Celebrating Confirmation...

We celebrate the great Sacrament of Confirmation this Sunday, and welcome **Most Rev. Kevin Birmingham**, who is the confirming bishop. This sacrament completes a candidate's full initiation into the Catholic Church. What was begun in Baptism, and strengthened by First Eucharist, is now brought to full completion.

Our Eighth Grade candidates have prepared for this moment for the past two years. Through both Seventh and Eighth Grade they have studied the faith, practiced the faith by acts of service, and prayed with our community. Now we ask that God send the Holy Spirit to them to be with them for their lives ahead. We are glad that they will be strengthened by the gifts of the Holy Spirit throughout their lives

At our past two weekend Masses, we had four students from our Religious Education Program read the letters that they wrote to me in the course of preparing for the sacrament. They were good letters, from good candidates. In my reading all of the letters from this class, I am struck by how the Christian witness of family members and friends inspire these young women and men to grow in faith. Our faith is truly caught, as well as taught.

Our Creation Care Art Show...

This weekend as we celebrate Earth Day, we are conscious of our role as being good stewards of all of Creation. In our church Narthex, we have on display 45 art pieces — both traditional and digital — created by youth, teens and adults. Prior to this exhibit they have been stored in the parish office in the room located directly across from my office. I have thoroughly enjoyed going over and taking them all in. They are wonderful. They are lively, imaginative, and left me thinking. We had a jury of artists view and judge the works for modest prizes. Later in this bulletin the winners are announced.

CREATION CARE 2023 ART CONTEST WINNERS

Pope Francis' encyclical *Laudato Si':* **On Care for our Common Home,** puts a bright spotlight on the importance of Creation Theology: that is, God's Creation of the **natural world and our duty to be stewards of that great gift.**

ut Francis notes how we've fallen short on that obligation and how we're not living in either a just or sustainable fashion. On this subject, he followed his predecessors Pope Benedict and Pope John Paul II emphasizing the importance of Creation Care. The Church is very clear—Care for Creation is a requirement of our faith, a way to respect the Creator, and a social justice issue. Caring for Creation is Care for our Common Home—the earth, all living things in it and all things that support that life. In his encyclical *Laudato Si'*, Pope Francis says to Care for Creation we have to address both the Cry of the Earth and the Cry of the Poor.

To help advance efforts towards ACTIVE Care for Creation, our parish launched the Creation Care Art Contest, inviting Cardinal Joseph Bernardin (CJB) School, Providence High School, Carl Sandburg High School, Victor J. Andrew High School,

and St. Elizabeth Seton Religious Ed students — as well as any adults who heard about it—to participate. Cash prizes were offered to First Place (\$150) and Second Place (\$50) winners in Youth, Teen and Adult categories. Both traditional and Digital Art categories were offered. Our winners are listed below. **OUR CREATION CARE ART CONTEST allowed** our parish to keep messaging on the need and importance of Creation Care in the spotlight for an extended period so parishioners can reflect on it. Managing Runoff with Rain Gardens

Managing stormwater runoff in our yards and communities is challenging but important. Left unchecked, stormwater carries pollutants from roofs, chemically treated lawns, driveways and roads into streams and waterways. Increasing ways for water to be absorbed through landscaping makes for healthier land and water for all.

One home solution is the "rain garden." Rain gardens are shallow depressions filled with perennial native plants which temporarily collect a few inches of rain. Plant roots then slowly filter out pollutants and allow the water to percolate into the surrounding soil. Up to 30% more water is absorbed into the ground. Besides alleviating problems associated with flooding and drainage, rain gardens can beautify yards, recharge the ground water supply and provide habitat and food for wildlife, including birds and butterflies. SAINT OF THE WEEK



SAINT BENDICT JOSEPH LABRE 1748-1783

Saint Benedict Joseph Labre lived a poor life in the ruins of the Colosseum. To the uneducated eye, he appeared to be a pitiable figure, but the people of Rome saw him as a saint. He was known as the beggar of Rome.

BENEDICT JOSEPH LABRE WAS TRULY ECCENTRIC, ONE OF GOD'S SPECIAL LITTLE ONES.

Born in France and the eldest of 18 children, he studied under his uncle, a parish priest. Because of poor health and a lack of suitable academic preparation he was unsuccessful in his attempts to enter the religious life. Then, at age 16, a profound change took place. Benedict lost his desire to study and gave up all thoughts of the priesthood, much to the consternation of his relatives.

He became a pilgrim, traveling from one great shrine to another, living off alms. He wore the rags of a beggar and shared his food with the poor. Filled with the love of God and neighbor, Benedict had special devotion to the Blessed Mother and to the Blessed Sacrament. In Rome, where he lived in the Colosseum for a time, he was called "the poor man of the Forty Hours devotion" and "the beggar of Rome." The people accepted his ragged appearance better than he did. His excuse to himself was that "our comfort is not in this world."

