



Missions

Just a reminder, the September Mission focus was the PCUSA Peace and Global Witness offering, that we will collect on World Communion Sunday, October 5. Please be generous!

Each congregation may retain 25% of the offering collected to support peacemaking efforts in their local communities. Your Mission and Creation Care Committee has decided the recipient will be HOLA Lakeway, a nonprofit organization serving immigrant and multicultural families in rural East Tennessee. HOLA provides programs that promote education, equity, and belonging, including youth tutoring and literacy support, adult ESL and workforce readiness, family engagement, and mental health initiatives like art therapy. To date, HOLA has supported nearly 10,000 families, continuing its mission to build opportunity, foster belonging, and create stronger, more inclusive communities.

The Mission Focus for October is our Emergency Community Support Fund. This fund is used to help those in urgent need of assistance with utilities in our community. The fund has less than \$1,500 left in it. Please contribute, as you are able. All funds are sent directly to the utility, not to individuals or families. Donations should be sent to Heather in the church office, or placed in the offering plate, marked ECSF. Thank you!

"There was a rich man who was dressed in purple and fine linen and who feasted sumptuously every day. And at his gate lay a poor man named Lazarus, covered with sores, who longed to satisfy his hunger with what fell from the rich man's table." -Luke 16:19-21

Two thousand years after Jesus told this parable the inequality between the rich and the poor is even more scandalous. With modern agricultural knowledge and good stewardship of natural resources, the earth can produce enough food to feed all of its population. What it can't do is feed the entire population at the level of wasteful extravagance some live today. By eating lower on the food chain and eating food that is grown more sustainably we free up resources for more people to be fed. This week, shop at a farmer's market, switch a conventional purchase to an organic one (e.g. organic milk instead of non-organic), 'eat a few more vegetarian meals, or choose popcorn, dried fruit, or nuts for a simple shack instead of a highly packaged and processed treat. © The Pastoral Center / PastoralCenter.com.
