Lenten Sermon Series

"Instructive Moments with the Savior: Learning to Listen"

"Then Jesus said, 'Whoever has ears to hear, let them hear..." (Mark 4:9)

For the Season of Epiphany (January 6th – February 14th), we have been looking closely at the life of the Savior though the eyes of the people who were the closest to him. Through these intimate encounters between Jesus and his inner circle of friends like Peter, Andrew, James, John, Philip, and Nathanael as well as the encounters with those individuals he healed, we have been learning to love as he loved. Intimate Moments with the Savior have taught us how to love.

In the next several weeks, we will enter into the Season of Lent, a forty-day inward journey toward Easter beginning with a day of fasting and prayer on Ash Wednesday, February 17, 2021. For this Lenten journey, I would like to invite you all to join me in spending some *Instructive Moments with the Savior* where we will learn how to listen for the voice of God in our lives.

We will sit at the feet of Jesus on a grassy hillside overlooking the Sea of Galilee as he teaches us about the spiritual disciplines of prayer, fasting and giving. We will journey with him into the wilderness as we listen to



his discourse with Satan on the temptations of Christian leadership. We will hear him speak to Nicodemus about true salvation and finding purpose in our lives. We will walk with him on his final journey into Jerusalem as he lives out what he teaches concerning true surrender. We will stand back and watch as the Savior, filled with righteous anger, clears the Temple of the moneychangers and speaks to us all about justice. Finally, as we follow the cheering crowd into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, we will listen to him teach, without using words, about the nature and identity of God's Suffering Servant in our midst.

Please join me on this inward journey of *Instructive Moments with the Savior* where we will all learn together...how to listen.

During the two weeks between the attack on our national Capitol building and the inauguration, I was worried that the rioters would stage another attack; this time against the inauguration. When that didn't happen, I rejoiced as I watched on TV as America celebrated the beginning of a new chapter in our nation's history.

Then I realized, that what we have experienced is typical of God's relationship with His people throughout the centuries. Our emotions lead us astray and we find ourselves in dark times. When God sees us through the dark times and calls us back to Himself, we rejoice. I usually end up being sorry when I let my fears bother me. It's human nature to feel bad after our emotions have caused us to mess up. When that happens, we temporarily lose the peace of mind that God wants for us. The Good News is that Jesus knows our every weakness. Our Good Shepherd loves us, cares for us, and most of all protects us from harm and forgives us when we go astray!

Do Not Fall Into The Medical Dollar Gap! By John K Christensen

As the New Year begins it is an excellent time to renew your medical insurance coverage. For those of you 65 years old or older, you should be covered by Medicare Advantage Plan plus the additional schedule D. You should also have a secondary Insurance that pays for most of what Medicare does not cover. If you do not have these basics and you have an emergency or other unforeseen health issues you probably will be faced with a large, unexpected bill.

As an example, last year I had an emergency 911 admission to John Muir Hospital for what turned out to be Endocarditis. After four weeks in the hospital, most of the time in ICU care, I was released to home care with the need for infusion medicine for an additional three weeks. With good doctors and a Hope Prayer Circle for me I am in good health today.

The Financial cost could have been devastating. The bill from the hospital was over \$1,200,000! Since I had all the medical plans, most of the bill was covered. Remaining was \$83,000 which my private insurance covered. Thankfully I only had to pay \$10.

Subsequently, in discussion with the clerk in personnel at John Muir, I learned that a surprising number of patients, are without insurance due to loss of work due to COVID-19 or are over 65 and are underinsured!

Please review your medical coverage with your family or financial advisor.

 - Proposed 2021 Operating Budget. The Council approved the 2021 Operating Budget retroactive to Jan. 1, 2021. The Hope congregation will vote to approve 2021 Operating Budget retroactive to January 1, 2021 at the Annual Meeting on January 31, 2021.
