


# The Third Sunday of Advent December 14th, 2025—10:00 a.m.



Reader A reading from the Book of Isaiah.

The wilderness and the dry land shall be glad, the desert shall rejoice and blossom; like the crocus it shall blossom abundantly, and rejoice with joy and singing. The glory of Lebanon shall be given to it, the majesty of Carmel and Sharon. They shall see the glory of the Lord, the majesty of our God. Strengthen the weak hands, and make firm the feeble knees. Say to those who are of a fearful heart, "Be strong, do not fear! Here is your God. He will come with vengeance, with terrible recompense. He will come and save you." Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, and the ears of the deaf unstopped; then the lame shall leap like a deer, and the tongue of the speechless sing for joy. For waters shall break forth in the wilderness, and streams in the desert; the burning sand shall become a pool, and the thirsty ground springs of water; the haunt of jackals shall become a swamp, the grass shall become reeds and rushes. A highway shall be there, and it shall be called the Holy Way; the unclean shall not travel on it, but it shall be for God's people; no traveller, not even fools, shall go astray. No lion shall be there, nor shall any ravenous beast come up on it; they shall not be found there, but the redeemed shall walk there. And the ransomed of the Lord shall return, and come to Zion with singing; everlasting joy shall be upon their heads; they shall obtain joy and gladness, and sorrow and sighing shall flee away.


# Prayer over the Gifts


## **Eucharistic Prayer**




Presider

As children of your redeeming purpose who await the coming of your Son, we offer you our praise, with angels and archangels and the whole company of heaven singing the hymn of your unending glory:






Presider







#### Today's Music

**PRELUDE:** Our Cantabile Ringers, who last Saturday and Sunday rang a set of six Christmas pieces throughout the "Candlelight Christmas" event at Lang Pioneer Village, offer a setting of two carols in **Jason W. Krug's "Christmas Meditation"**. Krug (b. 1978) is a native of Indianapolis, Indiana. He holds a degree in music from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He is a full-time freelance composer, arranger, clinician, and teacher. Since his first publication in 2006, he's had over 300 compositions and arrangements published for handbells, piano, strings, organ, and choir. This piece features the German carol "Lo, How a Rose" along with "In Dulci Jubilo".

Several of our parishioners have recently joined to form "The Whistling Saints". Julie Deck (soprano recorder), Kris Dobyns (alto recorder), John Bird (bass recorder) and Lorraine Land (melodica) will play arrangements of "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" and "The Angel Gabriel" as part of today's prelude. The first is a metrical paraphrase of the O Antiphons, a series of plainchant antiphons attached to the Magnificat at Vespers over the final days before Christmas. The hymn has its origins over 1,200 years ago in monastic life in the 8th or 9th century. Seven days before Christmas Eve monasteries would sing the "O antiphons" in anticipation of Christmas Eve when the eighth antiphon, "O Virgo virginum" ("O Virgin of virgins") would be sung before and after Mary's canticle, the Magnificat. "The Angel Gabriel" is a Basque Christmas folk carol about the Annunciation to the Virgin Mary by the archangel Gabriel that she would become the mother of Jesus Christ the Son of God.

**COMMUNION MEDITATION**: The Whistling Saints offer an arrangement of "The Huron Carol" during Communion. The Huron Carol, Canada's oldest Christmas song, began as "Jesous Ahatonhia" in the Huron (Wendat) language around 1642, written by Jesuit missionary Jean de Brébeuf using Indigenous imagery like hunters and animal furs for the Nativity story, set to a French folk tune. English lyrics by Jesse Edgar Middleton (1926) adapted these themes ("Twas in the moon of wintertime"), portraying Jesus born in a bark lodge, and the carol continues to be sung, connecting to both Indigenous heritage and Canadian tradition

**ANTHEM: "An Advent Proclamation"** by **Olaf G. Malmin** (1939-2021) joins lines from Isaiah and John, and features beautiful descending cascades of alleluias, unison passages, and a supportive piano accompaniment. Malmin was a Minnesota-based composer, having a long career as a teacher, violinist and vocal recitalist.

**POSTLUDE**: The service concludes with a strong setting of today's concluding hymn "Lo, He Comes with Clouds Descending" by the late Canadian composer and organist Allanson G. Y. Brown (1902-1982). Brown was an organist in England and Ireland before coming to Canada and taking up positions at Dominion United Church and later at St. Matthew's Anglican Church, both in Ottawa. His setting of the hymn opens majestically, then takes off, with the tune in the top voice, interspersed with his own original music based on the tune. His harmonies stayed closer to the 19th century than to our own time, much like the music of Healey Willan.
