MESSAGE FROM PASTOR GRETCHEN

It's happening.

In 1957, St. Mark's kicked off the dedication of the newly-built sanctuary and church school addition with a 24-hour prayer vigil. Seventy-two people sustained a continuous chain for those hours, praying that St. Mark's building would be used for God's good purpose in Christ and would serve the needs of our wider community. Though the building has changed further, what they prayed for has been happening since. As Pat Shelley said in her letter to the congregation, it's happening still, in ways that feel pretty magical.

Several, among many such moments, are especially close to my heart.

During June's Vacation Bible School, the whole place became a sea of story, song, art and play. Children and youth from across the community experienced the love of Jesus. An impromptu after-party erupted in the narthex each day as kids, alive with joy in God's presence, lingered to sing and dance together.

In August as in most months, this place was a haven for grieving people of wide-ranging faith identities. Pastor Edwin, lay leaders and St. Mark's gifted musicians lifted our spirits and nourished our bodies. Unconditional welcome to Christ's table had Catholics, Protestants and seekers sharing the same bread and cup. Months later, people in the wider community are still talking about their moving experience at a St. Mark's funeral, alive with hope.

In September, our beloved Pastor Lori fed us a final time with Word and Sacrament. We gave thanks for the profound ways her gifts enriched St. Mark's. Encircling her with countless hands of blessing, we prayed God's provision for her in the road ahead. It was a holy moment in this place, alive with love.

This fall, Wonderful Wednesdays gathered all generations around potluck tables, across card games, and into an inflatable gaga pit. We even broke an occasional sweat! The fellowship supported our Confirmation students, birthed new relationships, and deepened belonging in this family of faith. The narthex was alive with laughter and kindness.

Throughout summer and fall, food and school supplies streamed in. Volunteers delivered the food to Crosswalk to care for our homeless youth. More volunteers convened to assemble backpacks of school supplies for Lutheran World Relief to send across the globe. Volunteers dedicated countless hours nearly every single day tending the building and the grounds and planning how to steward our slice of creation even more wisely. Again and again, St. Mark's is alive with generosity.

Just last week, the sanctuary was a quiet place of "Prayer for the Nation" before and after the election. In the stillness of candlelight and conversation among those within and beyond our congregation we brought to God our joys and fears, our hopes and dreams. It was alive with gentleness.

So, why recount these moments now? First, to say thank you. God's work gets done with our hands. Your "yes" with finances, time, talent and prayer made these and many more luminous moments possible.

Second, as we shape the ministry plan and budget for the coming year, prayerfully consider how you might lean in. These moments aren't just activities or programming. It's life-changing stuff. As we give time, talent, treasure, voice, heart, spirit, and intellect to whatever rhythms of St. Mark's most call to us, God ever transforms us into the fruits of the Spirit we seek — joy, hope, love, kindness, gentleness, generosity, peace and more. It's this fruit our world most needs.

Yes, it's happening still. Come be part of what's alive at St. Mark's. You might even find it a bit magical.

December 8, 15, 22 with Pastors Gretchen and Edwin

Reverence of Mary, the mother of Jesus, has been primarily the domain of the Roman Catholic tradition, but what in the theology around Mary might speak to our spiritual practices? Luther expressed deep respect and honor for Mary while also emphasizing that this should not diminish the importance of Christ, praising her faith and humility. We'll spend three sessions exploring different images of Mary and how they might be fruitful for your own theological reflection and spiritual practice.

January 12: The Fig Tree with Marijke Fakasiieiki

The Fig Tree is an independent, nonprofit newspaper and resource directory dedicated to fostering communication among faith and nonprofit communities in the Inland Northwest. It aims to bridge divisions, build understanding, and promote unity and action for the common good.

As an ecumenical and interfaith organization, *The Fig Tree* seeks to educate readers through its media and programs; connect people of faith on shared concerns; share stories of individuals living out their faith values; explore faith, ethical, and justice issues to find common ground; offer theological reflection and dialogue to foster understanding; network congregations and organizations to pool resources, and inspire collective action locally and globally.

January 19: Homegrown National Park panel discussion

Recognizing that our traditional national parks, though magnificent, are insufficient to fully protect biodiversity, Homegrown National Park is a grassroots movement that encourages individuals to transform their yards into mini-habitats for native species, extending the concept of national parks to our own backyards and communities. By planting native species, we can create a network of interconnected habitats that support local wildlife and contribute to a healthier planet.

January 26: ELCA Social Message "Earth's Climate Crisis" with Deaconess Katrina Martich

Drawing from existing church teachings, ELCA social messages provide a theological framework and social perspective to foster discernment and engagement on some relatively narrow matter that impacts our life together.

This social message on the climate crisis was commissioned in light of our increased understanding of the harm done to all of us by the degradation of our global home and the need for fresh action on the part of the church. It draws its framing from several social statements, particularly *Caring for Creation: Vision, Hope, and Justice,* and was adopted by the ELCA Church Council on April 20, 2023.

Youth

Hello and happy autumn from St. Mark's youth! We've had a great start to the school year and are excited to share all of our youth happenings with the congregation.

