The purpose of the Shawl Ministry is to prayerfully create shawls for those in our parish family and community, as a gift for healing, protection, strength, courage, and celebration. Shawls are crafted, for example, for those undergoing medical treatment, grieving the loss of a loved one, in times of crisis or loneliness, celebrating joyous times, or at any time that a person is experiencing a physical, spiritual, or emotional need for the comfort, hope, peace, love, and prayerful remembrance that a shawl can bring.

Each shawl maker begins to knit/crochet with a prayer for the recipient. Each time the work is taken up, the intention is renewed. Upon completion the group says a final prayer, and a priest/deacon gives a formal blessing. The shawls symbolize God's loving embrace. Shawl recipients continue to be prayed for at each of our meetings, and at Prayer Shawl Ministries throughout the world.

### **STUCK IN TRAFFIC**

There's a famous billboard that hangs along a congested highway that reads:
You aren't stuck in traffic.
You are traffic!

ood wit, good insight! How glibly we distance ourselves from a problem, whether it is our politics, our churches, the ecological problems on our planet, or most anything else.

We aren't, as we want to think, stuck in a bad political climate wherein we can no longer talk to each other and live respectfully with each other.

ather we ourselves have become so rigid, arrogant, and sure of ourselves that we can no longer respect those who think differently than we do. We are a bad political climate and not just stuck in one.

Likewise for our churches: We aren't stuck in churches that are too self-serving and not faithful enough to the teachings of Jesus. Rather we are Christians who too often, ourselves, out of self-interest compromise the teachings of Jesus. We aren't stuck in our churches, we comprise those churches.

The same is truly relevant to the ecological challenges we face on this planet: We aren't stuck on a planet that's becoming oxygen-starved and a junkyard for human wastage. Rather it's we, not just others, who are too careless in how we are using up the earth's resources and how we are leaving behind our waste.

Admittedly, this isn't always true. Sometimes we are stuck in negative situations for which we bear no responsibility and within which, through no fault of our own, we are simply the unfortunate victim of circumstance and someone else's carelessness, illness, dysfunction, or sin. We can, for instance, be born into a dysfunctional situation which leaves us stuck in a family and an environment that doesn't make for easy freedom. Or, sometimes simple circumstance can burden us with duties that take away our freedom. So, metaphorically speaking, we can be stuck in traffic and not ourselves be part of that traffic, though generally we are, at least partially, part of the traffic we're stuck in.

Henri Nouwen often highlighted this in his writings. We are not, he tells us, separate from the events that make up the world news each day. Rather, what we see written large in the world news each night simply reflects what's going on inside of us.

When we see instances of injustice, bigotry, racism, greed, violence, murder and war on our newscasts we

rightly feel a certain moral indignation. It's healthy to feel that way, but it's not healthy to naively think that it's others, not us, who are the problem.

When we're honest we have to admit that we're complicit in all these things, perhaps not in their crasser forms, but in subtler, though very real, ways: The fear and paranoia that are at the root of so much conflict in our world are not foreign to us. We too find it hard to accept those who are different from us. We too cling to privilege and do most everything we can to secure and protect our comfort. We too use up an unfair amount of the world's resources in our hunger for comfort and experience. As well, our

negative judgments, jealousies, gossip, and bitter words are, at the end of the day, genuine acts of violence since, as Henri Nouwen puts it: Nobody is shot by a gun that isn't first shot by a word. And nobody is shot by a word before he or she is first shot by a murderous thought: Who does she thinks she is! The evening news just shows large what's inside our hearts. What's in the macrocosm is also in the microcosm.

And so we aren't just viewers of the evening news, we're complicit in it. The old catechisms were right when they told us that there's no such a thing as a truly private act, that even our most private actions affect everyone else. The private is political. Everything affects everything. The first take-away from this is obvious: When we find ourselves stuck in traffic, metaphorically and otherwise, we need to admit our own complicity and resist the temptation to simply blame others.

