One of the most frequent comments I hear from people is "I didn't realize you did that". Most people are aware that the Fulton County Health Department

(FCHD) is a place you can get many vaccinations including



flu for children and adults. Most people are also aware that your Health Department inspects restaurants. But you may not know that the FCHD works in partnership with many businesses, agencies and community members to provide a variety of programs and services to residents of our community.

An example of this collaboration is the 2013 Community Health Improvement Plan that was developed based on your responses to the 2012 Community Health Assessment (a questionnaire sent randomly to Fulton County residents). Four priority health issues have been identified, and a plan to address these health priorities is in place. Together we can reach a goal of a healthier Fulton County. The current priority health issues for Fulton County are:

- 1. Adult & Youth Obesity
- 2. Adult Cardiovascular Health
- 3. Adult & Youth Depression & Suicide
- 4. Youth Bullying

There are also numerous examples of pooling resources and agency collaboration. The regional Breast and Cervical Cancer project, the Fulton County Family First Council (Help Me Grow) and Drug Free Communities pro-

jects are examples housed at your Health Department. These programs continuously address identified needs and implement successful interventions to better serve the youth, adults and families of Fulton County.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank you for your continued support of the public health levy. You may be aware that your Health Department is partially funded by monies generated by two 0.5 mil levies. However, you may not know that nearly two-thirds of your Health Department's income is from staff secured grants, user fees and other funds, helping the local economy.

Welcome to your 2013 Fulton County Health Department Annual Report. Revisit the services that you know about, and discover many more.

WIC (Women, Infants and Children)

You may be aware that WIC is a nutrition program...BUT did you know that nursing moms can call WIC if they have issues even if they do not qualify for WIC.

WIC is a nutrition education program. WIC provides nutritious foods which promote good health for pregnant women, women who just had a baby, breastfeeding moms, infants and children up to age five.

In March (National Nutrition Month), WIC staff stressed the theme "Eat Right, Your Way Every Day" through nutrition education, bulletin boards, marquees, website and facebook.

This is open to not only WIC participants but also to the public.

IMMUNIZATION HIGHLIGHTS

For years, vaccines from the Federal Government's Vaccine for Children (VFC) program made it possible for the Health Department to protect our kids from childhood diseases. Vaccines were not covered by insurance plans, so this program made vaccinations affordable for all. With changes in health care, insurances are now required to cover the costs of vaccines. During 2013, local health departments were told they can no longer give these vaccines to privately insured children. The vaccines are still available to those who do not have insurance coverage.

Knowing that families may not have a way to get immunizations, even if they have insurance, your Health Department has taken steps to purchase vaccines from manufacturers. We also secured contracts with several insurance plans so vaccine costs can be billed to insurance. We continue our efforts to contract with more insurance plans and are working to make immunizations affordable for families.

Another change to FCHD immunization services involved moving to appointment clinics. This was necessary because it now takes longer to check insurance information and eligibility. Clients are served more efficiently and appreciate not waiting in line with their little ones.

You may know that your Health Department provides Reproductive Health and Wellness services to women...BUT did you know that we offer services to men also.

You may know that your Health Department school nurses check children's hearing and vision...BUT did you know that the nurses at the Health Department also provide this service at no charge for children and adults.





