Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Following much careful consideration, the dispensation for Sunday Mass obligation has been lifted and beginning the weekend of Sept. 19 and 20, all Catholics will once again gather as a community of faith on Sundays. The lifting of the dispensation was announced in a decree issued by Bishop David Ricken on Monday, Sept. 7. (see page 5 or visit www.gbdioc.org/sundayobligationdecree)

With this news, please note there are still occasions when the obligation to attend Sunday Mass does not apply:

- + If individual Catholics struggle with serious health concerns or are physically or morally prevented from worshipping at Mass for a grave reason.
- + If individuals are frail due to illness or age or, in their well-formed consciences believe that going into public places -- including Sunday worship at Mass -- would place their health or the health of their loved ones in serious jeopardy.
- + If individuals are sick, or have been in contact with someone who has been sick.

The faithful who are unable to attend Mass are urged to make holy the Lord's Day and to pray, read the Scriptures, watch a broadcast or livestreamed Mass and take part in acts of charity.

The diocese also issued guidelines for public Masses at www.gbdioc.org/sundayobligationreinstatement. These guidelines make clear that face masks are still required, and that, while restrictions will be lifted on the percentage of people at Mass, the standards of social distancing will still be upheld.

The obligation to attend Mass for Catholics reflects our faith in Jesus Christ, the blessing of the Holy Eucharist and an acknowledgment of His great love for us.

Pastoral Ponderings

Why is it we are so quick to notice our neighbor's offense, and so slow to admit our own? Living the entire Christian



to face with the not-so-pleasant parts of our character. If we're honest, we'd much rather overturn tables, like Jesus in the Temple, than offer forgiveness, like Jesus on the cross. Yet countless centuries of wisdom points to the primacy of mercy over anger. The words from the Book of Sirach couldn't be plainer: "Forgive your neighbor's injustice; then when you pray, your own sins will be forgiven. Could anyone nourish anger against another and expect healing from the Lord?"

Jesus illuminates this expectation of his disciples, requiring us to forgive time and again. But how often do I "nourish anger" instead, feeding it my attention and emotional energy? The more we hold on to our bitterness, the more we become enslaved to it. The parable of the unforgiving servant is a lesson for all of us, especially if we forget the magnitude of God's mercy towards us, and the priceless gift of becoming His sons and daughters in baptism. How do we live forgiveness as individuals? As a community? As a society?

For many people, our social and political climate is bringing out the worst in us. Predictably, these conflicts compound the very real health and economic concerns that are at the forefront of our minds. When we are already stressed out and worried, our reserves of understanding and compassion begin to run low, particularly when we can't express affection or re-charge in the ways that we normally would among family and friends.

To make matters worse, there are those who play to our basest instincts. Social media feeds us a customized stream of partial truth, locking us into our pre-conceived biases. News reports jump breathlessly from one crisis to the next, dampening hope for a better tomorrow. Political leaders and even some clergy prey upon our fears, painting our neighbors as enemies to be vanguished. Others exploit our differences to demolish any common ground; even listening to another person's perspective or experience is considered a betraval.

In spite of this broken world – because of this broken world – we have to be better. We are called to bring the light of forgiveness, understanding, reconciliation.

Among other things, Catholics must bring a consistent witness to the sanctity of life into the public square. We examine social issues in the light of the Gospel, not simply our preferred political narrative. We are obliged to attend to our own blind spots, to confront our personal sin, as well as social and institutional injustices. Our faith does not fit neatly into any political party, nor should it.

As we search together for answers - in ending our pandemic, in eliminating racial prejudice, in protecting the dignity of the unborn and the vulnerable, in confronting economic inequity, in caring for creation - we do so with regard for people as uniquely created and loved by God. Even when we disagree, may we banish anger and cultivate goodwill. And may we be always ready to extend mercy, as mercy has been so richly given to us.

DECREE

The Return of the Sunday Mass Obligation

With Christian joy and faith in our Lord Jesus Christ, the time has come for Catholics to return to worship God at Mass on Sundays.

On March 13th, 2020, I granted a dispensation from the obligation to worship at Sunday Mass during the month of March for Catholics living within the Diocese of Green Bay. A few days later, on March 17th, 2020, the public celebration of Mass was suspended throughout the Diocese and the dispensation from the Sunday obligation was extended indefinitely. Since that time, the faithful have not been obligated to worship at Mass on Sundays and even with the resumption of limited public worship, certain restrictions regarding the numbers in attendance have precluded the lifting of this dispensation.

Now, since the dispensation from the obligation to worship at Mass on Sunday is no longer strictly necessary, the faithful will once again be morally obligated to come to Mass on Sundays throughout the Diocese. (Canon 898) Thus, the obligation will resume on the weekend of September 19th and 20th, 2020 – the 25th Sunday in Ordinary Time.

Since the Mass is the entering into the one and infinite sacrifice of Jesus Christ on the Cross, and thus a sacred meal by which we are spiritually nourished with His Body and Blood, the obligation to gather together as a Christian community to worship on Sundays is a natural reflection of our faith as His disciples. Worshipping together at Mass as God's people is also beneficial both spiritually and psychologically as we support one another in our Christian lives. Thus, the healthy practice of Sunday worship is a blessing that we must continue.

As has always been the case, if individual Catholics struggle with serious health concerns or are physically or morally prevented from worshipping at Mass for a grave reason, this obligation does not apply. Additionally, if individuals are frail due to illness or age or, in their well-formed consciences believe that going into public places - including Sunday worship at Mass - would place their health or the health of their loved ones in serious jeopardy, they too are not bound by this obligation. Furthermore, if the occupancy limits have already been reached in a given Mass which preclude safe social distancing, the obligation does not apply. However, the faithful who are unable to attend Mass are nevertheless urged to make holy the Lord's Day and to pray, read the Scriptures, and take part in acts of charity.

Jesus said, "I am the living bread come down from Heaven. Whoever eats this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world." (John 6:51) As Catholics, we gladly return to the altar of God to receive the Bread of Life from the one who gives healing and joy to our hearts.
