partnership rooted in shared faith and mutual accompaniment.

October 12: The Fig Tree with Marijke Fakasiieiki.

The Fig Tree is an independent, nonprofit newspaper and resource directory dedicated to fostering communication among faith and nonprofit communities in the Inland Northwest. As an ecumenical and interfaith organization, it aims to bridge divisions, build understanding, and promote unity and action for the common good.

Lutheran-Orthodox Joint Statement with Pastor Edwin.

As part of our call to honor our Christian neighbors, Pastor Edwin invites us to explore a new joint statement from Lutheran and Orthodox theologians addressing the historic tension over shared and differing beliefs. This study builds on our ecumenical ministry at St. Mark's, including last year's visit to an Orthodox church. Come learn how shared faith and respectful dialogue can draw us closer as the body of Christ.

Grace Commons Spokane with Pastor Emily

Grace Commons Spokane is a reimagined ministry offering a spiritual home for curious, compassionate, and thoughtful young adults. Building on its roots in campus ministry at Eastern Washington University, it now serves a broader Spokane community that meets young people where they are: in classrooms, coffee shops, protests, and community spaces. Join us to learn how Grace Commons is helping young adults live out their faith in public through community, organizing, and justice-seeking.

CONFIRMATION and REFORMATION: Two Sundays, One Spirit

One of the biggest shifts this fall is how we'll celebrate two powerful traditions. Reformation Sunday has long been observed on the last Sunday in October, and for many years, St. Mark's has also held our annual Affirmation of Baptism (Confirmation) on that same day.

This year, we're spreading things out so each celebration can shine.

- Confirmation Sunday will be celebrated at the 10:45 service on October 19.
- Reformation Sunday will follow the weekend of October 25/26.

On both weekends, we'll give thanks for the gifts of the Holy Spirit, poured out in baptism, alive in the church, and shared across generations. You're invited to wear red both Sundays as we celebrate the Spirit's movement among us: through our young people affirming their faith, through the church's continual reformation, and through the sacred calling we all share.

WELCOMING OUR SIBLING IN CHRIST FROM THE ULANGA-KILOMBERO DIOCESE

On **Sunday**, **October 5**, we are honored to welcome Pastor Ezekiel Mwambungu from our companion synod, the Ulanga-Kilombero Diocese (UKD) of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania. Pastor Ezekiel will join us for worship and will be our featured speaker during Sunday Forum. He will proclaim the Words of Institution from the table in his native Swahili, deepening our sense of the global Body of Christ. We hope you'll be present to offer hospitality and to learn how our shared faith connects us across continents.

The ELCA's Companion Synod Program fosters relationships between ELCA synods and Lutheran churches around the world. These more than 120 partnerships are rooted in accompaniment, the practice of walking together in mutuality, trust, and shared mission. In our relationship with the UKD, we express this through the Swahili phrase "Bega kwa Bega," meaning "Shoulder to Shoulder."

Over the years, the Northwest Intermountain

Synod and the UKD have walked together through mutual visits, prayer, ministry collaboration, and practical support. These friendships deepen our sense of the global church and remind us that we are not alone in the work of ministry.

Pastor Ezekiel Mwambungu currently serves as Acting General Secretary of the Ulanga-Kilombero Diocese, functioning as the diocese's chief administrator. He also directs Strobelt School, the UKD's pre- and primary school. In the late 1990s, Pastor Ezekiel completed an internship at Grace Lutheran Church in Wenatchee, Washington, strengthening a relationship with our synod that has continued to bear fruit.

The UKD is located in southeastern Tanzania, a region of stunning natural beauty and significant economic challenges. The diocese is active in evangelism, education, healthcare, and community development. One of its central ministries is Tumaini Lutheran Seminary, located in the town of Malinyi. Tumaini includes a Bible school for training lay evangelists and a secondary school that provides quality education to young people.

Our synod has supported several projects at Tumaini, including the construction of a much-needed dining hall. For many years, students ate outdoors or under temporary shelters. Thanks to the generosity of congregations across our synod, students now gather in a covered space—a visible sign of our shared ministry and enduring hope.

There are still ways you can support this important work. Current priorities include:

- Girls' scholarships for students attending Tumaini Lutheran Secondary School (TLS),
 - · Lugala Lutheran Hospital,
- The Tanzanian Travel Fund, which helps make guest exchanges possible.

Gifts sent to the synod's Global Mission committee will be put to use in close collaboration with UKD leadership. If you're interested in joining this committee, let Pastor Edwin known or reach out to the synod office.

On **October 5**, we'll have the chance not only to hear about this partnership, but to meet the people behind it. We invite you to join us as we renew our connection to the global church and give thanks for companions who walk with us, in the Spirit of Christ, "Bega kwa Bega."

MEET OUR NEW PRESIDING BISHOP: The Rev. Yehiel Curry

On July 30, 2025, the Rev. Yehiel Curry was elected as the next Presiding Bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), succeeding the Rev. Elizabeth Eaton. Elected on the fifth ballot during the churchwide assembly in Phoenix, Arizona, Curry received 562 of 799 votes cast. He is the first Black pastor to serve in this role, currently serves as Bishop of the Metropolitan Chicago Synod, and will assume office in October.

Bishop Curry brings with him a story rooted in faith, perseverance, and a deep commitment to community. Though he was raised in the church, he didn't always have the language to name what he was feeling as a call. "I was just a guy sitting in the pew," he told the assembly. "I never really learned the language of discernment. I just knew I had this feeling." He tried to follow that feeling through several careers—first as a teacher, then a social worker, then in business—but it wasn't until he found himself serving in the church that he realized: "I could do this for the rest of my life."

