NOTES FROM THE WATCH

Many poets - and many of the rest of us - have searched for language that captures the way that time can be both eternal and fleeting all at the same time

When my son was born someone gave me a piece of artwork that said "when you have children, the nights last forever and the years fly by in moments." I can certainly attest to some long nights and some fleeting years.

I love the way this idea is captured in a beloved hymn, "O God, Our Help In Ages Past." I invite you to rest in these (only slightly updated) lines with me:

"A thousand ages, in thy sight, are like an evening gone; short as the watch that ends the night before the rising sun. Time, like an everflowing stream, soon bears us all away; we fly forgotten, as a dream dies at the opening day." (Isaac Watts, 1719).

I wonder how time has felt for you in the last months and weeks and days? I wonder especially about how you are thinking back over time as it relates to this congregation, and your place among it.

Today I am hearing the idea of "the opening day" as a cheerful invitation to what comes next. To the beginning of a season. To the opening pitch, or the opening curtain.

"You know the relief as

And I am thinking a lot about that watch that ends the night. I wonder how many of you have kept watch in the wee hours of the morning. You know the relief as the the sun rises – as the light comes.

We are at an important part of our time – and whether these days and weeks and months feel eternal or fleeting may depend on the moment! But I invite you to position yourself in the fleeting hours as we wait for the light. I invite you into this work of watch-keeping:

BE READY TO FOLLOW THE LIGHT

On January 7, our congregation will observe Epiphany together. In both worship, and in the congregational gathering after the service, we will use the theme of following the star which guided the wise ones to inspire our own attention to following the light.

- I hope that you can be present with us in worship.
- I hope that you can be present with us for the meal and program after worship (and use <u>the Sign-Up</u> <u>prepared by our fellowship committee</u> to help us plan).

And I hope that as we begin our Epiphany journey, you will be nudged by something of the light.

BE READY TO DO WHAT IS NEEDED

We keep watch to make sure that all is well. To be ready, and not found asleep when time for action is needed. We have an ask of you in these days. We need 75 pledging units to make two commitments.

- We need 75 giving units to give \$200-500 more this month.
- We need 75 giving units to pledge \$500-\$700 more next year.

With this action, we can close our budget deficit and begin our Epiphany journey more fully resourced, with a more clearly defined path ahead. If you are ready to take that next step, you can click on the sunlight in the picture to the left to make a pledge.



Here's how the Convention sessions will help us *gain action traction* in 2024:

- 1. Kick off ICCT's Campaign: Get Out the Vote for Mother Earth
- 2. Rise to the challenge of engaging youth
- 3. Examine ways to inspire awe and wonder
- 4. Interact with a panel of ICCT Liaisons about what works and what doesn't work for them as they connect their congregations to ICCT.

Raleigh can have a heart too



Raleigh is considering the establishment of Community Response Teams comprising Social Workers, EMS personnel, and Peer Support Specialists to handle 911 calls where a targeted, empathetic, and non-law enforcement response would help community members in need.

Durham already has a program called <u>HEART</u>, which you can learn more about on the next page.



On June 27th, 2022, Durham Community Safety Department launched 3 new crisis response units that aim to connect people experiencing non-violent mental health crises or quality of life concerns with the right care by sending new responses that better match residents' needs. A fourth unit launched at the end of September 2022. Our goal with these approaches is to connect our Durham neighbors to the right care — starting from the point at which someone calls 9–1–1, to the warm handoff to those prepared to help meet the needs of our neighbors in crisis.

These first response teams operate under the name of "HEART" (Holistic Empathetic Assistance Response Teams).

HEART's 4 crisis response units are:

- **1. Crisis Call Diversion (CCD):** CCD embeds mental health clinicians in Durham's 9-1-1 call center.
- **2. Community Response Teams (CRT):** CRT dispatches unarmed 3-person teams as first responders to non-violent behavioral health and quality of life calls for service.
- **3. Care Navigation (CN):** Care Navigators follow up with people after meeting with one of our first responders to help connect to the community-based care they need and want.
- **4. Co-Response (CoR):** CoR pairs clinicians with Durham police officers to respond to certain calls for service that pose a greater potential safety risk.*

Closing the Gap for our 2024 Budget

Thank you to everyone who has already pledged for 2024! We celebrate how much progress we have already made toward having a balanced budget in 2024. Unfortunately, as of right now, we haven't quite reached our goal. Most of our budget is fixed costs like the mortgage, insurance, and utilities.

That means to balance the budget, we would need to cut our committee budgets. If our committees are fully funded for 2024, they'll have the opportunity to use that money for a variety of purposes.

Here are some examples of what our committees hope to do with their portion of the budget:

- Adult Ed: Purchase study materials (books, videos), honorarium for speakers
- **Congregational Care:** Stamps for mailing cards (the Creativity Group provides the cards), meals for delivery by members of the Congregational Care team
- Music & Worship: Zoom, piano tuning, candles, choir music, honoraria, communion supplies
- Youth: Help make youth retreats and trips affordable to all, food (which makes a big difference in attendance), collaborative youth gatherings with other local progressive churches

Each of our committees has similar kinds of expenses related to their mission and responsibilities. We want all of our committees to be able to do their best work to live into our vision for next year, but they need their modest budgets to do so.

The good news is that we're really close to meeting that goal! All we need is for 75 families to increase their pledge by \$500. If you can help close the gap, update your pledge online, submit a paper pledge card (found in the back of the worship space), or email Vickie at vickie@upucc.org. Please update your pledge soon so we can avoid budget cuts for 2024.
