Hymn Study on "St. Anne"

TODAY'S MUSIC

PRELUDE: We welcome back to St. John's this afternoon trumpeter Pat Remy. Pat learned the trumpet from her public school principal who was a Salvation Army trumpet player. Later she took private lessons and passed her Grade 10. She lived in Switzerland where she played in a brass ensemble which did exclusively sacred music, mainly for what was called the Vesper brass call from the tower of the Minster in Basel. Since moving to Peterborough, she has played in the concert band, a quintet called Vintage Brass, two stage bands, a Dixie group, and most recently founded Jazz Junction, a sextet which plays standards.

Paul F. Page (b. 1947) is composer, teacher, and performer now retired from a 36-year teaching career in music, journalism, and English. His original music has been published by seven different notable publishers. A number of his works have been performed and recorded in Europe and Canada, the former Soviet Union, Japan, and extensively in the USA. Among his many compositions are several large series of organ works: 40+ organ voluntaries, 30+ organ meditations, and numerous other compositions. His "Meditation for Trumpet and Organ" was written in May of 2023. It is a slow beautiful work, giving each player the opportunity to show their expressive playing.

French composer and organist **Jean-Paul Verpeaux** (b. 1951) was born in Paris. He has composed more than 300 pieces, primarily for the organ. Verpeaux began playing as a church organist at age 16 and pursued it for many years alongside a primary career as an electronics engineer for the French Air Force. During these years he composed music for a number of military films and taught electronic music at the music academy in Chinon. He had planned to spend his retirement by returning actively to organ performance, but a diagnosis of Parkinson's disease prevented him from returning to live playing. However, Verpeaux has remained active as a composer of works for others to play and creating virtual organ performances with software, including several programs he has developed himself. His "Adagio de Verdun" was written in February of 2016 and is dedicated to the victims of World War I. Verpeaux writes in a very warm romantic and accessible style – this piece featuring some harmonies that tug at the heart-strings of the listener.

MAGNIFICAT and NUNC DIMITTIS: Today's choral setting of the Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis alternates between unison lines based upon Gregorian tones, and an SATB chorale-style texture. This one was written by the early Renaissance English composer **Thomas Morley** (c. 1557–1602). An influential composer, music theorist, and publisher, he is best known for adapting the Italian madrigal to the English style. He served as an organist at St. Paul's Cathedral and later as a Gentleman of the Chapel Royal. Morley's significant works include "A Plaine and Easie Introduction to Practicall Musicke (1597), a key music education text, and the compilation "The Triumphes of Oriana (1601).

Today's Music continued...

ANTHEM: English composer **Ralph Vaughan Williams** (1872-1958) wrote some of his most moving and effective choral music to religious words, as in "Let Us Now Praise Famous Men" – a setting of texts from the Old Testament book of Ecclesiastes, chapter 44. This piece, while touching one's emotions, and very much in the Vaughan Williams harmonic style, is uncluttered and convincing in its simplicity. Originally written for a solo voice and keyboard, it can equally be sung by a unison choir as will be done this afternoon.

POSTLUDE: William Croft's hymn "O God, Our Help in Ages Past ("St. Anne") will be heard in a setting by a Canterbury Cathedral organist. This "Hymn Study on St. Anne" is a setting by **C. Charlton Palmer** (1871-1944). It comprises a little fugue over the tune in the pedals. Near the end, he inverts this idea and places the tune in the hands while the feet play the subject of the fugue. His choral compositions include a Morning and Evening Service in E flat, an Evening Service in F minor and a Morning and Evening Service in F for men's voices. His best-known works for solo organ are the three sets of twelve "Studies on Old English Hymn Tunes" from which today's Postlude comes. He also wrote at least two chamber works: a trio for piano, violin and cello dated 1905, and a quartet for piano, flute, horn and bassoon.
