This summer we enjoyed our first 1-Day VBS for All Ages using materials provided by Mt. Horeb Elementary School – materials they used for a reading night focused on the life of the honeybee. After the success of our VBS, the Education, Fellowship & Congregational Care Committee agreed that we would partner with MHES on their next reading night so that we might use their materials for our next VBS, which we hope to host in June 2024. So, here is our opportunity! MHES is hosting a reading night on Thursday, November 9 from 5:00 pm-6:30 pm. The book walk is all about monarch butterflies: their migration, how scientists discovered where monarchs go in the winter, and what we can do to help the endangered monarchs. MHES is thrilled to partner with FPC to run activity tables throughout the book walk. Volunteers will serve alongside faculty to create crafts, study migration, and learn about ways to save the monarchs. 

For 70 years, SERRV has made it a priority to ensure that artisans and farmers living in poverty are treated with respect and dignity, and are paid fairly for their work. SERRV has a mission to create a more sustainable world for both their current artisan and farmer partners and future generations. On the Sustainability page on the SERRV website: 'Fair trade, by definition, is more sustainable than conventional business. Items are made on a small scale and by hand, which employs people rather than machines and reduces electricity use. Artisans and farmers use their income to improve their housing, educate their children, feed their families, and invest in their communities-creating and sustaining lifestyles with low carbon footprints. With fair trade, decisions are made at the local level so community values and needs are reflected in the process rather than distant profit-making decisions, which too often cause negative environmental impacts.'

Our Sunday school classes Follow Me uses the PC(USA) curriculum, Follow Me, which is based on practices lesus modeled. Written for people of all ages who wish to live

out their faith, this curriculum examines where these practices are found in the Bible, and how they have been used in Christian faith – then and now.

Currently, we have 4 Sunday school classes. There are 2 adult classes. The Parlor Class meets in the parlor and starts at 9:30 a.m. It is a hybrid class offered in person and on Zoom, that utilizes a reflection guide for each unit. The Upper Room Class meets on the 2nd floor, starts at 9:45 a.m., and examines biblical practices through video and audio options of the curriculum. The Youth Class meets in the library, starts at 9:45 a.m., and incorporates videos, music, and occasional off-site mission activities as part of the morning's lesson. Little Presbyterians meets on the 2nd floor, starts at 9:45 a.m., and explores Scripture through games, art, music, and reading. If you do not currently participate in Sunday school, now would be a great time to join other believers – of all ages – as we learn to live out our faith together.

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS (OCTOBER 15, 2023)

- Session held Elder Training using the book "Canoeing the Mountains", parts 1-3.
- Approved the minutes for August 20 Stated Session Meeting, Called Congregational Meeting of September 10, email voting meeting of August 21 concerning purchasing CSC carts and email voting meeting of September 20 concerning pay for an interim pianist.
- Approved a Called Congregational Meeting for November 12th to approve the Ruling Elder Class 2026. Proposed members include Peggy Hypes, Esther O'Hare and Martha Sanders.
- Received Standing Committee reports. Worship is planning All Saints Day on November 5, December 24
 Christmas Eve Pajama Party in evening worship and a visit from Grace Notes on February 25, 2024. Recent
 activities of the committee were Blessing of the Animals and Founders Day, which included a bagpiper
 and presenting 11 clan tartan banners.
- Fellowship is in the final stages of completing its calendar of fellowship opportunities. A fellowship event
 was held after the service on Founders Day.
- Mission reported impending changes to the CSC program. Midwest Foods will no longer be able to use warehouse space in Morristown as a distribution point. As of now, an alternative location is arranged for October but less food can be handled and no frozen foods. This means no meat goods to be received. Big changes may be required in this program. Two Hunger Grants have been submitted to Holston Presbytery, for ODRINO/Haiti and CSC. Other recent activities include PCUSA Peace and Global Witness offering, Creation Care providing items for two local animal shelters and a shredding/recycling day.
- Finance reported an encouraging response to the Stewardship Campaign. A few pledge cards are still pending. Monthly income is still below budget requirements, \$9,400 versus a needed \$16,100. Cash flow is still manageable.
- The property committee reported several accomplishments. The Audio-Video cameras have been replaced, at no cost, and seem to be performing better. The committee did considerable cleanup on a workday. Benches were cleaned and repairs were made as needed. Trees and ground cover were trimmed and cleaned up as needed.
- Received the Pastors Report as information. Dr. Hollingshead will be out of the office for two weeks in October for knee surgery, vacation from December 25-31, and study leave January 1-7. She has many projects underway to include planning for a Confirmation Class in December, working on worship music options until an interim pianist is found, and special services like All Saint's and Blue Christmas.
- The Book of Order requires an annual review of the membership roll to determine the status of members who have lost contact with the church. This review was completed, and a letter was approved to be sent to these members asking how they desired session to categorize their relationship going forward.
- With Dr. Hollingshead out of the office through Sunday, January 7, the Session voted not to have communion on January 7.
- Reviewed the church calendars for November and December. A few additions were made, and the calendars approved.
- Annual church retreat is scheduled for January 26-28, 2024. Registration deadline is December 17, 2023.
 More information will be coming soon.
- Session elected Beth Folsom as 2024 Clerk of Session.
