


The Reign of Christ the King November 23rd, 2025—10:00 a.m.






Eucharistic Prayer

Presider



TODAY'S MUSIC

PRELUDE: "Te Deum" is a Latin Christian hymn of praise, traditionally sung on occasions of public rejoicing. Its title comes from its opening Latin words, Te Deum laudamus, which translate to "We praise Thee, O God". The text is largely biblical and has been set to music by numerous composers over the centuries. The Latvian composer Péteris Vasks (b.1946) writes music in a wide range of genres, including orchestral, operatic, vocal and chamber, but he has always considered it a duty to write for the magnificent Walcker Organ in its home, the Riga Dom or Cathedral. The cathedral is the largest medieval church in the Baltic States, dating from 1211. One of his five substantial organ pieces is his thirteen-minute long "Te Deum", written in 1991 to celebrate the re-creation of the Latvian state after Soviet occupation. Its thunderous opening yields to quieter thematic material with hints of Latvian folk tunes in the deeper regions of the organ, with brighter descants high above. This leads to a Hymn of Praise for the new State, not chant-based but swinging from major to minor, which goes through a whole gamut of contrasts in dynamics and tempi. The piece then dies away to a sublime conclusion.

ANTHEM: On this Reign of Christ Sunday, we celebrate Christ's role as Lord of all – the world, the church, and our lives. Christ's kingship is featured in the readings, and often the music describes Christ's power as King over everything. Franz Joseph Haydn (1732-1809), the "king of the symphony" wrote fourteen large-scale masses between 1750 and 1802. Today's anthem, "Glorious Is Thy Name Almighty" comes from Haydn's third mass, written in 1766 and sometimes referred to as his Saint Cecilia Mass. This nickname may refer to a performance of this Mass on an unknown November 22nd (St. Cecilia's Day) by a Viennese musician's fraternity. American composer Elwood Coggin (1914-1996) arranged part of Haydn's "Gloria" movement into this three-part anthem, using an English text.

POSTLUDE: Handel's crowning achievement, Messiah, was not an immediate success. In 1741, Handel was heavily in debt following a string of musical failures. It seemed that his career was over and he may even be forced to go to debtors' prison. On April 8, 1741, Handel gave what he believed to be his final concert. Later that year, two key events changed the course of Handel's life and the landscape of music forever—his friend Charles Jennens wrote a libretto taken from the Bible, based on the life of Jesus Christ, and gave it to Handel. Then, Handel was given funding by a group of charities from Dublin, Ireland, to compose a new work for a benefit performance that would help free men from debtors' prison. Handel would also receive his own commission for composing the work, which in turn helped him on his path to reversing his own misfortune. The composition of Messiah, the complete 260-page oratorio, began on August 22, 1741, and was composed in just 24 days, when Handel finished the final orchestration on September 14, 1741. Handel composed Messiah without getting much sleep or even eating much food. When his assistants brought him his meals, they were often left uneaten. His servants would often find him in tears as he composed. When he completed "Hallelujah," he reportedly told his servant, "I did think I did see all Heaven before me, and the great God Himself seated on His throne, with His company of Angels." The text for "Hallelujah" comes from the book of Revelation in the New Testament. Revelation 19:6: "Alleluia: for the Lord God omnipotent reigneth." Revelation 19:16: "And he hath on his vesture and on his thigh a name written, King of Kings, and Lord of Lords." Revelation 11:15 reads, "And he shall reign for ever and ever." Today's organ arrangement was made by American composer and arranger Arthur Wildman. He made numerous arrangements of vocal and orchestral pieces for the organ. His arrangement of the "Hallelujah Chorus" illustrates the joy in the music without having to hear the familiar words.
