


Holy Cross Day September 14th, 2025—10:00 a.m.



THE PROCLAMATION OF THE WORD

Reader A reading from the Book of Numbers.

The message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written, "I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart." Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe. For Jews demand signs and Greeks desire wisdom, but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God.

Christ will come in glory.





TODAY'S MUSIC

PRELUDE: On this Holy Cross Day, the plainsong tune "Crux Fidelis" (Faithful Cross) came to mind. It is often sung on Good Friday during the Adoration of the Cross. The text comes from the pen of St. Venantius Fortunatus from the 6 th century. The text extols the cross using various "wood" images. I have recently come across the organ music of the Lithuanian organist and composer Vidas Pinkevicius (b. 1976). In March of 2024, he wrote a setting of the Crux Fidelis plainsong tune. You will hear the melody on a reed and flute stop combination, accompanied by soft flutes on the manuals and in the pedals. The accompaniment is actually a three-bar repeated passage over a five-bar repeated passage in the pedals.

Today's Gradual Hymn, "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross" will be featured in preludes by two American composers. Dr. Franklin Ashdown was born in 1942. He was connected to the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints all his life. His passion for medicine led him to studies at the University of Texas in Dallas. He was in Parkland Memorial Hospital in Dallas when President John F. Kennedy was shot and brought into the emergency room, where Ashdown was recruited to be a liaison between reporters and doctors. Over his career he had more than 250 pieces for solo organ published, at least 30 collections of organ music, 15 works for organ with other instruments, and 50 choral works. Ashdown passed away at the age of 80 in January 2023. His Pastorale on "Rockingham" is a quiet, introspective work with the melody first appearing plainly on a flute and soft mixture combination, accompanied by soft flutes and strings. Later the melody is enhanced by additional notes.

Organist Peter Pindar Stearns (1931-2016) who traced his New England roots back to 1630, studied at the Mannes Music School in New York, and later taught there from 1957 to 1989. His Prelude on "Rockingham" is scored for flutes and strings and like the Ashdown piece, is a quiet contemplation on this favourite familiar hymn.

ANTHEM: "God So Loved the World" is an excerpt from the oratorio The Crucifixion: A Meditation on the Sacred Passion of the Holy Redeemer, written by the British composer, organist, choirmaster and educator Sir John Stainer (1840-1901) in 1887. A professor of music at Oxford University, Stainer composed some 230 services, anthems, hymns and cantatas, establishing him as a notable, if perhaps minor, figure in English music. Stainer's anthem is based on the Gospel of John, chapter 3, verses 16-17: "God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son, that whoso believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life. For God sent not his Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world through him might be saved."

POSTLUDE: The plainsong tune "Crux Fidelis" receives one final setting today in the "Toccata sopra Crux Fidelis" by the Italian organist, composer and professor Carlotta Ferrari (b. 1975). She has composed in many genres, developing a personal language that is concerned with the blend of past and present. This is evidenced in her Toccata. However, this is not the typical fast virtuosic

keyboard work from the likes of Bach or Widor. Rather, hers has elements of a toccata, such as in the scale passages and in the freedom left to the performer in certain passages. The past is represented in the relatively straightforward harmonic progressions, and in the use of repetition. The present is represented by the use of a few modern-sounding chords near the end of this short piece.