On April 16, 1783, the last day of his life, Benedict dragged himself to a church in Rome and prayed there for two hours before he collapsed, dying peacefully in a nearby house. Immediately after his death, the people proclaimed him a saint.

Benedict Joseph Labre was canonized by Pope Leo XIII in 1881. His liturgical feast is celebrated on April 16. He is a patron saint of the homeless persons.

COMMENT

In a modern inner city, one local character kneels for hours on the sidewalk and prays. Swathed in his entire wardrobe winter and summer, he greets passersby with a blessing. Where he sleeps no one knows, but he is surely a direct spiritual descendant of Benedict, the ragged man who slept in the ruins of Rome's Colosseum. These days we ascribe such behavior to mental illness; Benedict's contemporaries called him holy. Holiness is always a bit mad by earthly standards.






Something To Think About

The first big moment of vocation is baptism. The anointing of chrism at baptism might be called the anointing for vocation. The baptismal vocation is for witness, love

and service. This is expression in ways in which people live out their baptism in married life, single life — and within the single life, maybe religious life or priesthood.

Our active witness is to the life and values of Jesus in our lives. Teaching is not itself a vocation, for example, but the way we teach is a way of living out our vocation. It is the same with many of the helping professions and employments. Being a good neighbor can be a living out of our vocation.

We witness love in marriage, in family, extended family, and in friendship. Any love is a sharing in the love of God. In the movements of unselfish love in any relationship we are living out our vocation. we are doing God's will! — By Donal Neaey SJ



Like every other aspect of our lives, our spiritual lives go through times of growth and change, times that are not always easy. As the Church did from the beginning, we need to keep the Lord near.

■ FIRST READING

They chose seven men filled with the Spirit (Acts 6:1-7). The money that had been collected by the community of the early Christian Church was collected to help widows and orphans. The money was being distributed to the Hebrews but not to the Hellenists. There were complaints, and the apostles turned to God for discernment. They chose seven Hellenists for charity within the community. This service is called "diaconia" in Greek, hence we call these seven the first deacons

SECOND READING

You are a chosen race, a royal priesthood (1 Peter 2:4-9). Jesus is the living stone upon which the Church has been built; a sure foundation, never shaken. We are the stones that will be built into a holy temple of the Lord. Jesus is the image and promise of what we are to become. If we do not follow him then the rock (Jesus) causes us to stumble. We will be convicted by his example. He has taught us the Truth of God, and we will have chosen that which is false if we do not follow him. It is not so much Jesus who condemns us as we who will have chosen our own condemnation. He offered life, and we have chosen to reject it. God has not called us for failure, but for dignity. We are a chosen race, entered in a royal priesthood through our Baptism.

GOSPEL

I am the Way and the Truth and the Life (John 14:1-12). Jesus prepares his disciples for his departure and speaks of the fact that he must go away so that he might prepare a dwelling place for them with the Father. They could not understand why this was not an abandonment. Jesus explains to the disciples that he is the way to the Father. We cannot know God except through him. This is why he was born in this world, to revel to us who the Father is and how much he loves us. If we have known Jesus, then we have also known the Father. Likewise, if we have not known Jesus, we cannot really say that we have known the Father. He is the visible revelation of who God is. Iesus insisted all throughout his ministry that he could do nothing except through the Father. Jesus has revealed the Father to us, and we can do the works that Jesus has done. We are his disciples because we follow him and represent him on earth.

REFLECTION

Have you experienced life's growing pains? Jesus prepares the disciples for His return to the Father. They experience growing pains and need his reassurance. Jesus tells them they know the way. He had shown it to them. They continue to show it to each other by living what Jesus taught them. The early Church experienced growing pains when Gentile and Jewish Christians were treated differently. The community prayed, asked the Spirit's guidance, and seven were called forth. Through the laying on of hands in the power of the Holy Spirit a new ministry, that of deacon, developed. Peter reminded the community that they are a "chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people of his own." They announce the praises of the One who called them out of darkness into a wonderful life (1 Peter 2:9). Growing pains. We experience growing pains in our lives of faith. Certainty can be followed by wonderment. We ask, "Is God near? Does our faith make any difference at all?" We need to remember that Jesus is our Cornerstone. We've seen him in those who make his presence known. He has chosen us as his own people and made us a holy priesthood to give God praise and worship. When in doubt, turn to God in prayer. Call on the Holy Spirit and let Jesus, our Way, our Truth, and our Life, be your guide.
