Ash Wednesday: February 14 Worship at noon and 7 p.m.

From the Pastor's Desk

Recently, some of you have asked me to share ahead of time which parts of the liturgy will be included, or not, in our seasonal plan for the 8:30 worship. So! In order to do so, I would like to start by inviting you to take a look at page 92 in the red hymnal (Evangelical Lutheran Worship, ELW).

You will find that elements of our Sunday liturgy are listed, some of them in bold and others in regular font. The four major headings read: Gathering, Word, Sending, Meal. Together, these are the fundamental shape of Lutheran Worship. Even as many of us grew up without the Meal weekly, the recovery of this practice has been a reformation back to Luther's theology, the availability of pastors weekly and the necessity of being fed with sacrament as well as scripture every week. If we no longer have pastors available weekly, I could see this changing again in some places.



As noted at the bottom of ELW page 92, the bold elements of worship are central, whereas the unbolded elements are lovely and supportive, but unessential. This might be a first step as to understanding why there are times when we choose to worship with various slight alterations in the elements, while the overarching pattern stays the same. Just in case you do not have an ELW available just now, the elements that are considered less essential are:

Now, it might be fun to see how many of the other liturgical elements you can remember without looking! The rest are considered central. That said, there is also plenty of practice in our Lutheran tradition of using less than all four readings or a shortened Communion liturgy (often skipping large portions of the Great Thanksgiving). And you may notice that the Gathering Song is considered one element that includes 4 alternatives: a hymn, a psalm, the kyrie and/or the canticle of praise. At Salem we usually do both a hymn and the kyrie and the canticle of praise.

Many of the changes we make on a seasonal basis are for the purpose of fitting our liturgy within an hour (or so). We have recently added 5 minutes to our radio broadcast so our radio worshippers have a better chance of hearing our announcements, but most of you have not advocated (yet) for a 1 hour, 20 minute service, or longer. (I smile as I imagine it!) We certainly might have holy envy for our Black Church brothers and sisters who are far less concerned with limiting the worship time, lest they limit the Spirit's movement among us.

All that said, you may find that we share with you what is upcoming for the season in a Friday email periodically. We will be curious if this feels truly helpful, or if we decide it is unnecessary and that going with the flow is a spiritual practice we might like to adopt. Either way! I am grateful for your interest, asking for what you need and, most of all, your desire for worship to be a place you can connect with God and each other.

Council President's Message

Greetings, Salem!

As your new council president, I look forward to my role as sounding board and liaison for the congregation. I am excited about the recently elected council and our goals for the year.

One of our first priorities as a council is to increase engagement (you'll see that buzzword throughout the year). We are hoping to increase internal engagement among the people who choose to worship at Salem, along with engaging the wider community by being open and welcoming to those who choose to join us, whether they are joining us for a season or for a lifetime.

As part of the year-long call process, the council and call committee followed guidelines set forth by the synod based on previous successes and research. The congregational vote during the annual meeting was the final step of that process. Now that the call is settled, the council, Pastor Kirsten and everyone in the congregation can move forward to advance other priorities with confidence and enthusiasm.

My hope as your council president is that you feel comfortable coming to me with your hopes for Salem, your feedback and your concerns.

I grew up Presbyterian who mostly attended church on Christmas and Easter. Lutheran World Relief Quilt Project

Let all you do be done in love. 1 Corinthians 16:14

We will begin assembling quilts on Ash Wednesday, February 14, demonstrating our love for our brothers and sisters in need.

Prior to that date, ways to help may be to sew a 60" x 80" top (precut squares are available for this) using good, darker-colored fabric. The size is important as they fold and bale the quilts for shipping. Also needed are flat sheets, twin size, in good condition. The quilts are used for warmth and shelter, overhead and flooring, which we keep in mind when making quilts.

Please try to keep Wednesday mornings available if you are able to help tie the quilts from 9 a.m.-noon. If afternoon is preferred, that may also be used. Also needed are those able to take a tied quilt home and sew around the edges. It could be pinned and ready for sewing if desired.

Many members assist with this project in many and various ways, and in time we will recognize them, beginning with Nancy Street and Linda G. Tenneson.



More Answers About the Potential Outpost

The Greater St. Cloud Public Safety Foundation was founded in 2015 by community leaders. It is a 501c3 non-profit entity. The mission of the Foundation is to be the leading advocate of public safety in Benton, Sherburne and Stearns counties. More information is available at www.gscsafety.org.

Survey of East Side Neighbors

- Survey was funded by the Salem Lutheran Church Foundation
- In Sept.-Nov. 2023 a survey was conducted in the East Side
- 198 community members completed the survey
- 36% of respondents told us there were times they needed to see a healthcare provider and did not go
- Accessibility was a primary barrier to accessing healthcare on the East side
- Conclusions are backed up by CentraCare data as well

Phase 1: Minute Clinic

• Small medical clinic, much like a "minute clinic," that can provide basic services and assist residents in getting additional medical support needed.

The following questions have been raised in conversations between the Church and the Foundation, and we respectfully provide information in response.

Why are you interested in using the church? Have other buildings been considered?

We have looked at several properties in the East St. Cloud neighborhood. Salem Lutheran Church is in a desirable, visible location. The Public Safety Foundation Outpost could support the church by repurposing and sharing space.

