CORCORAN'S CORNER

Setonpalooza . . .

Our Annual Parish Picnic is around the corner! It will be held Sunday, August 6, before our college students return to school, our teens return to high school, and our grammar school students hit the books. As February seems to last six weeks—summer goes by in a blink. Make each day count.

One way to end the summer with a high note is to attend our parish picnic. This is not a flashy parish carnival, it is an entirely different afternoon to enjoy. We will start with an outdoor Mass, at 3:00 PM [that is weather permitting]. We have been chased indoors in the past due to heat, humidity and rain. This is followed by our Men's Club who will grill tasty hamburgers and hot dogs with all the trimmings. Our Women's Club will offer luscious watermelon, and our Seniors of Seton provide and host the desserts, that will be served in our O'Mara Hall "cooling center." All picnic food is free. Bring your cooler with liquid refreshments, a blanket or two, and some lawn chairs. We will provide a bouncy house for the little ones. [I am not sure that Fr. Dan will jump inside of it like **Fr. Zurek** (of happy memory) would do.] For your musical enjoyment we will have at least two bands: "Vision in the Rhythm" and "My Dad's Garage Band." We might have a third band, "The Korenchan Brothers." Or, at least Fr. Dan will play a mean trumpet alongside the two bands.

This should be a fun afternoon of giving thanks to God, enjoying a meal together, socializing, and enjoying some music. As always we will have the Water Balloon Toss. It should be a great time—plan on attending.

Deep Cleaning . . .

Lest you think everyone is sitting around eating bon bons, the Cardinal Joseph Bernardin School is undergoing the deep cleaning and repair that goes on each summer. The cleaning crew hit the floors the last week in June, and are working like a hot knife going through butter. All this takes time. So far, so good.

A major task that the school has undertaken this year is putting new, brighter, and more efficient lighting the gym. The parish has just finished the same in our office area. A few years ago we committed to upgrading lighting, but instead of doing it in one swell expensive swoop, we have been gradually upgrading and replacing the lighting. I am sure you noticed when we did this with the lights in the parking lot. Some jobs, like repaving the parking lot, we need to tackle all at once. Others we do in stages. We hope to have brighter days ahead!

"Building the New Reality" . . .

We have just begun our third year of the "Renew My Church" process. We are in the second stage called "Building the New Reality." This stage will last many years as the seven parishes in our grouping learn how to work more closely together.

Our chief St. Elizabeth Seton Parish goal was to hire a Youth and Young Adult Minister. This has been a daunting process. When our parish first hired **Deacon John Sobol**, for this position, things went swimmingly, as John had the requisite skills for this ministry. He did a fantastic job for six months. Then, our Director of Liturgy, **Carlos Bautista** transitioned to teaching at Fenwick High School in Oak Park, and Deacon John asked to move to this open position, where he is thriving. We have been so blessed to have five excellent successive Directors of Liturgy: **Diedre Sweet**;

Gerry Welte; Claudia Nolan; Carlos Bautista; and our current director, Deacon John Sobol.

Trying to hire a new Youth and Young Adult Minister has been most challenging. The pastor at St. Stephen and I [our two parishes are working together on hiring for this position] just have not found the right individual yet. We are not willing to settle for someone whom we feel would be less than stellar in this job.

Our Cardinal Joseph Bernardin School was in the same position in looking for a new principal, until the former Assistant Principal, Ms. Jeanne Pagliaro, agreed to take on the new position. The Cardinal Joseph Bernardin School lucked out in getting a strong new principal. That search committee was also not going to settle. If necessary we would have hired an interim principal. Last time we were incredibly fortunate in being able to hire Mr. Jim Antos as the interim principal, after his many great years at Brother Rice High School. To be blunt though there is not a great pool at the moment for possible principals, interim principal, and even teachers in certain areas. It is tough to be in education at the moment, or to be in Youth and Young Adult Ministry. We have been blessed in that both the school and parish have continued to draw strong candidates. And we have a good attitude that we are not willing to settle until we find someone we feel confident can ably do the task at hand. Please keep the parish in your prayers as we continue to look for a Youth and Young Adult Minister.

Similarly, we will begin looking for someone to head up our "two parish" Evangelization efforts. But this is another task entirely. The Vicariate V has been searching for two years to find someone to assist all the parishes in their Evangelization efforts. Even if our two parishes had an Evangelization Director, we would be lacking wider direction. This is all teaching us a lesson in patience. We are all in a long season of Advent—a season of watchful waiting.

