Wednesday, February 22 at 12:30pm and 6:00pm, in person or on YouTube or Zoom

We begin the season of Lent with ashes and dust — realizing the limits of human life, and our need for each other and for God's grace because we cannot do or be or manage everything. We will offer a worship service and a chance for reflection at 12:30pm and at 6:00pm, in the sanctuary. The 12:30pm service will be streaming live on our YouTube channel and in the Zoom room; once the service begins, you'll be able to find it on our YouTube channel anytime.

If you will not be able to join us in person and wish to receive a packet of ashes in the mail, please notify the office by **Monday**, **February 13**. Packets of ashes will also be available for pickup at church on Sunday, February 19.

The pastors will also be offering "Ashes to Go" at the University from 10am to noon in the Tillman Lobby of the University Union, so if you are a

student or if your work is over there, you can receive your ashes there.

Whether you come for anointing or ashes or reflect privately at home, we invite you to prayerfully remember the

grief and the promise of "ashes to ashes, dust to dust. All of us go down to the dust, yet even at the grave we make our song…"

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Our mission is to follow Jesus Christ by doing justice, loving kindness, and walking humbly with God.







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Pastors' Ponderings

When I was in graduate school, one of the common topics for academic discussion was "liminal space". A liminal space is a place of transition — a space between where you are and where you are heading, physically, psychologically, or philosophically. I hadn't thought about that phrase for many years, but I have been thinking it, and feeling it, almost like a mantra in recent weeks.

We have been experiencing liminal space, and liminality, since the pandemic was declared in 2020. We had to make a series of rapid shifts then, to continue our worship, fellowship, and community... and we have been making shifts ever since. We know whose we are — we belong to God by the grace of Jesus Christ — and we know who

we are called to serve – God's people in need, whether they are in downtown Binghamton, or in a Ghanaian school, or in the Arizona desert. But how we are to live out our call in this transitional time is strangely uncertain.

Three days before Christmas, we were approached about hosting a warming station that would provide overnight housing and two warm meals for up to 40 people every night during the cold season. The Addiction Center of Broome County had received a grant for the station, and was ready to move forward with opening, when the location they were planning to use fell through. The Session agreed that this was a worthy use for the large rooms on our first floor, and we started looking at the things that were needed to make the warming station happen, and... we waited.

We are still waiting as I am typing. As we wait, we are using this liminal space to look at the furnishings and the clutter in first floor rooms, both those that would be used for the warming station, and those that would be used differently if the warming station comes into being. We are getting rid of some things, rehoming some things, and moving some things. From time to time you will be invited to look at things, to see whether they are items you can use yourself, or if you know of a place that they might be useful. Whether or not the space is used as we hope it will be in the coming months, it will look differently when we have finished.

The Session had already begun a process of exploration about where our journey will lead us in the coming years, and that conversation will continue. We are inviting a consultant from the Presbyterian Foundation to come and see who we are, and to help us frame conversations about our future together. We will be reading a book together called "Sailboat Church," and if you are interested in reading along with us, let us know in the office and we'll make sure you have access to a copy to read.

We'd like to invite you to join the conversation about the journey. We are seeking new ways to keep our whole community informed about what is happening, and we are also seeking ways to listen to what you see and hear and feel as we chart new directions and explore new possibilities.

The chorus of a worship song that we sing from time to time seems like the motto that I invite you to take as part of this worshiping community in the coming year. The singer is addressing Jesus, and the words are,

I know not where the road will end, I know not what is up around the bend,

but I will set my feet upon the road; I will follow wherever you lead.

May God go with us through this liminal space and into the future that has already been prepared for us.

Last year my word was contentment, and I was not happy to receive that word, especially after my diagnosis with Myasthenia Gravis. I thought I was being nudged to just accept my limitations and be content. But after a year with the word contentment, that was not what God and I conversed about.

In years past, practicing gratitude was a powerful way to bring contentment to my life. But gratefulness was not the lesson here. It was more about what did I need to place in my life to be content, or what did I need to let go of? Yes, some things were about my new medical journey, but so much was not.

Contentment last year meant taking steps to make sure that I took time to spend in nature, to make music, to keep in touch with friends and family, instead of saying, "I will do those things when I have time."

