THE PROCLAMATION OF THE WORD

First Reading Isaiah 1:1, 10-20

Reader A reading from the Book of Isaiah.

The vision of Isaiah son of Amoz, which he saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem in the days of Uzziah, Jotham, Ahaz, and Hezekiah, kings of Judah. Hear the word of the Lord, you rulers of Sodom! Listen to the teaching of our God, you people of Gomorrah! What to me is the multitude of your sacrifices? says the Lord; I have had enough of burnt offerings of rams and the fat of fed beasts; I do not delight in the blood of bulls, or of lambs, or of goats. When you come to appear before me, who asked this from your hand? Trample my courts no more; bringing offerings is futile; incense is an abomination to me. New moon and sabbath and calling of convocation—I cannot endure solemn assemblies with iniquity. Your new moons and your appointed festivals my soul hates; they have become a burden to me, I am weary of bearing them. When you stretch out your hands, I will hide my eyes from you; even though you make many

prayers, I will not listen; your hands are full of blood. Wash yourselves; make yourselves clean; remove the evil of your doings from before my eyes; cease to do evil, learn to do good; seek justice, rescue the oppressed, defend the orphan, plead for the widow. Come now, let us argue it out, says the Lord: though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be like snow; though they are red like crimson, they shall become like wool. If you are willing and obedient, you shall eat the good of the land; but if you refuse and rebel, you shall be devoured by the sword; for the mouth of the Lord has spoken.

Second Reading Hebrews 11:1-3, 8-16

Reader A reading from the Letter to the Hebrews.

Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. Indeed, by faith our ancestors received approval. By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was made from things that are not visible. By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to set out for a place that he was to receive as an inheritance; and he set out, not knowing where he was

going. By faith he stayed for a time in the land he had been promised, as in a foreign land, living in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. For he looked forward to the city that has foundations, whose architect and builder is God. By faith he received power of procreation, even though he was too old and Sarah herself was barren because he considered him faithful who had promised. Therefore from one person, and this one as good as dead, descendants were born, "as many as the stars of heaven and as the innumerable grains of sand by the seashore." All of these died in faith without having received the promises, but from a distance they saw and greeted them. They confessed that they were strangers and foreigners on the earth, for people who speak in this way make it clear that they are seeking a homeland. If they had been thinking of the land that they had left behind, they would have had opportunity to return. But as it is, they desire a better country, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God; indeed, he has prepared a city for them.


Eucharistic Prayer





TODAY'S MUSIC

PRELUDE: Today's opening hymn was written by British composer Herbert Howells (1892-1983). His contribution to the twentieth century organ repertoire is one of the most significant of any British composer. He studied with, among others, Stanford, who described the young Howells as his "son in music". He has remained the quintessential English church composer of the twentieth century. His "Preludio - 'Sine Nomine' is the first in his set of "Six Pieces", written between 1939 and 1945. It tends to get less play than some other pieces by Howells that are bigger and louder but it is a fine piece, showing the immediately recognizable musical fingerprints of the composer. The title as nothing to do with the Vaughan Williams tune of the same name however. It simply means "prelude without a name"! In the key of F# minor, there is a combination of the modern and the archaic in the work. Touches of the delicacy of an English clavichord are present, as well as a wonderfully lush "chorale-section" in the center. The final hushed chords personify the word "atmospheric."

I am celebrating the birthday today of another British composer, Cecil Armstrong Gibbs (1889-1960). Gibbs was a prolific and versatile composer, best known for his choral music and, in particular, songs. He also devoted much of his career to the amateur choral and festival movements in Britain. His little "Minuet in Classical Style" comes from "An Easy Album for Organ". It is his early 20th century take on a Baroque minuet, and takes the typical form of a minuet: an A section, followed by a B section, followed by a repeat of the A section. Although his music is rarely played today, he attained a high level of popularity in his lifetime.

Also being remembered today is composer Michael Haydn, born in 1737, and died on this day in 1809. He was the younger brother of the more famous Franz Josef Haydn. Michael's sacred choral works are generally regarded as his most important; his musical taste and skill showed themselves best in his church compositions. His organ work "How Wondrous and Great" is a prelude on his own hymn-tune "Lyons" and is a continuous set of variations on the tune. The variations build in volume, change key once, and conclude with a strong statement of part of the tune.

COMMUNION SOLO: Hymn Meditation on "Olivet" is a lyrical piano composition by Reginald Gerig (1919-2018), long-time time Professor of Piano at Wheaton College in Wheaton, Illinois. A flowing introduction precedes the statement of the familiar tune, today's communion hymn. The opening eight-bar introduction then concludes this evocative little work.

POSTLUDE: Today's opening hymn gets another treatment in American composer Michael Burkhardt's Voluntary on "Michael". The term "voluntary" simply refers to an organ piece played either before or after a church service. English composers of the Baroque, such as Henry Purcell and Jeremiah Clarke, were known for their voluntaries—their famous trumpet voluntaries being often heard at weddings. In Michael Burkhardt's "Voluntary", the embellished tune is heard on a trumpet stop over dancing rhythms in the accompaniment. As an aside, the composer of the hymn, Herbert Howells originally called his hymn "A Hymn Tune for Charterhouse", the latter being the name of the school, whose director requested Howells write new music in 1930 for the words "All My Hope on God Is Founded". When the hymn was published in 1936, Howells changed the name of the tune to "Michael" in honour of his son who had died in childhood the previous year.
