speaker—things my grandmother could never have imagined but would surely have loved. In large ways and in small ways, I pray this Christmas brings you a special measure of the things you love.

Green Plate Delights #9 Colorful Roasted Sheet-Pan Vegetables, by Katie Webster

Ingredients

3 cups cubed butternut squash (1 inch)

4 cups broccoli florets

2 teaspoons Italian seasoning or herbes de Provence

¼ teaspoon pepper

3 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil, divided

2 red bell peppers, cut into squares

1 teaspoon coarse kosher salt

1 tablespoon best-quality balsamic vinegar


Instructions

- 1. Preheat oven to 425°F.
- 2. Toss squash and 1 tablespoon oil in a large bowl. Spread out on a large rimmed baking sheet. Roast for 10 minutes.
- 3. Meanwhile, toss broccoli, bell peppers, onion, Italian seasoning (or herbes de Provence), salt and pepper in the bowl with the remaining 2 tablespoons olive oil until the vegetables are evenly coated.
- 4. Add the squash to the vegetables in the bowl. Toss to combine. Spread the vegetables out on 2 large rimmed baking sheets, dividing evenly. Roast, stirring once or twice, until the vegetables are tender and browned in spots, 17 to 20 minutes. Drizzle with vinegar.

Notes: This recipe makes 8 servings. When roasting vegetables, they should be in a single layer with some space around each. This allows air to circulate around them so that they brown and crisp evenly. Overcrowding the vegetables will steam them instead of roasting them. For the best results, use two large rimmed baking sheets for roasting.

Store in an airtight container and refrigerate for up to 3 days.

THE PROPERTY LINE



After several years of bureaucracy, delays and perseverance our church has been added to the National Register Of Historic Places. The Committee is working with Morristown Signs to create a bronze plaque in commemoration of our special place. The plaque will be added to the left side of the exterior Sanctuary doors along Church Street. And while we are at it, we will be replacing the church hours sign on the right side since its frame is starting to deteriorate.

There is a possibility of a very noticeable landscaping change to the Prayer Garden side of the grounds. For a few years now the Committee has discussed tree health (e.g. cherry, hackberry, holly, crape myrtle ...) and the various tree's relationship with the utility wires.

Well, the Committee has approved a proposal to address our concerns. The quick version looks like this: the four cherry trees at the Branner & Deborah Street corner will be removed and their stumps ground; trees along the Deborah Street utility wires will be trimmed; the hackberry and crape myrtles near the building will be trimmed; and the two cherry trees on the Church and Branner Street corner will be trimmed.

This is not an inexpensive proposition. Moreover, Session will need to approve the work outlined in the proposal. So be on the lookout throughout this month for an update on this project.






Christmas Season Hymn Sing & Epiphany The 12 Days of Christmas ends on |anuary 5th, followed by Epiphany on January 6th. To celebrate these important dates on the liturgical calendar, on Sunday, January 5th, worship will begin with a Christmas Hymn Sing. Then, we will turn our attention to Epiphany, which is the day the church celebrates the arrival of the magi, who were led to Jesus by a star. Because the image of the star is so significant, many churches have started a new spiritual practice to mark the New Year. It is the practice of handing out "star words," and we are going to join the fun. The idea is that a list of intention words, or guiding words, are printed on small cards that are decorated with a star. The star words are then distributed randomly. You will be invited to take the star home and place it where you will see it regularly. Use the word as a focal point of prayer and allow it to accompany you throughout the year.