Contentment also meant letting go of things that I cannot change and are a bit overwhelming. One thing I tried was that I stopped watching televised news. It is very important to be informed with what is going on in the world, but the TV news is overwhelming right now. The images along with the negativity were something that always just made me anxious and stuck. I now just read or listen to the news in the morning, when I am most able to receive it and learn from it and act on it if need be. And now it does not invade my sleep or consume my thoughts.

I also learned lessons in being content with what I can do and not focus on what I "should" be able to do. Yes, this part did start from my physical therapy around my muscle weakness. But I did find it was very helpful in all other parts of my life as well.

I hope you all found some lessons from your Star Words last year and have a good journey with your word for 2023! If you didn't get a Star Word yet for this year and would like one, they are in the sanctuary and you can pick one up, or you can contact the church office and we can mail you one. Music is an important part of our coming together at United Presbyterian Church. We are excited to make music with every resource that we have, and to use a variety of styles — not all at once, but intermingled. What emerges is a vibrant worship service with music that includes everyone who wishes to participate.

UPC's vocal choir is enjoying the use of our new choir room (next door to the chapel), and we meet **Wednesdays**, **6:30–7:30pm**. We provide music for worship most every Sunday, sometimes assisted by

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"guest conductor" Aoife! We are welcoming new members at any time, and would love to have your participation. It would be good to have you with us!



United Ringers handbell choir rehearses Sundays, 11:30am–12:30pm in the Sanctuary. Our handbell choir plays 2–4 octaves of Malmark handbells and handchimes, providing music for worship about once a month. If you're interested in learning how to play handbells, please inquire. New members are always welcome! No previous experience needed. No auditions to start. If you can count to 4, you can learn to play!

We also invite instrumentalists and vocalists who'd like to share their gifts to talk with any of our music leaders about providing special music for worship — you can call the church office, email **music@upcbgm.org**, or speak with them in person after worship. All musicians must be fully vaccinated and boosted.

At United Presbyterian Church, children are included in all aspects of worship. We invite them to start early with participation in hymns and other pieces of music. An insanctuary play & learn area for families also gives easy access to the Time for the Young at Heart and hands-on thematic exploration.



Our Church Family

Join Us for Worship — in person, online, or over the phone



We worship together on Sundays at 10:00am, both in person in the sanctuary and online. The service is livestreamed on our public YouTube Channel **upcbgm.org/youtube**, our Zoom room **upcbgm.org/zoom**, and our website, and is also accessible on YouTube any time. Those who can't access the worship videos online can call in on the phone to listen live on Sunday mornings, using the Zoom information listed below. So if you are not ready or able to come "in person", you are welcome to participate as you are able.

Everyone is invited to join us as we pray, hear God's word read and proclaimed, share our joys and concerns, and experience worshipful music. Our music is presented in person. All of our musicians are fully vaccinated, and the singers/instrumentalists at the front of the sanctuary are at least 15 feet away from the first row of pews.

If you're joining us in person, here's what you need to know:

- We wear masks and keep social distance, and the pews are marked to help us sit safely.
 We keep the inside doors open throughout worship, and air filtration units are deployed throughout the sanctuary to enhance your safety.
- Pastor Kimberly removes her mask while preaching and leading prayers, to accommodate those who rely on lip-reading to assist their auditory processing.
- Offering plates are placed by the doors of the sanctuary, but we do not pass them during the
 offertory. You are still invited and welcome to give online at <u>upcbgm.org/giving/donate</u> or to mail a
 check to the church.

If you're worshipping with us online, all of the hymn music and prayer words are shown on the screen, and live captioning is used for other parts of the service such as the sermon and the Prayers of the People. If you watch on a small screen and need the printed version of the worship guide, it is available for download from our website each week, or it can be mailed to you upon request if downloading & printing is not an option.

If you have been missing the time of shared prayer, join us at 9:30 before worship — either at church in the Study (Room 102, next door to the Nursery), or on Zoom — for a time of sharing and praying for the needs of our community. Sermon Series for Lent: Romans in Context

Paul's letter to the Romans is a pastoral letter from Paul to a struggling community who had many questions about the will of God in their particular time and place. It is a strange and wonderful problem that it has not been read that way in Western Christendom since St. Augustine wrote his commentary in the fifth century of the common era. For generations, preachers and scholars have read the first twelve chapters as if they were a systematic theological treatise, and the last four chapters as a kind of not-very-interesting appendage, containing advice for living a good Christian life and greetings to the community.

