Family Spotlight

Meet Randy & Judy Mobley

We grew up together in Prospect, Ohio and have known each other since childhood. Judy lived “in town” and Randy on a 14-acre property on the edge of town. Randy often says we grew up across a cornfield from each other, even though neither of us were raised on a farm, there was a corn field between our homes.

Judy’s parents, Lawrence and Joan Fletcher, moved to Prospect when Judy was one. She is the youngest of four girls. Both her parents and oldest sister Anita are deceased while her other sisters still live in/around Prospect and spend their winters in central Florida. Randy’s parents, Ray and Barbara, continue to live in Prospect on that same property he was raised on. Born in Hamilton, Ohio, at five years old, Randy, younger brother Scott and their parents moved to Prospect when Ray, an executive with Whirlpool Corp., was transferred to Whirlpool’s Marion division.

Growing up in Prospect, Randy’s summers were full of family chores in the morning, gathering at the town swimming pool in the afternoon and then playing or watching baseball at the town park. Judy also spent her summer afternoons at the swimming pool and evenings working in the concession stand at the ballpark, then as a teenager she worked as a lifeguard. We look back on growing up in a small town fondly, but more than once our kids thanked us for moving to Dublin, which we have called home for 39 years.

At Elgin High School it was the occasional academic focus for Randy, dedication to baseball and basketball, and a failed one-year attempt in the Marching Band. Judy stayed busy participating in the Marching Band as a majorette for a few years and as a cheerleader for four years. Judy focused a bit more on her academics. One of the stories Judy likes to share is at her graduation, Randy, who had graduated the previous year, was in the hall catching up with one of his coaches rather than in the gym watching the ceremony. He heard her name called, for an academic honor, and realized he had no idea what had just happened.

After high school graduation Randy was off to Otterbein College where he thought he would prepare for a career in marine biology while continuing his love of playing baseball. Along the way the course of study changed and while the baseball playing days continued all four years, it was apparent the on-field talent had reached its highest level, and the playing days would conclude at graduation. While at Otterbein Randy learned of a few schools around the country that had begun offering graduate level programs in Sports Administration. The idea of pursuing a career in the business side of professional baseball sounded perfect. A master’s degree from The Ohio State University and a 40-year career with the Columbus Clippers (5 years) and the International League of Professional Baseball Clubs (35 years) followed. Judy attended The Ohio State University, majored in Business Administration and later became a CPA. Judy’s first job out of college was at a small actuarial firm, then she worked at Battelle for 30 years in the Finance area. When Battelle offered an early retirement, she decided to take the offer. She wanted to continue working and using her finance skills but, in an area where she could really see the impact. She spent the next seven years as the CEO of the statewide non-profit Children’s Hunger Alliance

whose mission is to ensure children across Ohio have the food they needed to live a healthy life.

We were married the summer after Judy finished college and this June will celebrate our 45th anniversary. We are the very proud parents of two boys. Our oldest, Taylor, went to Miami University and is an accounting major like his mom and our youngest son Reid went to The University of Dayton (UD) and majored in Sports Administration like his dad. Honestly, no pressure was applied; it just worked out that way. Taylor met his wife Chelsea at Miami University and they have 3 children: Lucy 9, Wells 6 and Zoe 4. They currently live in a suburb of Chicago after time in Cincinnati, Amsterdam and Birmingham. Reid met his wife Bethany at UD and they have 2 children: Avery 8 and Callie 6. They currently live in a suburb of Charlotte after time in the Orlando area. We think being Poppa and Gammy to our five grandkids is the best job ever. We travel often to see them participate in various activities and celebrate special occasions. While we wish they were closer, they are all happy and healthy, which is really all we ever wanted.

Judy was raised in a strong Christian family and faithfully attended the Richland Road Church of Christ in Marion. Randy was raised in and confirmed in Prospect UMC. We attended Indian Run UMC in Dublin for roughly 30 years before pursuing a new church home in the fall of 2022. After a few months of visiting several churches and hearing about Cornerstone from a fellow parishioner at Indian Run, on a snowy Sunday in mid-January of 2023 we decided to drive to Marysville and check-it-out. We are so very thankful and feel blessed to be part of a family of Christians with a tremendous level of commitment and a willingness to share their abundance of unique talents.
