I know many churches have declined and shut their doors, including some dear to us. I know other churches have been repurposed in incongruent ways, like the Limelight nightclub in Manhattan. I don't have answers to my musings, but I felt a little sad eating my pasta with a bamboo fork in a place where people once worshipped.

I am grateful that Resurrection continues to work hard to be a place of worship where people are welcomed, where we serve others, and yes, where we sometimes eat! The best meal that we share every week is Holy Communion – a meal that reminds us of Christ's sacrifice and our common bond. Thanks be to God!

Would You Believe?

n the evening of the Resurrection, the disciples were hiding. They had seen Jesus arrested and crucified, and they were scared that they were next. While they were gathered together, Jesus appeared before them. They were all amazed to see Him! Jesus said, "Peace be with you" and showed them His hands and His side, and breathed the Holy Spirit upon them- a truly unbelievable moment. But someone was missing ... Thomas.

We're not sure where Thomas was, or why he was missing, but he wasn't with the disciples that night. Yet, once Thomas came back, the disciples told Thomas this amazing news, that Jesus is alive! But Thomas didn't believe them, he doubted what they were saying. Thomas basically said, "I'll believe it when I see it."

Thomas, in my opinion, had a very human reaction to truly unbelievable news, yet now Thomas is defined throughout the rest of history, for doubting, for needing to be reassured. Personally, I think it's important to note that the "evidence" that Thomas was looking for was *exactly* what the other disciples received: Jesus showed them His hands and His side. Thomas only asked to see the same "proof" that the other disciples saw. Yet either way, the story continues. Jesus comes back.

Jesus came back and showed Thomas exactly what Thomas needed to see. Jesus could have left Thomas to doubt, but He came back. And when Jesus came back, He didn't come back and scold Thomas. He didn't come back and say "oh ye of little faith" like when the disciples were out on the boat in the storm. The very first words He spoke to Thomas were, "Peace be with you..." Jesus came back and brought peace to Thomas' doubting heart.

And that is exactly what Jesus does for us. Jesus doesn't leave us to drown in doubt and sin. Jesus doesn't turn away from us when we struggle with our faith. Jesus doesn't scold us when we stray from Him. Jesus shows up, each and every time, with His peace, His love and His forgiveness. Jesus shows up and offers up His life and salvation.

Sometimes our doubts may feel insurmountable, or like they may define us, but Jesus corrects us, and shows us that nothing is too big, too terrible, or too unforgiveable for His love. Jesus showed us all the evidence that we need when He willingly laid down His life for us on the cross.

So let go of your mistakes. Let go of any shame or guilt or heartache that you carry around. Let go of the labels that you think define you, because Jesus has replaced them all with one of His own: forgiven.

Resurrection has long supported St. Matthew's Lutheran Church in Brooklyn. One of their ministries serves a French-speaking population pastored by Pastor Cenat.

n the day of Pentecost last year, May 28 A.D. 2023, members and friends of the Frenchspeaking Congregation of St. Matthew Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canarsie gathered for a joyful 10th anniversary celebration. Ten years earlier, this little congregation began with just three members: Pastor Jean Gardy Cenat, his wife, Martine, and Brother Jean Thomas.

The building was packed for the 10year anniversary, as we celebrated the wonderful growth which has occurred by God's grace. Throughout the years, we have enjoyed many good times, and we have also gone through some hardships, difficulties, and trials. However, we rejoice that, through it all, the Lord has sustained us by the means of grace. He always keeps us in faith by His Word, encouraging and comforting our hearts to stand firm in the midst of those hardships while holding onto His promises.

Along the way, we have been thankful for the growth of our community spiritually and numerically, as we have witnessed two families joining our congre-

gation of dozens of families. The Lord has entrusted us to lead His people and by His guidance we have been empowered to extend the Gospel of Hope in the Canarsie area and beyond.

We have also assisted members in different ways, as they seek to integrate themselves into life in our city. This help was often made possible through the support that the community has received from Sister congregations in our Circuit and our District.

The recent political and social crises in Haiti follow the physical destruction caused by the catastrophic earthquake of 2010. We were eyewitnesses to that event and assisted personally in relief efforts in Haiti following the earthquake.

Many people have migrated to the United States of America, and there is a great need to help them physically and spiritually when they settle in Brooklyn. It is a heartbreaking situation to witness, and many of the immigrants have endured unimaginable suffering. However, we remain convinced that the Lord in His sovereignty has a plan and that He is in control.

Thus far, we have planned to continue the ministry of preaching, teaching and evangelizing for any Haitians with whom we come into contact in Brooklyn, Queens, or Long Island. As we are able, we will also assist them in the process of integrating into the business and educational systems here. Outreach activities and programs with children and family members have been implemented in the community with the goal of extending the Gospel of Hope for the glory of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

B eginning earlier this year, we started offering a wonderful, new opportunity for our middle and high school students. We are thrilled to welcome our youth to serve as lay readers, ushers, greeters, Communion assistants and acolytes, once a month, at our 9:45am service!

It is our hope that this opportunity allows our youth to become more integrally involved in the services at Resurrection and develop a fuller, more intimate understanding of worship life at their church.

As was mentioned a few weeks ago during Pastor's sermon, during worship, Jesus is the one serving us. We receive His forgiveness, His grace, His body and blood and the promise of everlasting life. As such, we respond, in gratitude, with prayers and praises to His name.

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