What would be the length of a lease?

The Foundation is interested in a multi-year lease. Typically a lease would be in the 3-5 year range, with the option to extend if it works for both parties.

What will it cost for Salem?

The Foundation will be responsible for the renovation/buildout of the spaces leased as well as the ongoing cost of utilities used. We are happy to work with the Church in evaluating options for the space needs of the Church. Our aim would be to identify cost offsets to help lower the church's operating expenses.

What safety and security measures will be taken?

The Outpost will be a private facility and access will be controlled by the Foundation. The public spaces in the Outpost will be completely separate from church spaces. Access between these spaces will be through locked doors accessible only by designated individuals. The public will not be able to access the church space through Foundation space.

How will shared space be monitored?

When the Outpost is open, it will be monitored by St. Cloud Police Department, the Public Safety Foundation and others who are contracted to provide services.

The areas used by the Outpost, and parts of the surrounding neighborhood, will have video cameras monitored 24/7 by the St. Cloud Police Department, improving overall security in the area.

What are the legalities – city codes, etc. – for leasing property?

All lease agreements and space renovations will be in 100% compliance with current codes and laws.

How will parking for funerals and other church events be handled?

We aim to have open communication with the church regarding schedules and needs for parking, and are happy to accommodate those needs through scheduling hours and services in the Outpost.

Who is responsible for property liability?

The Foundation and its partners will be responsible for all insurance needed for the Outpost space and the services provided there.

How will signage be handled?

Ideally, the entrance on the north side of the church will be the public entrance to the Outpost. The remodeling/build out of the space will include new signage that clearly identifies the Outpost public entrance.

What is the timeline for the project?

We have no specific timeline for this project and defer to the church's timeline for considering the project and making a decision.

Welcome, New Salem Staff!

After a year in the interim role, **Pastor Kirsten Nelson Roenfeldt** has been called to the position of Senior Pastor. As she shared in her acceptance letter:

"I am thrilled to accept the call to serve you as your Senior Pastor. I hope that in the near future, we can look forward to making new connections between us and with our neighborhood. Congregational ministry is a partnership between pastor and people, and I envision a partnership that is rich and varied with all of your gifts and passions.

During the call process, I was invited to share my top priorities for ministry in the next year:

- 1. **Intentional Hospitality.** When new folks show up, how do we intentionally welcome them and invite them into ministry? How do we use our physical presence on the East Side to welcome our neighborhood to experience the love of Christ?
- 2. **10:30 Worship.** It is time to more clearly define what this worship community is seeking to be and to invite folks who do not have a church home to find it here. We can be something unique in the St. Cloud area.
- 3. **Storytelling.** Salem's history matters. It has a rich legacy of generosity, outreach and music ministry. How do we understand our last forty years of history, since we wrote our centennial book? How can we tell our own story in ways that empower us for God's promised future?

I continue to pray for God's wisdom and discernment as we embark on being church together in a new way for this new season of Salem's life. Please pray with me, set aside precious time for discernment of God's voice. The next ten years will be something to celebrate as we reach the 150th anniversary of Salem's mission and ministry.

Are You Grieving the Church?

This excerpt from Pastor Kirsten's 2022 annual report is relevant to today, and a good read if you're missing the church that once was.

Over the last 20 years, it has become apparent that our country and our world has changed. Going to church does not have the same significance in people's weekly lives that it once did. Being part of a church community is now an unusual act, especially for Generation X, Millennials, Gen Z and younger. Each and every youth and child that is in church is part of a family who has found the commitment to do something counter-cultural, as many of you can attest, as you look at your friends or listen to your own children and grandchildren step away from the church and our life together.

Our church is not what it once was. Our congregation has not escaped the trends of our culture or society. The ways we organize ourselves into community seems to be shifting away from churches, and towards something else. Or maybe nothing at all, which is incredibly sad.

I want to tell you that I am grieving this. I was ordained over 10 years ago and have served the church for over 20 years as an adult. In those last 20 years, I too have denied, gotten angry, bargained, been depressed and finally accepted that the church I knew in my childhood, the church I thought I was called to pastor, does not exist anymore. That church is gone.

And while I won't patronize you, or myself, by telling you that something better is in its place, I will repeat the promise that God has given us in the cross.

Hope springs eternal. There is new life after death, whether that death is someone we love who has found themselves in God's perpetual light, or if that death is an image of what we once knew, or wished to be true. Our hope for tomorrow is found in Jesus Christ, the resurrection and the life. Our hope for today is found there too. And so we have a great gift with which to live, to breathe, to have our being, together as community: the gift of the real presence of God in our world.

God is here. God is moving in the world. And even if it doesn't look just as we wish. Even if I will never pastor the kind of church I thought I was stepping into, and we will have to let go of our image of what we thought the church was, that was never the hope we held to in the cross in the first place. Our hope is far stronger than "bums in the pews" or graph charts.

I am grateful that together we have listened to each other and to the wider community this past year, and that listening will continue, especially through the Faithful Innovations Team and now the transition process.

I want to be clear, my door is always open for listening and sharing dreams and hopes for God's work here and our partnership together in ministry. And my role will be to listen, and also to give space for us all to discern together Salem's next steps. My focus is on being your pastor as God calls me to do so at this moment, in finding meaning in our ministry together here and now.
