Living in Light of His Return

It's 5:00 o'clock and you have guests coming tomorrow. How does that change things at your house? Maybe it means you want to tidy up a bit? Maybe you're going to put together a tasty meal or a delicious dessert? You probably want to be home to receive them, so you'll have to adjust your schedule to meet them.

Things change when someone important is coming to town. That is one of the main reasons Paul wrote his letters to the church at Thessalonica. He had founded the fellowship during the Macedonian Vision leg of his second missionary journey but was forced to leave much more quickly than he wanted. Desperate to hear an update, Paul sent his associate, Timothy, to visit the newly formed congregation and bring any news that he could. In response to that news, he sent two letters, just a few months apart, to encourage the new believers in their Christian walk.

One of the major themes of both letters is the return of Jesus Christ and the end times. The Thessalonians were curious and confused about this event. Paul urged them to continue to live as they had been transformed by the Gospel. A key verse in Paul's first letter is 1 Thessalonians 3:13: "So that He may establish your hearts without blame in holiness before our God and Father at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ with all His saints." Paul picks up on this theme in his second letter by "requesting" that they "not be quickly shaken" by fake news about Christ's return (2 Thessalonians 2:1-2).

The title of our new sermon series in 1 & 2 Thessalonians will be "Living in Light of His Return." We will follow this series from September to December. I hope it's a help and an encouragement as we live in expectation of Christ's return together.

Seventeen Years of Covenant Foods

Many of us may not realize the grave diparities that exist in our own communities. People are facing hunger in every county in Indiana. These people could even be your neighbors or kids in your children's classes at school. The latest statistics show that 1 in 7 people and 1 in 5 children face hunger in Indiana. This number has markedly increased since the pandemic and its aftermath. Hunger is a major problem in every area of our Hoosier state!

We at Northside are able to reach many facing hunger in the 12 zip codes surrounding our curch. This is largely thanks to the committeent of our volunteers who join each Tuesday from 4 to 6 PM to serve our guests.

Areas of service include picking up food from generous and faithful businesses who have helped provide food for our guests over the years. We have volunteers who pick up food each week who arrange food by category on tables for ease selection by our guests. There are volunteers who bag food and volunteers who prepare bagged food from our ordered food supply as well as restocking and organizing the shelves. Currently, we have 2 volunteers who translate for our Spanish-speaking guests! Couselors talk with our guests on each visit about problems or issues they are facing, present Christ to them, and pray with them. Our greeters are at the receiving table to welcome each guest and to obtain needed information when they arrive. Over this past year we have served 531 guests representing a total of 944 family members. At times we serve out-of-area guests on a one-time basis out of our extra donated food supply.

Covenant Foods has served 11,264 guests since 2015. In the past 2 years, we have added tracking of family members and have served a total of 2,673 household members. We have had19 guests receive Christ as Savior since 2022.

In addition to food needs, many of our guests have faced a dire shortage of affordable housing this past year. Evictions and homelessness are on the rise with little renter protections in place for low income families, as well as a severe housing shortage. We serve guests with a wide variety of issues including the unemployed, low income, workers families dealing with disabilities and or young children, senior citizens and single adult caregivers to name a few. The percentage of these populations is rising each year in the areas we serve.

Over the years we have built relationships with our guests to support thie needs. One guest sums up her experience like this: "I'd like to say thank you everybody who shares in provideing. I couldn't make it without the food pantry. It means a lot that you care and have a heart to see that there are people in great need."



Our pantry over the past 17 years has remained strong to create a dignified shopping experience for our guests and to offer a network of resources to meet needs in the area we serve. Support for our food pantry goes well beyond the food itself. We so appreciate the donations given by our congregation to supplement food needs. Also, a portion of our tithes and offering has been an amazing resource for our pantry. Your ongoing prayers for our pantry are crucial as our community continues to face staggering challenges.



Won't you join us some Tuesday to see how our pantry functions and to see if it is a good fit for you to share your time and talent for the Lord?





