



A Walk Through Luke

The author of the Gospel of Luke wanted to let the non-Jewish world know about the life, ministry and deity of Jesus Christ. Luke wrote his letter in a very thoughtful and methodical manner. This Gospel provides a unique perspective of Jesus highlighting the elevated status Jesus gave to women and children, who in the ancient world were largely ignored and abused. You will be blessed with the teachings, miracles and compassion of Jesus as you read this Jesus focused narrative.

Each weekday over the course of the next six weeks, set aside 15 minutes to read the daily chapter or passage and then reflect upon what the Holy Spirit highlights for you.

To connect with the passage, try these six simple steps:

1. Find a quiet spot to read, mute your phone and set it down outside of your reach.
2. Take a deep breath in, hold it, and then release it. Ask God to talk to you through the passage you are reading.
3. Read the passage. Underline words or verses that get your attention, seem important, or repeat often.
4. When you are done, look back on the items you underlined and think through why they may have been important to you. How do they apply to your life today?
5. (Optional) Answer the questions for this passage. Try to use the text itself to answer the question before using any outside sources.
6. Pray again, thanking God for what He showed you in the passage. Pray for the Spirit to help bring these items into focus during the rest of your day.

Check off the passage. Repeat the next day!

	Day 9	<input type="checkbox"/> Luke 8:1-25	Why did Jesus say he was teaching using parables? How is this related to verse 18, 5:31-32, and 6:46-49?
	Day 10	<input type="checkbox"/> Luke 8:26-56	Often Jesus told healed people to be silent (ie 5:14). Why did Jesus tell this man to tell his story (v 39)?

	Day 13	<input type="checkbox"/> Luke 10	Would you typically consider yourself a "Martha" or a "Mary" with regard to your focus and priorities?
	Day 14	<input type="checkbox"/> Luke 11:1-36	What did Jesus mean by "the sign of Jonah" (verse 29)? How was it related to Jesus' resurrection?

	Day 19	<input type="checkbox"/> Luke 15	The 3 stories are focused on God's pursuit of us. Which story impacts you? Why? Which of the 2 brothers are you?