### But there's another important lesson here too.

e are never healthier than when we are confessing our sins; in this case, confessing that we are traffic and not just stuck in traffic. After recognizing that we are complicit, hopefully we can forgive ourselves for the fact that, partially at least, we are helpless to not be complicit. No one can walk through life without leaving a footprint. To pretend otherwise is dishonest and to try to not leave a footprint is futile. The starting point to make things better is for us to admit and confess our complicity.

So the next time you're stuck in traffic, irritated and impatient, muttering angrily about why there are so many people on the road, you might want to glance at yourself in rearview mirror, ask yourself why you are on the road at that time, and then give yourself a forgiving wink as you utter the French word, touché.

### WEEKLY STEWARDSHIP RECOMMENDATION: Plant Trees.


They clean our air, protect our drinking water, provide food and habitat for animals. Studies show they even improve our mental health. Trees also absorb the CO2 that contributes to global warming and release oxygen back into the air. In one year, an acre of mature trees absorbs the amount of CO<sub>2</sub> produced by a car driven 26,000 miles.

Planting trees also helps prevent soil erosion, increases land fertility and can add value to your property. Trees that provide shade can also significantly reduce your energy bills. When selecting trees, choose native types to support local wildlife. Spring and fall can be good times to plant.






### Something To Think About

The first big moment of vocation is baptism. The anointing of chrism at baptism might be called the anointing for vocation. The baptismal vocation is for witness, love

and service. This is expression in ways in which people live out their baptism in married life, single life — and within the single life, maybe religious life or priesthood.

Our active witness is to the life and values of Jesus in our lives. Teaching is not itself a vocation, for example, but the way we teach is a way of living out our vocation. It is the same with many of the helping professions and employments. Being a good neighbor can be a living out of our vocation.

We witness love in marriage, in family, extended family, and in friendship. Any love is a sharing in the love of God. In the movements of unselfish love in any relationship we are living out our vocation. we are doing God's will! — By Donal Neaey SJ



The Holy Spirit promised by Jesus gives us our purpose: to go out on the joyful mission of spreading the good news of salvation.

### FIRST READING

The people of Samaria accepted the word of God preached by Philip; they received the Holy Spirit (Acts 8:5-8, 14-17). In this reading we hear that the gospel would spread from Jerusalem to Judea to the very ends of the earth. Philip, one of the seven called to the diaconate, shares the gospel with the Samaritans. The Samaritans were considered to be a type of heretical Jew, for they had mixed elements of the Jewish faith with paganism. By having the gospel reach the Samaritans, it was now reaching beyond the Jewish people. The next step would be for the gospel to reach the pagans, first in Israel and Asia Minor and then slowly to the ends of the earth (Rome). The Samaritans accept the gospel with great joy. Peter and John pray over them, and the Holy Spirit descends upon them.

### SECOND READING

Act with gentleness and reverence toward all, so that when you are maligned those who defame you will be the ones put to shame (1 Peter 3:15-18)

Saint Peter is very pastoral in his instructions and encourages us to share the source of our joy with others: our faith in the Lord Jesus. Once does not have to be aggressive. Peter invites us to be gentle and to act with reverence. Thus, we will not be trying to force others' compliance; we will be inviting them to share a gift we have received from the Lord. If, after sharing our faith, we receive taunts and other forms of subtle persecution, we should view it as an honor. Jesus suffered for us. If we

suffer with hope, we will give an important message to those who persecute us. We, like Jesus, will be putting the flesh to death so that we might live in the Spirit.

### GOSPEL

I will not leave you orphans, but will come to you (John 14:15-21).

