While some of these writers may be new to you, others you may know quite well: Eugene Peterson, whose translation of Scripture and pastoral wisdom have helped us hear the Bible in a fresh, grounded voice. Anne Lamott, with her raw honesty, irreverent humor, and deep faith in grace that meets us exactly where we are (but doesn't leave us there). Frederick Buechner, whose poetic prose reminds us to pay attention to our lives — because it is there that God

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
speaks. Kathleen Norris, who finds the sacred in laundry, deserts, and silence, teaching us that holiness often hides in the ordinary.

Each Sunday, we'll sit with one of these writers—alongside a passage of Scripture—and listen for what the Spirit might be saying to us today. We'll explore themes like grace, doubt, calling, suffering, joy, and the beauty of being human in God's image. My hope is that their stories, questions, and hard-won insights will inspire our own.

I also hope this series feels like a gathering. A room full of friends, yes—but also a reminder that we, too, are part of that circle; that our faith journey is never meant to be lived alone; and that God is always speaking—sometimes through ancient prophets, sometimes through messy memoirs, and often through each other.

So, come this summer. Bring your questions, your weariness, your hope. Pull up a chair in this room full of friends. There's a place for you here.














HISTORIC RECOGNITION

The June Mission focus is AMOS feeding week, June 23-26, discussed elsewhere in this newsletter. The July Mission focus will be specific food needs for Church Street Café, particularly for our guests with children home from school for the summer, so without subsidized meals at school. More info on that to come, via the weekly emails.

As announced in the weekly email, the Emergency Community Support Fund could use your help! This fund is used to help those in urgent need of assistance with utilities in our community. The fund balance is very low. Please contribute, as you are able. All funds are sent directly to the utility, not to individuals or families. Donations should be sent to Heather in the church office, or placed in the offering plate, marked ECSF. Thank you!

The Mission & Creation Care Committee recently concluded our other major mission project, other than Church Street Café (which of course goes on all year): we awarded grants from the Mission Endowment Fund to five organizations. This fund was made possible by the sale of church manse, over 25 years ago; each year we spend \$6,000 of the earnings of the fund to award grants to local, regional, or international mission partners. Here are the awardees this year, and the projects for which they applied for funding:

- I. Our friends Bruce and Deb Robinson, working in Northwest Haiti, towards moving and rebuilding a portion of an irrigation canal so that the families in that area can continue irrigating to grow food for their families.
- 2. Fourth Judicial District Recovery Services, towards maintenance or replacement of the driveway or AC unit or other needs at the Recovery Cabin.
- 3. Habitat for Humanity of Jefferson County, towards the Critical Home Repairs program.
- 4. Isaiah II7 House Jefferson County, towards replacing the deteriorating flooring.
- 5. Senior Citizens Home Assistance Service, Jefferson County, to provide up to 250 hours of in-home caregiving and case management services through their Equitable Access Financial Aid Program.

In addition to the financial award, all of these mission partners have requested our prayers. Please pray for all their endeavors; specific requests will be profiled in future newsletters this year. Thank you!

We chose to retain \$1,000 of the fund for other needs that might arise this calendar year, such as what happened last year with Hurricane Helene. We hope we will not need it for such a disaster, and are sure we will be able to find a worthy recipient!

Two challenges for you, for June and July:

Summer is a great time to eat out with your family. How do you choose the restaurant? When you decide on a restaurant, do you check to see if the restaurant uses locally-produced food instead of buying it from thousands of miles away? Your challenge this month is to check out the restaurants in your town and then support those which provide more healthy, local options which also care for God's creation. The more customers inquire about their food sources, the more demand it causes for locally grown and sustainably produced items.

Have you heard about Fair Trade products? Fair Trade allows farmers and farm workers to receive a fair salary-a just salary-not just the minimum that consumers are willing to pay which often is hot enough to live on. When they enjoy better living conditions, farmers and farmworkers may avail themselves of health services and send their children to school (rather than keeping them on the farm to work from a very young age). The leading Fair Trade products are coffee and chocolate, but there are also teas, rice, spices, and bananas. All colors of glass are accepted, but please remove caps and lids; you do NOT have to remove labels. No window glass, just bottles and jars, please. The glass will be delivered to the Blount County recycling center, where they crush it to use in their asphalt and road paint.