That journey led him to Shekinah Chapel, a Synodically Authorized Worshiping Community in Riverdale, Illinois. There, after initially declining

the role for two years, he said "yes" to becoming a lay mission developer. That yes would eventually grow into a call to ordained ministry, seminary at the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago, and ultimately service as Bishop of the Metro Chicago Synod, a role he has held since 2019.

For Bishop Curry, this journey is not just personal, it's communal. He reminded the assembly that the church's support, especially through mission dollars and shared ministry, made his leadership possible. "If you want to know what your benevolence dollars look like," he said, "it looks like me. And I want to say thank you. Thank you for your investment."

Curry is also a family man, and he made sure to lift up his wife, LaShonda, in his remarks after the election. "While I take my work seriously, I also take my first ministry seriously, and that is the ministry of my family," he said. Together they have three daughters, and Curry has spoken frequently of how deeply his family grounds and supports him.

His leadership style is rooted in approachability, storytelling, and a deep sense of humor. He shared with the assembly a lighthearted explanation for the limp he carried into the assembly: After playing 38 holes of golf in one day while his wife was out of town, he injured his foot. "To ensure it wasn't broken," he joked, "I played 18 more the next day. And then 18 that Tuesday."

Curry's election comes at a time when the ELCA is deeply discerning its identity and future. The theme of this year's assembly, For the Life of the World, echoes the kind of ministry Curry has long embodied: contextual, inclusive, rooted in justice, and propelled by a gospel of hope.

As we welcome Bishop Curry into this new leadership role, may we pray for his wisdom, joy, and continued witness among us. And may his story remind us all that God continues to call leaders from every pew, every community, and every corner of our shared life. Did you know that St. Mark's qualified for new LED interior & exterior lighting fixtures through Avista? Our church was retrofitted with these lights over the summer and Avista estimates that it will save us close to \$6000 a year. That is a mortgage payment!

We also worked hard to map our sprinkler system and cap sprinklers we didn't need. A special thank you to Mark Copeland, Dan Heinen, and Bob Palrud! Our July utilities bill showed a savings of 9,836 cubic feet of water - that is 73,573 gallons of water!

Another school year is upon us and that means many kids will need the extra energy boost from the Bite2Go kits again.

For those of you new to St. Mark's, we support Franklin Elementary in a program with Second Harvest that provides a bag of shelf-stable foods every week during the school year to children within a certain income level, to help carry them over the weekend.

Each year, the numbers grow with the downturn of the economy. So, as part of our Social Ministry at St. Mark's, we ask members to help with this program and support at least one child in the amount of \$180 for the year. You can either write a check to St. Mark's, noting that it is for the Bite2Go program, or you can charge it on your card with St. Mark's. Should you have an employer who likes to help, they can send it directly to Second Harvest with the designation that it is for Bite2Go for Franklin Elementary, and it will go into our account.

- · REVIVE assists diners with housing intakes and the long process of getting them housed.

CAN YOU HELP? Our neighbors at Shalom Ministries downtown are in extreme need of bottled water.

Many of Shalom's unhoused and low-income guests have limited resources to obtain fresh cool water. On very short notice, St Mark's was able to provide enough water for all our Monday evening dinner guests!

We will continue to collect cases of bottled water while the temperature remains uncomfortably high. Just bring them to the church during office hours (M-Th. 9-3:00, F. 9-12 noon) and we will get them downtown.

ST. MARK'S VISITS HOLDEN VILLAGE



In July, a group of 18 from St. Mark's traveled to Holden Village for a week of summer fun, fellowship, and renewal. Tucked in the heart of the North Cascades, Holden Village invites all into the wilderness to encounter God, creation, and community in fresh and life-giving ways.

Our journey began at Field's Point on Lake Chelan, where we boarded a ferry bound for Lucerne Landing. From there, a dusty bus carried us up steep switchbacks into the mountains. Along the way, we entered the burn scar of the Wolverine Fire, which scorched the valley ten years ago. This summer, Holden marked that anniversary with their summer theme of resurrection and restoration. The hillsides now bloom with magenta Fireweed, the first of the "fire followers", whose bright stalks stabilize the soil and make way for new life to return.

At the village, we were warmly welcomed and quickly settled into the rhythms of Holden

life. Meals, classes, and Sacred Space formed the heart of each day, all punctuated by the ringing of the village bell, which calls the community to worship, reflection, and shared learning.

There was something for everyone. Some explored the Craft Cave, painting, weaving, and throwing pottery. Others attended a daily Bible study on the Psalms, led by Pastor Katie Hines-Shah of Redeemer Lutheran Church in Hinsdale, Illinois. One visiting faculty offered thought-provoking insights and bold new ideas. Victor Menaldo, a political science professor at the University of Washington, spoke on Al, economics, and Christian ethics. Another faculty member, Lutheran theologian Paul Griffith, shared his passion for astrophotography which included a late-night stargazing session under some of the dark skies of Holden.

One of the week's highlights was the daily Glocal singalong, led by Dr. Keith Hampton, cantor at the Lutheran School of Theology at

Chicago. Together with other international musicians, "Doc" introduced us to a vibrant tapestry of global Christian song.

Fellowship also abounded. We shared a wine and cheese reception, lingered on porch swings with books and laughter, and hiked mountain trails lined with waterfalls, glaciers, and remnants of Holden's mining past. Wildlife surrounded us: chipmunks, marmots, and deer, including doe and fawn who wandered with us along village paths. Even the lingering signs of wildfire reminded us of the fragility and resilience of this sacred place, and of the whole earth, entrusted to our care.

When the week drew to a close, the Holden Sending Prayer was spoken over us, a moment both tender and bittersweet. With grateful hearts, we boarded the bus, the ferry, and finally returned home. Yet something of the mountain still lingers with us: the songs, the silence, the signs of resurrection. We return to Spokane changed, carrying a bit of Holden's light into our lives and our world.