This year during Lent, we're going to take another look at the letter, beginning with the last four chapters, so we can see how Paul's reflections are an attempt to answer the questions that affected the Roman Christian community, and still affect Christian communities today. Who are we when we define ourselves by our Christian identity? Is our Christian identity more accurate than our political and social affiliations in predicting our actions and convictions? Are we living in such a way that we are giving life to our neighbors? Does our life together reflect our trust in God?

Session Highlights

A lot has been happening since the last newsletter in November. Some of the actions taken include:

- UPC's minutes were reviewed by the Presbytery; this is an annual requirement. They received high marks with only a couple of minor suggestions for the future.
- The budget for 2023 was adopted, pending congregational approval of the pastors' Terms of Call. These will be voted on during the annual congregational meeting scheduled for February 5, 2023, immediately following the service. Everyone can participate and vote, whether attending in person or online via UPC's Zoom account. It was decided that, due to the current number of Covid infections in Broome County, there would not be a meal associated with the meeting.
- UPC received a \$5,000 gift from the Put God First Foundation for housing the homeless during cold weather. The money has been used to pay for lodging during the recent cold spell; remaining money will be used in a similar manner.
- Also related to shelter for the homeless, UPC will be leasing space in the Library Lounge, Terrace Room, and Chapel to the Addiction Center of Broome County (ACBC) for use as a nightly warming center for those with no shelter for protection from the cold. ACBC will pay for some modifications (replacing worn-out carpeting with a more hygienic floor material, upgrading some electrical circuits, etc.) that will benefit UPC in the long run. While there are minor details that are being resolved, this should begin at the start of February.
- Session began a conversation about developing a strategic approach for the future with the Rev. Dr. Rose Niles from the Presbyterian Foundation. UPC has already undertaken some of the recommended steps. Session and anyone else who is interested will be reading Sailboat Church: Helping Your Church Rethink Its Mission and Practice. Please let anyone on Session know if you would like a copy of the book to peruse.
- Both the Baldwin grand piano in the Library Lounge and the Steinway grand in the Sanctuary will be appraised, with the intent to sell the Baldwin. It is not used very frequently, it takes up space and could get damaged in the Library Lounge, and there is an interested buyer.

Please don't hesitate to ask any member of Session about what we've been doing!

Greg expects to begin his duties in the vicinity of April 1.

A Note from Dave and Greg, working with refugees and deportees in Sasabe, Mexico, and the desert outside Tucson:

Just wanted to give a brief update on the work in Tucson.

We have been to the wall a couple of times and have assisted with providing food and water to several dozens of travelers, including a group of children aged 8–17 traveling alone in the desert.

Each trip we go on costs the Samaritans \$50 in gas, and then we use about a dozen gallons of water, as well as food, blankets, gloves, and hats.

> Currently there is an increased effort by the border patrol, which results in travelers being put into even more dangerous areas.


Casa Esperanza is seeing over 100 deportees a week, with no jackets in 20-degree temperatures. We are searching goodwill stores for jackets for them as well as buying socks and hats.

We are also buying 200 emergency blankets to be given to travelers. They serve twofold in that they can keep in the body heat but can be reversed and used as an emergency beacon. This is an experiment, but for 50 cents a blanket, it is worthwhile if it helps one person.


We are very grateful for the support of our friends at UPC and ask for your continued support for the mission.


If you have questions or need help using Zoom, feel free to call the church office for assistance.

Congregational Meeting to Renew Congregational Covenant with the Pastors Sunday, February 5, 11:15am, in person or on Zoom

"Terms of call" is the PC(USA) language for what, in the business community, is called a "compensation package". Recognizing that God's call to pastoral ministry is expressed in a three-way covenant between the presbytery, the congregation, and the pastor, each year you are asked to support the work of the pastors by agreeing to support them financially as well as through your prayers and participation. After the congregation votes, the terms will be sent to the presbytery for their approval.