No Time to Be Dumb: Letters to Teenage Girls

book by Rachel Jankovic

Rachel Jankovic wants terrible teenage daughters. Not a wasting-hertime-in-petty-squabbles, doomscrolling, dumb television shows, eating disorders, and foolish crushes kind of terrible. But a different kind of terrible: to be women who are genuine threats to the enemies of God, "fair as the moon . . . and terrible as an army with banners" (Song 6:10). She is not easily



controlled by flattery; her joy is in the Lord. She is growing from a girl you love into a woman you admire. In this book Rachel covers the topics you would expect, like Modesty and Homemaking and Boys. But Rachel also speaks directly to awkward questions such as Handsiness and Pornography. There's even a chapter on how to deal with self-righteous church ladies. Young women have all the time in the world for good things, but they really just don't have time to be dumb.

No Time to Be Dumb is perfect for educating young women on the importance of abstaining from frivolous activities such as petty squabbles, mindless television shows, unhealthy diet patterns, and superficial crushes. This teen girl book focuses on striving to raise daughters who aren't "terrible" in an unruly or rebellious way, but in a way that makes them strong, bold, and uncompromising in their faith and values. Instead of seeking happiness from external validation or being controlled by flattery, this Christian book for teenagers encourage young

girls to live a life filled with the purpose of staying devoted and finding joy in the Lord. This book highlights the transformation of growing from a loving young girl to an admirable woman people look up to. It offers guidance for navigating awkward relationship questions some teens have and gracefully addresses mature themes.



The Revelation/Response Model of Worship in Isaiah 6

Worship at its core is not a human invention but a divine encounter. It begins not with what we do, but with who God is and what He reveals. One of the clearest biblical pictures of this reality comes from Isaiah 6, where the prophet has a vision of the Lord in the temple. This passage lays out what many call the Revelation/Response model of worship: God reveals Himself, and His people respond.

God's Revelation (Isaiah 6:1–4)

Isaiah begins by describing his encounter:

"In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting upon a throne, high and lifted up; and the train of his robe filled the temple."

Before Isaiah speaks or acts, God reveals Himself. The Lord is shown as exalted, holy, and glorious, with seraphim crying out, "Holy, holy, holy is the LORD of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory!" Worship begins with a vision of who God is.

This reminds us that worship is not rooted in our preferences, emotions, or creativity. It flows from the character and presence of God. In gathered worship, Scripture, song, prayer, and proclamation should first and foremost help us see God as He truly is: holy, glorious, and sovereign.

Our Response of Confession (Isaiah 6:5)

Isaiah's immediate response is not celebration, but confession:

"Woe is me! For I am lost; for I am a man of unclean lips, and I dwell in the midst of a people of unclean lips; for my eyes have seen the King, the LORD of hosts!"

When confronted with God's holiness, Isaiah recognizes his sinfulness. This is always the movement of true worship. Revelation leads to humility, repentance, and recognition of our need for grace.

In corporate worship, this is why we often move from adoration to confession. Seeing God clearly compels us to see ourselves truthfully.

God's Response of Grace (Isaiah 6:6–7)

God does not leave Isaiah in despair. A seraph touches his lips with a burning coal, declaring, "Your guilt is taken away, and your sin atoned for." Revelation of God's holiness leads to confession, and confession opens the door to God's cleansing grace.

This moment foreshadows the cross of Christ, where our sins are finally and fully atoned for. Every act of Christian worship is centered on this gospel reality: we who were unclean have been made clean by Jesus.

Our Response of Surrender (Isaiah 6:8)

Finally, worship culminates in mission: "And I heard the voice of the Lord saying, 'Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?' Then I said, 'Here I am! Send me.'"

Isaiah's encounter does not end in private devotion but in public commission. Having seen God, confessed sin, and received grace, he now offers himself in obedience.

This is the full cycle of worship: Revelation \rightarrow Confession \rightarrow Grace \rightarrow Surrender. God reveals, we respond. God speaks, we obey.

Conclusion

Isaiah 6 provides a timeless pattern for Christian worship. True worship is never one-sided. It is not merely us singing songs upward, nor is it simply God blessing us downward. It is a dialogue of revelation and response:


- God reveals Himself in His holiness and glory.
- We respond with confession of our sin.
- God responds with cleansing and grace.
- We respond with surrender and obedience.