We kicked off the year with an ice cream social in the Parish House backyard. It was a nice opportunity to check in with families after the summer and meet all the new youth. We have a very enthusiastic group of sixth graders this year who are bringing a lot of fun energy to the youth group.

We settled into September with our regular programming of Sunday Cool and Sunday afternoon activities. Sunday Cool is our weekly programming between first and second service. This year we've been meeting in the narthex around 9:30 am, playing an active game in the Fellowship Hall, and then moving back to the youth room to share some highs and lows and doing a quick devotional. The more active start has been a big success, and hopefully provides a more accessible way for new youth to connect with the youth group. If you have any youth in grades six through twelve who might be interested, please send them our way and we'll make sure they feel welcome and get introduced to the rest of the group.



In addition to our regular youth activities, we started a new program named Wonderful Wednesdays that ran concurrent with Confirmation classes. Wonderful Wednesdays was a two hour block from 6:00 to 8:00 pm that was open to anyone in the congregation. The first hour was an intergenerational potluck and the second hour we split into smaller groups for activities like board games, arts and crafts, and even a hymn sing. We even broke





out our brand-new gaga ball pit for some high energy action.

This programming was really fun to get to be a part of. I want to thank everyone who came, and announce that we will be picking it back up during the winter Confirmation session. If you are a part of a small group at St. Mark's, consider Wonderful Wednesdays as a time you could join up for a meal and then break off and meet with your group.

As for the rest of our fall programming, we've been busy on Sunday afternoons. So far we've had a Lego build day, an arts and crafts afternoon, as well as a few chances to play Mario Kart and some other party games.

In October we took a trip to the Harvest House up at Greenbluff where we got lost in the corn maze and had some caramel apple popcorn.









Recently we had our annual Youth Group Halloween party, complete with pumpkin carving, costumes, and some pumpkin bowling. And by the time you are reading this we'll have just had our first Cooking with Rachel afternoon activity where we will be making some tacos.





As for upcoming activities, we've got one event coming up soon, and then two bigger events that you should keep on your calendar.

First up is the church lock-in on **Friday**, **November 22**. This is open to youth in grades six to twelve and goes from **6:00 pm until 8:00 am** the next morning. The lock-in is our big event of the fall. We'll have games galore, a church-wide treasure hunt, a late-night trip to Denny's Diner, and many more surprises. Looking a little further down the line, we are planning on taking a group to the Building Youth Groups winter retreat at Lutherhaven camp in Idaho. 

BITE2GO

A huge thank you to everyone at St. Mark's who came forward and paid \$180 to support a child at Franklin Elementary in the free lunch Bite2Go program for the school year. The Bite2Go program is a part of

Second Harvest Food Bank and ensures that these children get a bag of shelf stable food to take home every Friday during the school year. That bag of food may help other children that are in the home but don't go to school.

As of this writing, St. Mark's is supporting 42 children at Franklin. Did you know that St. Mark's has been supporting Bite2Go for ten years straight? We started contributing in 2015. WOW! THANK YOU, ST. MARK'S.

CROSSWALK

Crosswalk is a downtown center that cares for teens in need. There is a high school program at the site. Some teens are houseless, some just need a community.

Crosswalk serves three meals a day to any teen who needs one. St. Mark's provides dinner and lunch food on the **fourth Thursday of the month**, when we cook tacos. The items you donate provide their lunch for every day of the following week. The Sunday before our day, there are sign-up sheets for people to see what is needed for lunches: lunch meats, cheeses, bread, fruit, veggies, juice, milk. Cookies are always welcome! Food donations can be left in the refrigerator and on the kitchen island. It is helpful if you mark the items "Crosswalk." Please bring your donations to St. Mark's by **3:00 pm each fourth Thursday** of the month. Thank you for all your contributions.

SPEAR

It is with mixed emotions that the SPEAR board will be closing doors on November 30, 2024. SPEAR has been serving the East Central community since 1969. At its height it operated at seven different sites and was sponsored by many area churches. Over the years many more programs have been created for youth from low-income families. There are more summer camps, more after-school programs, and more food pantries all over Spokane. SPEAR has fulfilled its mission.

The property that was donated by Grace Lutheran Church before it closed will become available for low-income housing through Spokane Low Income Housing Consortium. Mission Community Outreach Center, which is also in the area, is thriving and will continue to offer clothing, diapers, and household items to those in need. The East Central Food Bank at the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Community Center operates seven days a week.

Food from our collection bins will now be channeled to a new organization. We are looking into the best fit for a destination for what our members regularly give. If you are interested in being involved in that process, please reach out to Pr. Edwin.

The Shalom bin, which collects warm clothing, will remain. As another cold winter sets in all of us in the St. Mark's community will find new ways to help those less fortunate than us. The SPEAR board is very grateful to the long-standing support from all of you!

SHALOM MINISTRIES

Thank you for the outpouring of support for the Shalom Ministries Dining with Dignity benefit, A Gala Event, which took place on October 26. We appreciate table hosts, attendees and donations for the silent and live auctions. This year approximately \$32,000 of much needed funds were raised, a 200% increase from last year.