Finally, the Archdiocese of Chicago is restructuring the Vicariates [there are six of them, and we are in Vicariate V], as well as all of the deaneries. [We are in Deanery "E"] They have not yet come to any conclusion but the decision is around the corner. Our deanery, of which I am the dean, is the largest deanery in terms of parishes and institutions in the entire archdiocese [17 parishes and mission churches]. This is expected to be significantly changed. It is viewed by the archdiocese as far too large. Most deaneries consist of eight parishes and institutions. I did not advise any change, but the arguments from downtown are persuasive. We shall see what will be done. An announcement is due soon. We are blessed in this deanery to have large and strong parishes, with great staffs, and a good spirit. Our Church is alive out here. We are fortunate. And this is accomplished because so many people in our parishes are involved and dedicated to our faith. We have good days ahead.



In celebration of the Feast Day of Saint Mary Magdalen on July 22...

Will The Real Mary Magdalen **Please Stand Up!**

A Case of Mistaken Identity

For nineteen centuries, Mary Magdalen, a woman


who was from a tiny town next to the city of Tiberius with the woman mentioned in Luke 7:36-50. This passage refers to the prostitute who anointed the feet of Jesus with precious ointment, washed them with her tears, dried them with her hair and then heard the beautiful words of Jesus, "I tell you, her

great love." The reason for the mistake

was that when she was first mentioned in the Gospel as one of the woman who followed Jesus, it mentioned the fact that Jesus "cast out seven demons from her." Now we know that phrase refers to "benign spirits" which were thought to cause physical illness and mental impairment, somewhat like germs, viruses or chemicals that enter the body and cause various reactions. This did not indicate sinfulness or moral failure. But because of this erroneous identification of Mary of Magdala with the sinful woman of Luke's Gospel, poor Mary had enjoyed a very bad reputation for a very long time! She had become the patron saint of sinners!

Mary of Magdala: The First Witness of the Resurrection

On Easter Sunday, the Feast of the Resurrection of the Lord, our Gospel reading for the day was from the 20th Chapter of St. John's Gospel. The reading begins with the words:

"Early in the morning, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalen came to the tomb. She saw that the stone had been moved away, so she ran off to Simon Peter and that other disciple, the one Jesus loved and told them: 'The Lord has been taken from the tomb and we don't know where they have put him."

A Disciple of Christ

This recent "rehabilitation" of Mary has opened our eyes to another dimension of her life that has been overlooked in Biblical studies. Mary of Magdala was one of the many woman disciples of Jesus. According to St. Luke, there were "many woman who followed Jesus." With their male counterparts, they supported Jesus in his work and engaged in the mission of evangelization.

Four woman are mentioned as being present at the scene of the Crucifixion and only one man is named — only ONE of the famed twelve apostles! Where were the others? Women had a much larger role than was previously thought in both the ministry of Jesus and the ministry of the Church.

In both Jewish Law and Roman Law, a woman's testimony was inadmissible in court. Women really didn't count. Yet, this woman who loved Jesus in his lifetime, was present at his death agony, got up at dawn to go and anoint his dead body, sat at his tomb weeping, and was the one who gave the greatest testimony of anyone in human history:

"He is truly risen from the dead." Because of her tremendous love for Jesus, Mary of Magdala was given the great privilege of being:

The purpose of the Shawl Ministry is to prayerfully create shawls for those in our Parish Family and community, as a gift for healing, protection, strength, courage, and celebration. Each shawl maker begins to knit or crochet with a prayer for the recipient. Each time the work is taken up, the prayerful intention is renewed. Upon completion of the shawl, the group says a final prayer, then a priest or deacon

gives his formal blessing. The shawls are meant to symbolize God's loving embrace. Shawl recipients continue to be prayed for at each of our meetings, and at the meetings of Prayer Shawl Ministries throughout the world.



SAINT OF THE WEEK



SAINT TITUS BRANDSMA 1881-1942

A mild-mannered Dutch Carmelite professor, Saint Titus Brandsma became a fierce critic of the Nazi movement and was put to death by lethal injection at the Dachau concentration camp in 1942.

GIVEN THE BIRTH NAME ANNO, BRANDSMA and his siblings grew up on their parents' dairy farm in rural Frisia. As devout Catholics, the family was the minority among their Calvinist neighbors. From age 11 he was educated at a preparatory school for boys studying for the priesthood. He joined the Carmelite novitiate in 1898, taking the name Titus in honor of his father.

In the years following his 1905 ordination, Brandsma received a doctorate in philosophy and initiated a project to translate the works of Saint Teresa of Avila into Dutch. One of the founders of the Catholic University of Nijmegen, he served as a professor of philosophy and the history of mysticism at the school. While there Brandsma was known more for his availability to faculty and students than for his academic achievements.

