THE WORK OF CHRISTMAS

We tend to make plans and set goals or intentions for things we might do better, learn more about, etc. A good question for Christians to ask is: "In 2024, what does God expect of me?" Ouch! So here is your New Year's invitation: Set aside some time to ponder God's yearnings for you in this new year that is filled with possibilities. Might attending church regularly be an area in which you need to grow? Is the Spirit nudging you to deepen your faith through spiritual disciplines like prayer and silence? Perhaps God is leading you to spend more time studying Scripture and learning with other believers. It could be that serving others is something God has laid upon your heart. Take time to record how you are feeling led and then, make God's intentions for you a matter of daily focus.


As your pastor, I pray that throughout this New Year we have been gifted, each of us will continue the work of Christmas.

A "SAVE THE PLANET" MOMENT

Did you know that Tennessee is still in a drought, despite recent rains? Here are some tips for conserving water. How many of these do you do already? What more could you do?

- Wash dishes in your dishwasher (especially if it's Energy STAR-rated): washing by hand uses an average of 27 gallons of water, and the dishwasher only 3 gallons!
- Install a water-saving showerhead and take quick showers. An average shower uses 10 gallons of water.
- This one is easy: do you turn off the faucet when brushing your teeth? Or washing your face? Don't let the water run except when you actually need it to rinse.
- Install low-flush toilets, which can reduce the amount of water used by up to 30%.
- Make sure your clothes washer is full before you run it.
- Plant a native garden to save up to 1/3 of the water used to maintain your lawn. Native flowers, bushes, and grass not only require less water but also attract pollinators and enhance biodiversity.



Ash Wednesday and the Season of Lent provide believers an opportunity to meditate on mortality, sinfulness, and need of a Savior; to renew a commitment for repentance in all of life; and to remember with confidence and gratitude that Christ has conquered death and sin.

Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent. By the fourth century the Western church determined that the Lenten period of fasting and renewal should correspond to Christ's forty-day fast (Matt. 4:2), and, by counting forty days back from Easter (excluding Sundays, which remain "feast" days), arrived at the Wednesday seven weeks before Easter. At one time Lent was primarily viewed as a period during which converts prepared for baptism on Easter Sunday, but later the season became a general time of penitence and renewal for all Christians. Thus, Ash Wednesday became the day that marked the beginning of the Lenten renewal.

The imposition of ashes has a long history in biblical and church traditions. In Scripture ashes or dust symbolize frailty or death (Gen.18:27), sadness or mourning (Esther 4:3), judgment (Lam. 3:16), and repentance (Jon.3:6). Some traditions have also considered ash a purifying or cleansing agent. All these images are caught up in the church's use of ashes as a symbol appropriate for Lent. At an Ash Wednesday service, when our foreheads are marked with ashes in a cross-shaped sign, we hear the words, "From dust you came. To dust you shall return." The ashes remind us of the brevity of life and our need for confession and pardon. The sign of the cross reminds us of our baptism.

Although we traditionally offer the Ash Wednesday Service in the evening, the Worship Committee has decided to offer the service at noon, instead. So, make plans to join us on Ash Wednesday, February 14th at 12:00 p.m. Together, may we begin our Lenten journey toward Resurrection morn.

Make this heartfelt craft as a decoration or gift.

What you need:

- Yarn
- Scissors
- Parchment paper
- Baking sheet
- Heart-shaped cookie cutters
- ¼ cup cornstarch
- ½ cup water
- Adult help



What you do:

- 1. Cut yarn into 12-inch pieces.
- 2. Place cookie cutters atop a baking sheet lined with parchment paper.
- Combine cornstarch and water in a saucepan. Heat mixture over medium heat, stirring until thick and smooth. Remove from heat and cool to form a "glue."
- 4. Dip each piece of yarn into the mixture to coat completely. Squeeze off any excess.
- 5. Place yarn in the cookie cutters, allowing pieces to cross and loop within the heart. Add more until the cookie cutter is filled and the yarn looks like a heart.
- Remove cookie cutters and bake the sheet for two hours at 150°F, or until hearts are dry and hard.