A poetry group meets at Shalom every other week and has been increasingly well attended. A group poem is created at each gathering and is displayed on site.

Despite the effort to move unhoused people out of the downtown area, Shalom Ministries, which is centrally located, has not experienced a decline in need for meals or the other services provided. Clothing, coats, hats, gloves, shoes, blankets and sleeping bags are distributed to the guests. It is anticipated that the need will be great this winter as shelter space is extremely limited.

Community Health Association of Spokane outreach workers and health professionals from the street medicine team assist diners with housing, addiction recovery referrals and support, along with on-site medical care. Frontier Behavioral Health's outreach team comes on-site to assist guests with mental health services.

Volunteer opportunities:

- Meal service: Six meals are served weekly, four breakfasts and two dinner meals. St. Mark's members serve every day and would be glad to help you join the team.
- Food is provided by Second Harvest Food Bank and Northwest Harvest.
 Volunteers are greatly needed to help pick up, unload and put away the large amounts of food needed.
- Shalom Ministries volunteers Peg Johnson and Anne Stuyvesant Whigham

have created Project Warm Blanket. Participants will be meeting monthly to make blankets for people in need. Each blanket takes about two hours to complete and costs approximately \$20.

- Obtaining, sorting and distributing clothing and other items is an additional opportunity to help Shalom's guests.

This forum was hosted by the CEO of Rockwood and included Beth Jarrett alongside Rockwood residents and other community members. Topics of discussion included diversity of belief among people of faith and the welcome St. Mark's extends to all people, including those who have been marginalized for their sexuality or gender identity.

Pastor Edwin was honored to accept the invitation to speak in furtherance of his calling to "witness to the Kingdom of God in the community... and speak publicly to the world in solidarity with the poor and oppressed, calling for justice and proclaiming God's love for the world." (St. Mark's constitution)

<u>OUTREACH</u> through the Babylon, Gethsemane, Eden, Manito (BGEM) Gardens

Thanks to all who volunteered to grow, tend and harvest our garden boxes and ensure that there would be fresh produce for our SPEAR friends!

2024 was a terrific growing year! Our gardeners harvested produce for 14 weeks beginning July 7 and concluding on October 6. The garden was 'put to bed' on Oct. 12.

Crops for the year (16): arugula, green beans, carrots, Swiss chard, cucumbers, herbs (basil, cilantro, marjoram), kale, lettuce, jalapeno peppers, radishes, snow peas, spinach, yellow squash and four varieties of tomatoes.

Quantity: An estimated 111 lbs. of tomatoes, carrots, cucumbers, squash, peas and beans were harvested, along with 16 quarts of arugula, lettuce, spinach, kale, chard and also 16 lunch bags of herbs.

ADVOCACY

Stewards of Creation team members were excited that the three ELCA Bishops of Washington all supported the retention of Washington's Climate Commitment Act in this year's election. The Bishops' written statement translated to an encouragement of a No vote on 2117 as an act of faith in line with our call to earth stewardship.

As we learn more during ongoing implementation of this critical piece of legislation, the Climate Commitment Act can be amended and improved, but should not be retracted.

He was even able to match the wood stain and the metal work to coordinate with the items made by local artist Harold Balazs. This project included the installation of the railing as well. REPORT OF THE FALL 2024 SYNOD COUNCIL MEETING

The Northwest Intermountain Synod Council met on September 6-7, 2024, at St. Mark's to address the business of the synod.

One of the key appointments was Greg Steeber, from Faith Lutheran in Leavenworth, WA, to the Congregation Constitution Review Committee. While Greg's appointment was confirmed, the committee continues to seek additional members.

Several committee appointments were also confirmed, including Cory English from Calvary Lutheran in Post Falls, ID, to the Global Mission Committee, and Sarah Bates of Grace Lutheran, Wenatchee, WA and Wayne Stevens of New Day Lutheran, Idaho Falls, ID to Bishop Manlove's Mutual Ministry Committee to serve alongside Kate LePard and other members.

A notable decision was the adoption of a three-year cycle for synod assemblies and regional gatherings. This cycle includes an inperson assembly in Year A and online assemblies with regional gatherings in Years B and C. However, this plan remains flexible; for instance, if a bishop election arises, an in-person assembly could be convened.

The council also approved synod sabbatical policy guidelines and shared a sample model

policy for congregations to follow. Other personnel matters included a 2.5% wage increase for Ministers of Word and Sacrament and Ministers of Word and Service, to align with anticipated Social Security cost-of-living adjustments. Additionally, the council approved a \$5 increase per service for pulpit supply compensation. These compensation changes will become effective in the new year.

Four new working groups were created to tackle key areas. These include researching funding for Lutheran Campus Ministries, conducting a deep dive into compensation guidelines for rostered ministers, reviewing the synod's website, and planning for the sabbatical of the executive assistant of the Synod, Cathy Steiner. Updates were received from the EcoFaith Action Network, and there was discussion around stewardship, mission support, and an upcoming revision of the synod constitution regarding bishop elections.

St. Mark's has TWO members on Synod Council. Pastor Edwin Weber serves as one of the at-large clergy members, and Randy Darst serves as synod secretary.
