


# The Seventeenth Sunday after Pentecost October 5th, 2025—10:00 a.m.



# THE PROCLAMATION OF THE WORD

First Reading Lamentations 1:1-6

*Reader* A reading from the Lamentations of Jeremiah.

How lonely sits the city that once was full of people! How like a widow she has become, she that was great among the nations! She that was a princess among the provinces has become subject to forced labour. She weeps bitterly in the night, with tears on her cheeks; among all her lovers, she has no one to comfort her; all her friends have dealt treacherously with her; they have become her enemies. Judah has gone into exile with suffering and hard servitude; she lives now among the nations; she finds no resting place; her pursuers have all overtaken her in the midst of her distress. The roads to Zion mourn, for no one comes to the festivals; all her gates are desolate; her priests groan; her young girls grieve, and her lot is bitter. Her foes have become the masters; her enemies prosper because the Lord has made her suffer for the multitude of her transgressions; her children have gone away, captives before the foe. From daughter Zion has departed all her majesty. Her princes have become like stags that find no pasture; they fled without strength before the pursuer.

For those who led us away captive asked us for a song, and our oppressors called for mirth: "Sing us one of the songs of Zion." How shall we sing the Lord's song upon an alien soil? **R** 

If I forget you, O Jerusalem, let my right hand forget its skill. Let my tongue cleave to the roof of my mouth if I do not remember you, if I do not set Jerusalem above my highest joy.  $\bf R$

Second Reading 2 Timothy 1:1-14

*Reader* A reading from the Second Letter of Paul to Timothy.

Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, for the sake of the promise of life that is in Christ Jesus, to Timothy, my beloved child: Grace, mercy, and peace from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Lord. I am grateful to God—whom I worship with a clear conscience, as my ancestors did—when I remember you constantly in my prayers night and day. Recalling your tears, I long to see you so that I may be filled with joy. I am reminded of your sincere faith, a faith that lived first in your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice and now, I am sure, lives in you. For this reason I remind you to rekindle the gift of God that is within you through the laying on of my hands, for God did not give us a spirit of cowardice but rather a spirit of power and of love and of self-discipline. Do not be ashamed, then, of the testimony about our Lord or of me his prisoner, but join with me in suffering for the gospel, in the power of God, who saved us and called us with a holy calling, not according to our works but according to his own purpose and grace, and this grace was given to us in Christ Jesus before the ages began, but it has now been revealed through the appearing of our Savior Jesus Christ, who abolished death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel. For this gospel I was appointed a herald and an apostle and a teacher, and for

this reason I suffer as I do. But I am not ashamed, for I know the one in whom I have put my trust, and I am sure that he is able to guard until that day the deposit I have entrusted to him. Hold to the standard of sound teaching that you have heard from me, in the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. Guard the good deposit entrusted to you, with the help of the Holy Spirit living in us.

## **TODAY'S MUSIC**

PRELUDE: "An Wasserflüssen Babylon" (By the rivers of Babylon) is a Lutheran hymn by Wolfgang Dachstein, which was first published in Strasbourg in 1525. The text of the hymn is a paraphrase of Psalm 137, today's appointed psalm, describing the desperate situation of the Israelites in exile. In this setting by J.S. Bach, BWV 653, the ornamented melody in the middle voice is wedged between two upper voices and pedal. He made several versions of this prelude. This version was clearly Bach's favourite, as he revised the material in his later years in Leipzig, by adding even more ornamentation to the melody and further accentuating the drawn-out rhythm as a slow sarabande. A much later German composer was Ernst Pepping (1901-1981). A teacher and organist, Pepping spent his early years in Berlin, and from 1934 until his death, worked and lived in Spandau. He is regarded as an important composer of Protestant sacred music in the 20th century. Pepping's major organ work is his three-volume Grosses Orgelbuch (Great Organ Book), which provides pieces for the entire liturgical year. His setting of "An Wasserflüssen Babylon", from the second volume, places the melody on an 8-foot solo stop in the pedals under soft flutes and strings.

"On Eagle's Wings" is a Christian hymn by the Catholic priest and composer Michael Joncas. Originally composed for the funeral of a friend's father in 1976 and published in 1979, the song unexpectedly gained significant popularity in both Catholic and Protestant hymnody. While it has also been criticized for its saccharine and folksy approach to scripture, it is a popular hymn at Christian funerals. Originally written in English, it has been translated into other languages, including Italian, Spanish, and Polish. American composer Dan R. Edwards arranged it for three octaves of handbells. Edwards gives this familiar hymn a gentle, contemporary pop sound in his arrangement.

**ANTHEM:** "Like as the Hart" is a short anthem by the noted Canadian organist and composer Healey Willan. Willan wrote much organ music for recital and service use, as well as numerous choral works of varied levels of difficulty. "Like as the Hart", with a text from Psalm 42:1-2, opens with a section for sopranos or a soprano soloist. Today you will hear Mary McLoughlin as soloist. The choir enters with a repeat of the first phrase of the soloist's music. The anthem trails off shortly thereafter to a quiet ending. This is an example of his anthem-writing for the smaller church choir – easy, tuneful and relatively short in duration.

**POSTLUDE:** Willan's "Festival" is the third of his *Three Pieces for Organ*, published in 1954. The energetic first measure serves somewhat as a recurring motif and the basis from which the first section unfolds. A quieter middle section follows, with many imitations of a new motif. After the rich harmony and texture of the middle section, a repetition of the first section is made. There is a coda of six measures which brings the piece to a brilliant and affirmative conclusion. "Festival" has the sound of ceremony about it, and is one of my favourite Willan organ works.
