


Harvest Thanksgiving October 12th, 2025—10:00 a.m.

THE PROCLAMATION OF THE WORD

Deuteronomy 26:1-11

When you have come into the land that the Lord your God is giving you as an inheritance to possess, and you possess it, and settle in it, you shall take some of the first of all the fruit of the ground, which you harvest from the land that the Lord your God is giving you, and you shall put it in a basket and go to the place that the Lord your God will choose as a dwelling for his name. You shall go to the priest who is in office at that time, and say to him, 'Today I declare to the Lord your God that I have come into the land that the Lord swore to our ancestors to give us.' When the priest takes the basket from your hand and sets it down before the altar of the Lord your God, you shall make this response before the Lord your God: 'A wandering Aramean was my ancestor; he went down into Egypt and lived there as an alien, few in number, and there he became a great nation, mighty and populous. 




Eucharistic Prayer

Through your Son, who lived and toiled, wept and laughed among us, you were one with us in human flesh. You sent your Spirit to bring new life to tired bones and souls, causing living water to spring from dry, thirsty places and putting a new song on our lips. So, together with all your saints and angels, with prophets and martyrs, the living and the departed, we sing to you a hymn of unending praise:

Glory and honour to you, God our life, for the gift of Jesus our Lord. Christ is the first fruit of your creation, with you before time, bringing all to completion through his death on a cross. 





TODAY'S MUSIC

PRELUDE: "Harvest Festival" is a collection of four chorale preludes on familiar Thanksgiving tunes, arranged by the American organist and composer Robert J. Powell (1932-2025). He composed in nearly all genres common to church music, including anthems, service music, hymn concertatos, organ music, music for handbell choir, and large-scale oratorios – all in a conservative, neo-Romantic style. He wrote for the average church choir and organist, stating he writes for "choirs of twenty-five because that's what most choirs are. When you come right down to it, most choirs are not of cathedral ability or size. My pieces are all practical things and useful for specific occasions." The four movements of his "Harvest Festival" are:

"Come, Ye Thankful People, Come" – where he intersperses his own music with phrases of the hymn. "We Gather Together" – here the lines of the hymn seem to appear out of the texture before he concludes with a straightforward version of the hymn.

"God, Who Stretched the Spangled Heavens" – not a familiar text to us, but the tune will be, as Powell introduces it at the outset. He then places it in a minor key, after which he returns to the original key, ending with a nice little surprise.

"Now Thank We All Our God" – a strong ending to this set, where he embellishes the melody with extra notes. After a quieter middle section, the piece finishes on principal and reed stops, bringing "Harvest Festival" to a majestic conclusion. Of

INTROIT: Over the summer, when I was planning the choral music schedule for the fall term, I couldn't seem to find a short rhythmic Thanksgiving Introit, so I wrote one myself. This little Thanksgiving Introit is lively and syncopated and has a text from today's appointed Psalm 100.

TRIO: Our three Choral Scholars will offer their rendition of American composers Daniel Burton's "Give Thanks to the Lord", the fourth in his set of "Five Unison Psalms". The words are nestled in a cheerful bell-like accompaniment. The strong repetitive melody, divided up between the singers today, stresses the folk quality of Psalm 136. Burton (b. 1944) wrote much of his music while he was Organist and Composer-in-Residence at the 4000-member First United Methodist Church of San Diego from 1973-2003.

ANTHEM: Today's anthem, "Thanks Be to God Forever", is an arrangement by American composer Hal Hopson (1933-2025) of the Credo movement from Franz Josef Haydn's "Missa Cellensis" from 1782 – the eighth Mass setting Haydn composed. Hopson made a paraphrase of Psalm 65, matched it with Haydn's splendid music, and created this useful Thanksgiving anthem, full of joyful vigour.

POSTLUDE: Many organists today will be playing German composer Sigfrid Karg-Elert's "Marche Triomphale", based on the hymn "Now Thank We All, Our God". It was written in 1909 as one of his 66 Chorale Improvisations. Even now, 92 years after his premature death from diabetes in 1933 at the age of 55, he is probably best-known for this one work. The tune is hidden among large solid chords and colourful romantic turn-of-the-century harmonies. A couple of quieter sections contrast the bold and dramatic writing throughout.
