THE PROCLAMATION OF THE WORD

First Reading Jeremiah 8:18-9:1

Reader A reading from the Book of Jeremiah.

My joy is gone, grief is upon me, my heart is sick. Hark, the cry of my poor people from far and wide in the land: Is the Lord not in Zion? Is her King not in her? ("Why have they provoked me to anger with their images, with their foreign idols?") The harvest is past, the summer is ended, and we are not saved." For the hurt of my poor people I am hurt, I mourn, and dismay has taken hold of me. Is there no balm in Gilead? Is there no physician there? Why then has the health of my poor people not been restored? O that my head were a spring of water, and my eyes a fountain of tears, so that I might weep day and night for the slain of my poor people!

Remember not our past sins; let your compassion be swift to meet us; for we have been brought very low. Help us, O God our Saviour, for the glory of your Name; deliver us and forgive us our sins, for your Name's sake. **R**

Second Reading 1 Timothy 2:1-7

Reader A reading from the First Letter of Paul to Timothy.

First of all, then, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for everyone, for kings and all who are in high positions, so that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and dignity. This is right and is acceptable in the sight of God our Saviour, who desires everyone to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth. For there is one God; there is also one mediator between God and humankind, Christ Jesus, himself human, who gave himself a ransom for all - this was attested at the right time. For this I was appointed a herald and an apostle (I am telling the truth, I am not lying), a teacher of the Gentiles in faith and truth.

He said to him, 'Take your bill, sit down quickly, and make it fifty.' Then he asked another, 'And how much do you owe?' He replied, 'A hundred containers of wheat.' He said to him, 'Take your bill and make it eighty.' And his master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly; for the children of this age are more shrewd in dealing with their own generation than are the children of light. And I tell you, make friends for yourselves by means of dishonest wealth so that when it is gone, they may welcome you into the eternal homes. Whoever is faithful in a very little is faithful also in much; and whoever is dishonest in a very little is dishonest also in much. If then you have not been faithful with the dishonest wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches? And if you have not been faithful with what belongs to another, who will give you what is your own? No slave can serve two masters; for a slave will either hate the one and love the other, or be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth."






Eucharistic Prayer







TODAY'S MUSIC

PRELUDE: In today's first lesson, God and the prophet Jeremiah express intense sorrow over the Babylonian onslaught that the people of Israel are having to experience. The healing balm that is available in Gilead (a region in Jordan) cannot provide healing for them; only God can do that. The traditional African American spiritual "There Is a Balm in Gilead" dates back to at least the 19th century. Its refrain appears in Washington Glass's 1854 hymn "The Sinner's Cure", although the hymn is substantially based on an earlier work by John Newton. The spiritual's lyrics focus on the New Testament concept of salvation through Jesus Christ. In the Old Testament, the balm of Gilead is a healing compound, symbolizing spiritual medicine for Israel and sinners.

I've chosen three varied settings of this spiritual this morning by three American composers. The piano setting by Fred Bock (1939-1998) is in his usual rich, jazzy, harmonically progressive style. Bock started his own music company in the late 60's and was also an organist in several Presbyterian churches in California. The second setting is another piano arrangement – this one by the Kansas City-based composer, conductor and pianist John Leavitt (b. 1956). His setting, from his 2004 collection entitled "Shall We Gather at the River", is in a more "contemporary praise" vein with a definite southern United States flavour. The third example is an organ setting by the Virginia-based composer and educator Adolphus Hailstork (b. 1941). Hailstork is of African American, Native American and European ancestry and his works blend musical ideas from the African, American and European traditions. His setting of the spiritual comes from his "Suite of Five Spirituals for Organ". After hearing the tune played, Hailstork embellishes the tune with extra notes. He also uses clusters of chords, giving his setting an ethereal sound.

ANTHEM: Canadian composer Barrie Cabena (1933-2025) is no stranger to organ and choral music. His output includes numerous chorale preludes on hymn tunes and many sacred anthems. His setting of the text, "O Jesus, I Have Promised" was published in 1994, and consists of three verses of the original hymn text. The first verse is for three-part choir; the second verse he gives to the female voices, and the last verse is a two-part round.

POSTLUDE: One of Barrie Cabena's numerous organ works is his "Sonata Giojoso", Op. 84. This work was commissioned by St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church in Kitchener for their 125th anniversary celebrations in 1979 and is dedicated to organist Douglas Haas. The work comprises seven continuously played sections, two of which you will hear today. The Toccata III (a reprise of the opening Toccata section) consists of rapid manual passages over a moving bass line. The Chorale which follows immediately thereafter, is a slower hymn-like movement, with short rhythmic solo passages on the pedals interspersed between the phrases of the chorale. The piece concludes with a short final statement of the original Toccata theme.
