## A Message from Rev. Betsy...

Thus says the Lord: Do not let the wise boast in their wisdom, do not let the mighty boast int heir might, do not let the wealthy boast in their wealth; let those that boast in this, that they understand and know me, that I a the Lord; I act with steadfast love, justice and righteousness in the earth, for in these things I delight, says the Lord. (Jer. 9:23-24)

Lent is the perfect time to listen to the prophets. The prophets remind us that our basic human instinct is to sin; to choose ourselves and our own desires over God and God's way of love. The prophets then tell us what we need to do to please God and remind us that God's love for us is great that God is always ready to forgive us when we repent. Lent is a time set aside for radical change in our daily lives. A time for returning to God, renewing our relationship with God and recommitting to following God's law of love.


As we enter this season of Lent, we would all do well to take time to read the prophets and let them lead us back to God. Jeremiah reminds us not to rely on our wisdom, strength or wealth, for all of these are gifts from God and not really ours and certainly nothing to boast about because we have done nothing to gain them. Instead, we should rely on God's love and righteousness without which we cannot live. We should use our God given gifts to live lovingly and to bring righteousness and justice to others as these are the things that delight God.

The Prophet Micah reminds us that the sacrifice God favors is not burnt offerings (for us not showy displays of charity) but to "do justice, and to love kindness and to walk humbly with God". Amos tells us how angry God is when the poor are cheated at the market and God is cheated out of Worship when the Sabbath is cut short so more buying and selling can take place. What else can we learn as we read the prophets?

This Lent, I am committing myself to taking time every day to read the prophets, to praying with the Holy Spirit for understanding of their wisdom, and to daily acts of justice, kindness, and love. Will you join me? Jeremiah tells us that this is how we will come to understand God and God's ways, to become more God-like. As Christians, I think it's a great way to prepare ourselves to understand the incredible depths of his love for us when we hear his story's conclusion on Easter!

Keep shining brightly!

#### In the Hour of Need (IHN) Family Shelter

## PROJECTS HAPPENING AROUND THE CHURCH

## **7 Church Street Renovation**




After having rented the second floor of 7 Church St. to the PCC of Mass., it was decided that this facility should have a higher use, especially after the pandemic interrupted the PCC's use of this 4-office space. Hence, the PCC moved to Lyman St., and the unit is being converted into living space. Since all the kitchen appliances had been removed, all-new stainless-steel ones have been ordered.

A wall which had been added to create a 4th office (to augment the existing 3, bedroom office spaces) has been removed and the whole apartment will be repainted. The front stairway will be deleaded, and the garage will be cleared for use by the new tenants, who will also have use of the third-floor attic space, which is unfinished.



To accommodate the yard equipment which must be removed from the garage, a shed will be erected in the church parking lot.



## Saving Energy!

Always looking for energy savings wherever they present themselves, the Properties Committee has facilitated the replacement of numerous incandescent bulbs and fluorescent lighting fixtures. LED bulbs often use about 1/10th the wattage of an incandescent bulb and are more efficient than CFL's.



Just recently the bubs in the two chandeliers in the Chapel were changed, replacing 60-watt incandescent bulbs with 5-watt LED ones. Since 24 bubs were involved, the usage went from 1440 watts to 120, reducing the power requirement by 92%.

Another benefit of these bulbs is that the reduced power draw eased a problem with the light dimmers overheating and LED's have longer lives.

Another area where incandescents were replaced with LED bulbs is the sanctuary sconces. 22 fixtures with 5, 25-watt bulbs each were updated with 2.5-watt LED's, a total of 550 bulbs, reducing the power drawn by 90%.

The 36 bulbs in the sanctuary chandelier have also been replaced with LED's. All chandeliers in the Vestry library and the front entrance of the church have also all been changed to LED's. Now, if we only had solar panels . . .



## A New Ceiling

Strictly by accident, it was recently discovered that the ceiling in the Fannie Forbes room had sagged about 5 inches. The original ceiling was horsehair plaster, but at one point a drop ceiling was installed, but over the years, the nails came loose and it support along with some of the horsehair plaster fell down on it. A hardy work crew completely disassembled the drop ceiling, resulting in 2500 pounds of demolition debris, which was graciously hauled away by Al Hutchinson.





Since this room is used for formal gatherings (such as weddings, funerals and baptism and new member seminars) the new drop ceiling will be formal in nature also, utilizing coffered, 24" by 24" tiles like those below. Estimates for the purchase and installation of this type of tile are being requested.