We hear Jesus promise that he will send another Advocate. Note that the Advocate being sent is "another Advocate." Jesus is the first Advocate, for he interceded for us with the Father. The Greek word used in this Gospel for "Paraclete" is a very ambiguous word. It could mean advocate or advisor or counselor or one who gives consolation. All of these meanings are true and all of them are used in the passages that speak about the "Paraclete." The Spirit of truth will help us to remember and to understand what Jesus taught. That Spirit will give us courage to bear witness to our faith and also will provide us with the words we need to defend ourselves when we suffer for our faith. The sign that we are in the Spirit is that we obey the Commandments.

### REFLECTION

MISSION: The word evokes exotic places and visiting priests or nuns telling hair-raising stories. Many people of faith still interpret "mission" as something someone else does somewhere else. What is expected is to give money to the "missions." Yet mission also means "purpose." Researchers tell us that a personal sense of purpose leads to greater well-being. A famous saying is, "The two most important days in your life are the day that you were born and the day that you find out why," Where does Christian purpose come from? Why are we here? Jesus promises that the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, will be with us always. As we are washed with that indwelling tender Spirit, we in turn fall in love. Daily life is no longer the same. We may be fishermen or computer programmers, students or professionals, preachers or lay ministers, parents or grandparents—when we encounter the friendship of the living God, we are changed. We are filled with radiant joy. Mission is not just something someone else does somewhere else. Mission is what we do, right here, right now. It doesn't matter so much what we do in daily life. but how we do it. The Holy Spirit's joy gives us purpose. As Pentecost approaches, we can prepare to be empowered and sent out into our ordinary lives to be extraordinary people. This is our calling, our obligation. This is also our delight. We are to be an enthusiastic people of purpose, with determination, resolution, drive, tenacity, and commitment to living Jesus' joy-filled way of life. To live for Jesus—is that your joy or obligation—or both?

### SAINT[S] OF THE WEEK SAINT JAMES AND SAINT PHILIP

Saints Philip and James share a feast day because their relics were brought to Rome together in May.

JAMES, SON OF ALPHAEUS: We know nothing of this man except his name, and, of course, the fact that Jesus chose him to be one of the 12 pillars of the New Israel, his Church. He is not the James of Acts, son of Clopas, "brother" of Jesus and later bishop of Jerusalem and the traditional author of the Letter of James. James, son of Alphaeus, is also known as James the Lesser to avoid confusing him with James the son of Zebedee, also an apostle and known as James the Greater.

PHILIP: Philip came from the same town as Peter and Andrew, Bethsaida, Galilee. Jesus called him directly, whereupon he sought out Nathanael and told him of the "one about whom Moses wrote" (Jn 1:45). Like the other apostles, Philip took a long time coming to realize who Jesus was. On one occasion, when Jesus saw the great multitude following him and wanted to give them food, he asked Philip where they should buy bread for the people to eat. Saint John comments, "[Jesus] said this to test him, because he himself knew what he was going to do" (Jn 6:6). Philip answered, "Two hundred days' wages worth of food would not be enough for each of them to have a little [bit]" (Jn 6:7).

John's story is not a put-down of Philip. It was simply necessary for these men who were to be the foundation stones of the Church to see the clear distinction between humanity's total helplessness apart from God and the human ability to be a bearer of divine power by God's gift.

On another occasion, we can almost hear the exasperation in Jesus's voice. After Thomas had complained that they did not know where Jesus was going, Jesus said, "I am the way. If you know me, then you will also know my Father. From now on you do know him and have seen him" (Jn 14:6a, 7). Then Philip said, "Master, show us the Father, and that will be enough for us" (Jn 14:8). Enough! Jesus answered, "Have I been with you for so long a time and you still do not know me, Philip? Whoever has seen me has seen the Father" (Jn 14:9a).

Possibly because Philip bore a Greek name or because he was thought to be close to Jesus, some gentile proselytes came to him and asked him to introduce them to Jesus. Philip went to Andrew, and Andrew went to Jesus. Jesus's reply in John's Gospel is indirect; Jesus says that now his "hour" has come, that in a short time he will give his life for Jew and gentile alike.
