#### Palm Lutheran Church Council Meeting Minutes August 12, 2025 Palm Conference Room

Members present: Dexter Daubert, Pastor Carl Rabbe (phone), Keith Kuhlengel, Vivian Rexrode, Kim Gillespie, Phyllis Thornton, Mike Bratton, Bonnie Housel, and Debbie Ricker. Absent: Elaine Bender, Ron Conard and Barry Felt.

- I. Call to order- Dexter called meeting to order at 7:00 pm
- II. Devotions Pastor Carl provided a prayer for the evening devotions.
- III. Adoptions of Agenda All in favor
- IV. Approval of July minutes All in favor
- V. Announcements Clothing Drive preparations are underway. It is a lot of work, but we will continue as it seems to be very well received by the community and most of us enjoy the event.
- VI. **Treasurer's Report** Mike reported that giving has been light as a typical summer. Mortgage account has been good for July as there was good interest received from our Fulton account. Still feeling good about our finances. At Finance meeting Steve Ricker made all aware that the church does have an Endowment Fund which could possibly be used to help aid operating expenses. Mike explained that there is a concern for the high cost of our telephone service. There is a request for possibly someone in our congregation who has knowledge or experience with shopping for a new provider. Please contact our office if anyone is interested.
- VII. Pastor's Report Pastor Carl has requested vacation for October 8-11, October 22-25. Wednesday thru Saturday since pulpit supply for vacation have been difficult. By doing this, Pastor makes it easier for us as he will be here on Sundays. Other request for time off in 2026 will be January 1-5 for Continuing Education and will need a supply pastor. All requests were approved. Pastor also reported there were two deaths during the month of July. We lost Janet Swartzbaugh and Dick Kern. In reviewing our surveys it was a request for absentee ballots for homebound members to participate in voting. Pastor indicated that we would need to change the constitution to allow that and we will vote on that item at our next annual meeting. He will announce that on Sunday. Other items were discussed that were brought up in our member surveys and we found that the requests have already been discussed and some have been remedied.
- VII. Committee Reports Property committee is currently waiting for a second bid on the relocation of the painting. The first bid received was rather high. Funk and Sons have placed scaffolding at window where leak occurred but as of this meeting there has been no rain, so no solutions found as of yet. Bells to be relocated from Yewdall home to Ricker home as of 9/16/2025. The out of service hand soap dispensers are being replaced thanks to Kathy Myer through her employer MSC. Our woodworkers from the congregation are currently working on replacing bases for our Funeral signage. Lawn service that has been paid for by Chris Drupp for many years, will discontinue in the Fall of 2025. A thank you card will be sent to the Drupp family to show our appreciation. Social Ministry Phyllis reports that we hope to work with First United Methodist for Flood Buckets and Rise to Hunger projects. In order to help fund the Rise to Hunger project, we will be placing Blessing Cups to have loose change donated to meet this need. Phyllis and Maureen Bratton will be doing a Temple Talk soon to explain this to the congregation.

**Personnel and Salary** - the committee is working on a 5 year plan to catch up with the Pastor's salary. Much discussion and some solutions to reaching a gradual correction. Deadline for budget coming up and of course there is concern with bill for insurance to surely be higher due to our water crisis this past year and catching up with the pastor's salary. A request from Fatima concerning sick time and rollover resulted in a motion to approve her sick time to rollover to next year with a maximum of 90 hours. If she leaves we are not financially compensable. Keith made the motion to approve. Bonnie seconded it. All in favor. Bonnie then suggested that we all know as council members where we stand with the finances/budget when it is settled.

IX. Motion to adjourn - Keith made motion to adjourn. Phyllis seconded. All in favor. Everyone stood for Lord's Prayer.

Somewhere along life's way, I was asked to write my philosophy of music. Unbeknownst to me, at least at that time, I had one. I just did not consider it a philosophy. It seemed more like a collection of opinions. I dutifully attempted to write one, but mostly remember it as an assignment that received an average grade relative to the volume of effort I gave it. The instructor apparently agreed that my philosophy had not yet tightly coalesced from my collection of opinions, lol. A lifetime of many and varying musical experiences, and seminary which requires lots of thinking about lots of things theologically, would perhaps now produce a more coherent result. Or maybe not.