Working as a journalist Brandsma served as ecclesiastical advisor to Catholic journalists. His long-standing opposition to Nazi ideology came to the attention of the Nazis when they invaded the Netherlands in 1940. In direct opposition to the Third Reich, the Conference of Dutch Bishops sent a letter ordering Catholic newspaper editors not to print Nazi propaganda. Fr. Brandsma was arrested while hand delivering the letter in January 1942. After being imprisoned in several facilities, in June he was taken to the Dachau camp in Germany.


During his brief time at Dachau Fr. Brandsma was well-known for his kindness and spiritual support of other prisoners. His death on July 26, 1942 was a result of the Reich's program of medical experimentation on prisoners. He gave a wooden rosary to the nurse who administered the fatal injection; she later became Catholic and testified to his holiness. In recent years Brandsma has been honored by both the cities of Nijmegen and Dachau. Titus Brandsma was beatified in 1985, and canonized in 2022.


WEEKLY STEWARDSHIP RECOMMENDATION:

Plastic waste is a huge and growing problem. Only 9% of the 9 billion tons of plastic produced has been recycled. There is very little demand for the plastic you do recycle. 40% of all plastic is designed to be used once and tossed. Plastic doesn't decompose easily and can last 100s of years. The waste clogs landfills and waterways, and poses hazards to animals and fish life. It breaks up into ever smaller microplastics getting into our air and food chain with unknown health effects.

What you can do:

- Say NO to single-use plastic. Carry your own cups, bags, to-go containers, utensils and forget the straws.
- Say NO to bottled water and pop. Carry refillables.
- Choose more biodegradable/recyclable materials like glass, paper, cardboard and metal instead of plastic... and then recycle those items.
- Avoid products with excessive packaging, excessive plastic packaging and parts. If it leaves behind plastic trash, try not to buy it.

Recycle what you can't refuse, reduce or reuse.



Our covenant of love with God is our security and strength. May it also be the song that fills our hearts and lives each day.

FIRST READING

Solomon prays for an understanding heart (1 Kings 3:5, 7-12).

Solomon went to the shrine in Gibeon and performed a great sacrifice, and then went to sleep. While asleep he had a dream in which the Lord asked him to request whatever he wanted. Solomon responded that he wanted wisdom so that he could rule God's people justly. Because he asked for wisdom and not for riches or victories, the Lord granted his request. Solomon came to be known as the wisest king on the earth. Wisdom then was understood as knowing how to live the good life. Much of the accumulated wisdom of Israel was collected and today from the latter part of the Book of Proverbs. These sayings were the way that community wisdom would be passed on from generation to generation.

SECOND READING

All things work for good for those who love God (Romans 8:28-30).

God has a plan to bring us to salvation. God foreknew us even before we existed. He called us into existence with love and predestined us to share in his life. (Predestination does not mean that we have to do something, only that we are invited to do it.) In other words, God's mystery (plan) of salvation is too wonderful to understand. How could anyone love us this much?

How could God invite us into his own glory? This fills us with a sense of awe and tremendous gratitude.

GOSPEL

The one who knows of the kingdom of heaven brings new and old from the storeroom (Matthew 13:44-52 [44-46]). There are different allegories presented that speak about our response to an encounter with the kingdom of God. There is a sense of being willing to abandon what had previously been considered to be of prime importance in order to acquire that which is far more precious. This is more than only rejecting sin and all of its allure. It often means giving up things that are good, but not of the same value as the kingdom. When we love someone, we often have to say no to things that otherwise might have been part of our experience. Finally, there is an important reminder that we should not reject something simply because it does not measure up too our point of view. We should be willing to go beyond our preferences to find which is true and good wherever it might lie. Otherwise, we might be ignoring one of the ways God is speaking to us.

REFLECTION

There is a woman who went to visit her husband everyday, even though Alzheimer's disease kept him from recognizing her as his wife of 62-plus years. She says she does this because she loves him and he would do the same for her. And she adds that as much as she loves him she knows that after he's gone only her faith will support her and keep them connected until they are in heaven together, where she is certain he will recognize her again. Their marital love is a great treasure to her. Her faith is her pearl of great price and the net in which they will be collected together again. What wisdom! The things of this world pass away, even those we love. Only our faith in God is with us at all times, through thick and thin, sickness and health, from death to eternal life. Solomon asks God for the wisdom of faith: "Give [me] an understanding heart to judge your people and to distinguish right from wrong" (1 Kings 3:9). Faith in God is the only treasure that remains with us when all else is gone and all other paths fail. St. Frances de Sales offered a prayer for wisdom that went something like this: "Lord Jesus, I surrender to you. Make me a lute that you play. Touch any string and allow me to make music in harmony with you." Faith gives us the wisdom to love as Christ loved, live as he lived, and surrender all for that greatest treasure. Therein lies wisdom at all times!
