


# The Feast of St. Nicholas December 7th, 2025—4:00 p.m.

Reader

The First Lesson is written in the First Epistle of John, in the fourth chapter, beginning at the seventh verse.

Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us. By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit. And we have seen and do testify that the Father has sent his Son as the Saviour of the world.

Reader The Second Lesson is written in the Gospel of St Mark, in the tenth chapter, beginning at the thirteenth verse.





## Today's Music

**PRELUDE:** Several of the musical selections today were chosen in celebration of the Feast of St. Nicholas.

**Légende de Saint Nicolas** by **Jean Langlais** (1907-1991) comes from his "Folkloric Suite", Op. 77, a classic work from this French master of the organ. Published in 1954, the Suite's second movement is a nod to St. Nicholas. Langlais composed a little tune which you will hear throughout the work, in various forms and guises, using flute, string and reed stops.

The piano collection "Album for the Young" (Album für die Jugend), Op. 68, was composed by the famous German Romantic composer **Robert Schumann** (1810-1856) for his three daughters in 1848. The album consists of a collection of 43 short works, suitable to be played by children or beginners. The second part is marked Für Erwachsenere (For adults; For more grown-up ones) and contains more demanding pieces. The twelfth piece in this volume is entitled **Knecht Ruprecht** (Knight Rupert). There is no exact English equivalent for this legendary German character. Clad in a rough Santa Claus costume, he makes his rounds before Christmas and cathechizes the children concerning their behaviour.

**Song for St. Nicholas Past** was written by the contemporary English composer, singer and conductor Betty Roe (b. 1930). Roe has composed over 300 solo songs, as well as choral and sacred music, musicals, operas, instrumental pieces, and music for schools. This piece comes from a volume entitled "The Sunday Organist – Easy Fillers and Voluntaries". It is a short and beautiful little piece, having a four-bar theme which she takes through several keys, and expands upon it.

**ANTHEMS:** The Scripture readings during the last days of Advent present the Virgin Mary as a central figure for our meditation and an example in preparation for the Nativity of our Lord. The ancient "Ave Maria" is Latin for "Hail Mary" and refers to a traditional Catholic prayer that addresses the Virgin Mary. The Flemish composer **Jacob Arcadelt** (c. 1505-1568) was long thought to have written this beautiful little **Ave Maria.** However, scholars now believe that this Ave Maria is an adaptation by the French composer Pierre-Louis-Phillippe Dietsch (1808-1865) of Arcadelt's secular madrigal "Nous voyons que les hommes" originally for female voices. The bass line in particular is entirely Dietsch's work. Regardless, it is a beautiful little anthem, suitable for any Marian festival.

**POSTLUDE:** Today's concluding hymn is being sung to the tune "Wareham", written by William Knapp, and named after his birthplace. A glover by trade, Knapp served as the parish clerk at St. James's Church in Poole (1729-1768) and was organist in both Wareham and Poole. Known in his time as the "country psalm-singer," Knapp published A Set of New Psalm Tunes and Anthems (1738) and New Church Melody (1753). WAREHAM was published in his 1738 collection with the melody in the tenor as a setting for Psalm 36. Canadian composer **Richard C. Baker** included a prelude on this tune in his "Three Hymn Invocations" from 1991. The first line of the familiar tune is plainly heard at the outset. He then builds short little imitative sections on each of the successive phrases of the hymn, finishing with a long pedal note under a strong eighth-note passages on the manuals.