Instead, I'll just share what I've come to embrace regarding church music. For me the communal voice is the primary, most profound, and utterly beautiful voice of worship. All the other voices absolutely have their place and are of enormous value. We wouldn't invest time, talent, and treasure in them if that was not true! But the primary voice was, is, and always will be the collective you, and the songs you raise to the glory of God in repentance, praise, lament, thanksgiving, remembrance, and reflection are a powerful testament to the Gospel and a thing of beauty to behold. Psalms, hymns, liturgies - the whole thing. And that's coming from the person who spends most of her time listening to you while sitting back-to-back of you!!

Rally Day reminds us that it's time to re-gather for Sunday School, music, and youth activities. These ministries have taken on different form during the summer months (Music in the Park, VBS, clothing drive, a spontaneous funeral luncheon), but now it's time to rally and gather. "... hold us together, make us your own, all people together ..." (ELW #532 Gather Us In). If you've been away, welcome back. We've missed your song.

As September ushers in the fall season, it's a time for reflection and growth. The transition from summer to fall can bring both peace and challenge. Most families experience changing routines including school and college and perhaps spending less time outdoors. This season of harvest reminds us of the potential for personal and spiritual growth. Below are meditations that can help guide us toward emotional healing, spiritual resilience, and deepened connection to our faith.

#### 1. Embracing Change

This change of season is a perfect reminder that change is inevitable, but it is also a natural part of life. Fall invites us to reflect on the rhythm of life. There are times to grow, times to rest, times to grieve, and times to celebrate. Emotional and spiritual growth comes when we embrace these changes with open hearts, knowing that each season, while different, is part of a larger plan.

Meditation: Consider journaling about the transitions you're experiencing right now. What is changing in your life? How can you welcome this change as part of your personal growth journey?

#### 2. Cultivating Gratitude

As the harvest (fall) season begins, it's a time to reflect on God's provision in our lives. We often focus on what's missing or what's challenging, but true emotional growth comes from recognizing the abundance around us. Whether it's the beauty of nature, relationships, or the small moments of peace, these are all signs of goodness in our lives. Gratitude shifts our focus from scarcity to abundance and helps us in the present moment.

Meditation: Take a moment each day this month to reflect on three things you're grateful for. Let this gratitude ground you in emotional resilience and joy.

#### 3. Trusting God's Provision

Just as farmers trust the earth to bring forth a harvest, we are called to trust that God will provide for our emotional and spiritual needs. The season of fall reminds us that, while the future may feel uncertain, God equips us with the emotional and spiritual resources necessary for each new phase in life.

Meditation: Reflect on areas where you feel emotionally drained. How can you trust God to renew and supply the strength you need in these areas? Rest in the assurance that God will equip you for every season.

#### 4. Nurturing Community and Connection

While autumn often draws us indoors, it is also a time to strengthen bonds with family, friends, and faith communities. Authentic connection is essential for emotional healing and spiritual support. Sharing experiences, offering encouragement, or simply being present with one another can uplift the spirit and encourage us during seasons of change. Through intentional acts of kindness and active listening, we create a nurturing environment where everyone can flourish.

#### 5. Finding Peace Amidst Anxiety

As the fall season begins, many of us may be facing new challenges, whether in work, relationships, or personal struggles. The stress and pressure of change can trigger anxiety, but the process of spiritual growth invites us to bring those concerns to God. When we let go of control and trust that peace is available, we open ourselves to calm.

Meditation: When anxiety or worry arises, try pausing to reflect, breathe, and release your concerns. Allow peace to fill your heart, even in the face of uncertainty.

#### 6. Choosing Peace

As the seasons change, so do our emotional landscapes. Peace is not just a feeling but a choice, one that requires intentional effort, especially when life feels chaotic. Peace isn't the absence of trouble but the presence of a deeper calm that transcends our understanding.

Meditation: Reflect on what disrupts your peace the most. What can you surrender to God to experience more of His peace? Try visualizing God's peace filling every part of your heart, allowing it to take over any anxiety or worry.

September marks the beginning of a season of harvest, both in nature and in our hearts. As we reflect on these meditations, we are reminded that God is always at work within us, cultivating emotional and spiritual growth. Whether you're facing new transitions or looking for peace amidst chaos, take this time to center yourself in God's love and trust His process for your life.


