We proclaim him, admonishing and teaching everyone with all wisdom, so that we may present everyone perfect in Christ. Colossians 1:28

The above verse (which I shared in a recent sermon) highlights the Apostle Paul's desire to help people become whole, or complete, in Christ. Paul is explaining why he works so hard, endures so much, and makes so many sacrifices as he carries out his ministry. Basically, Paul is explaining his call.

As I've shared with you before, I gave my life to Christ on January 10, 1972. I was seven. Twelve years later, when I was a sophomore in college, I felt God calling me into the ministry. That call happened on December 25, 1983, nearly 42 years ago. At that time, I committed to following God wherever God led me.

Being a minister hasn't always been easy. I have had discouraging seasons, times when I wanted to walk away to pursue other jobs. My family has moved multiple times, including international moves. There have been challenges, sacrifices, and costs along the way. There have also been incredible blessings and seasons of God's presence and undeniable activity. Looking back over the years, there is no doubt that God has been there through every moment. My history with God keeps me going. A sense of purpose pushes me on.

Luanne and I have lived in many places during our 38 years of marriage. In each home (including our seminary apartment), we've symbolized our commitment to that place by doing improvement projects both inside and out. Those hands-on projects signify to us, "this place is home", and if the Lord moves us elsewhere, the home we've invested in will be better than it was when we arrived.

For me, that same mindset plays out in the church. Wherever the Lord has called me to serve, I go with a commitment to follow God's leading in serving the body and moving us together to a better place, a healthier place. That certainly includes the physical building, but more importantly, I want us to grow in spiritual depth and in how we reflect Jesus to the world, so, for as long as the Lord has me here, this is the vision for the church I will follow.

This kind of church community is known for its kindness and warmth to all people from all walks of life.. It is a church that outwardly expresses, beyond our walls, the full expression of who Christ is. It is a church that expresses love for God by loving others both corporately and individually. It is a community that worships God without distraction or limitation. It is a body that is healthy, and healthy things flourish; they grow.

This is what I, and many of you, long for at First Baptist Church. This vision is the one God placed in me almost 42 years ago. This vision has remained consistent in every place God has called me to minister. This call, this vision, keeps me walking with Jesus. This vision moves all of us toward becoming whole, perfect in Christ. Let's continue to move forward together, following the Holy Spirit, growing in Christ, and becoming all God has called us to be.

This week I read a short journal article written by Baillie Myers, a Short-Term Mission Associate with International Ministries. Baillie had the privilege of leading a small team on a Discovery Trip to Southern Central Mexico. This trip was intentionally different: they did not build a structure, hold a Bible School, or teach a class. Their goal was to be present, to listen and to learn from the people with whom they met.

The group traveled through four different communities-each with its own culture, people, foods and expressions of faith. Our main task? Sitting at tables, sharing meals, hearing stories. It was through those moments—unhurried, sacred, and real—that we began to understand the heart of these communities.

So often we become consumed with doing--checking off tasks, completing goals, moving from one thing to the next. But what if God is inviting us to stop and simply **be present?**

That's what this trip reminded me (Baillie Myers) to value again. Not productivity. Not outcomes. Just presence. For me, this journey was also deeply personal. As a <u>missionary kid</u> who grew up in Mexico, returning felt like coming home. It was a joy to introduce our team to the beauty, warmth, and strength of a place and a people who have shaped so much of who I am. The individuals we met were not strangers; they are part of my extended family.

As I reflect on this Discovery Trip, I continue to dive deeper into the life of Jesus. I'm struck by how often He stopped. He made space for the stories of others—the beggar (Mark 10:46-52), the tax collector (Luke 19:1-10), and the children (Mark10:13-16). He saw them. He heard them. And they were changed, not because He fixed their problems immediately, but because He was fully present.

This trip challenged me to do the same. To listen more. To notice more. To slow down.

What about you? Are you taking time to listen?

Dig Deeper: Food, Insecure Recap

On October 8, the Mission Board hosted the Dig Deeper lunch discussion session by viewing the documentary "Food, Insecure". Here are a few insights that depict the state of food insecurity in Indiana.

Hunger in Indiana

- Over 1 million Hoosiers require food assistance. This includes households across income levels, from deep poverty to those earning above 200% of the Federal Poverty Level (Survey Report: Food Assistance and Hunger in Indiana, Indy Hunger Network, 2024).
- Food assistance provided 87% of meals needed. Nonetheless, nearly all these families (92%) had low or very low food security.
- Hunger has increased: 40% of food-insecure households went hungry in a given week, compared to 23-29% in prior studies (Survey Report, 2024).
- Only 6% of households always eat nutritious meals, while 25% rarely or never do. Fruits and vegetables are the most commonly missing food groups, cited by 72% and 68% of respondents, respectively (Survey Report, 2024).

Impacts of Food Insecurity

- Food insecurity is linked to poorer health, lower worker productivity, and reduced academic performance (Poorly Understood, p.16).
- Health issues correlated with food insecurity include poor overall health, cardiovascular disease, hyperlipidemia, stroke, kidney disease, chronic pain, inflammation, pulmonary disease, and diabetes.
- Food insecurity is also strongly associated with behavioral health problems including depression, anxiety, binge eating, substance use disorders, and more. (Myers and Temple, 2024)

Low Wages and Working Poverty

- Three quarters (75.7%) of households with a food need reported that one or more persons in their household were employed for wages. (Survey Report, 2024)
- Low wage jobs are common, with 41% of Indiana jobs not paying the current living wage of \$21/hr.
 (Economic Policy Institute's Low Wage Workforce Tracker and MIT's Living Wage Calculator)
- In Indiana, 12 of the 20 most common occupations pay a median wage under \$18/hour, and 9 of these pay less than \$15/hour. (Overlooked & Undercounted, 2022; Survey Report, 2024)

The CEO of Gleaners, Fred Glass, stated that "food insecurity is not about the food, it's about poverty. People are poor and they don't have access to the food." In the documentary, several families that struggle with food insecurity were interviewed; here are a couple of quotes from them:

Kayla – "Feeling punished to get ahead in life."

Heidi – "I work 3 jobs just to make it. It's hard for those who work and those who don't work. It doesn't make sense."

Liz and Nigel – "We are trying to do the right things, but our past hinders us moving forward."

Food pantries are a 'Band-Aid', systematic changes are needed; this needs to be driven through the government, corporations and community. The Faith Community needs to demonstrate hospitality, graciousness, love and compassion to their neighbors.
