But not a hair of your head will perish. By your endurance you will gain your souls."




#### **Eucharistic Prayer**

#### **TODAY'S MUSIC**

PRELUDE: Keeping faithful to God and trusting our Saviour is highlighted in today's Gospel reading, and illustrated musically in the preludes and anthem this morning. One German chorale that has this theme is "Von Gott Will Ich Nicht Lassen" (From God Shall Naught Divide Me). I've chosen three varied preludes by three German composers. Johann Gottfired Walther (1684-1748) was a German music theorist, organist, composer and lexicographer of the Baroque era. As an organ composer, Walther became famous for his organ transcriptions of orchestral concertos by contemporary Italian and German masters. He made 14 transcriptions of concertos by Albinoni, Gentili, Taglietti, Torelli, Vivaldi and Telemann. These works were the models for Bach to write his famous transcriptions of concertos by Vivaldi and others. Walther as the city organist of Weimar also wrote exactly 132 organ preludes based on Lutheran chorale melodies. His setting is for manuals alone and is in two brief sections. Friedrich Wilhelm Marpurg (1718-1795) spent most of his life in Berlin in government posts, but was also able to have a forty-year career as a composer and music theorist. His setting places the tune on soft flutes and a mixture stop, accompanied by soft flute stops and pedal. Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750) wrote several settings of this tune. His BWV 658 setting comes from his "18 Leipzig Chorales", a collection amassed near the end of his life from previous chorale preludes he had written. Critic Ian Carson writes, "The melody of this chorale probably came from a secular song, and the words of the first verse have some parallels with Psalm 23. There are suggestions of joy in the figurations of the three manual voices, and the pedals place the chorale melody in the tenor. The ending of the prelude tintinnabulates..." (rings like bells)..."in what appears to be a curious piece of sound-painting."

**ANTHEM:** As stated above, in today's Gospel reading, we are reminded that we need to keep our trust in God, even when facing the most challenging of circumstances. This brought to mind Canadian composer Stephen Hatfield's evocative anthem "When the Stars Fall". Hatfield (b. 1956) wrote an original text to a folk tune he came across in Jutland (northern Denmark). He writes, "The mood and texture is simple, limpid and serene: the peace that passes understanding." The text tells us that whatever might happen, we need to put our trust in the Lord. This anthem was commissioned for the 15th anniversary of the Arkansas-based choir "One Voice: An Outreach Choir". This anthem was recently purchased in memory of Paul Burke, a former bass in the choir.

**POSTLUDE:** The tune for today's Opening Hymn gets a strong and rhythmic treatment in Marpurg's prelude on "Ein' Feste Burg". This is one of the best known hymns by the Protestant Reformer Martin Luther, a prolific hymnwriter. Luther wrote the words and composed the hymn tune between 1527 and 1529. It has been translated into English at least seventy times and also into many other languages. Marpurg places the tune in the pedals on strong principal and reed stops, while the hands dance around, playing a jagged dotted rhythm.
