Chances for Children: Hope for Haiti Mission Update

James 1:12

Despite ongoing gang violence, kidnapping, political instability and rampant inflation, Chances for Children

(C4C) continues its work there successfully. Chances for Children is a Christian organization committed to providing hope for the children and people of Haiti, the poorest

country in the western hemisphere. Chances for Children’s painstakingly selected Haitian staff of over 160 provide skillfully, lovingly, and safely-run programs with minimal day-to-day oversight from American staff. American assistants remain unable to safely travel there since my last visit to hire Haitian doctors and nurses to continue our medical work there nearly 18 months ago.

C4C continues to lead Haitian communities from survival to stability and ultimately sustainability through orphan care, feeding programs, medical/dental care, education, church/community development, agriculture, and economic programs. Working in collaboration with Feed My Starving Children, C4C’s staff courageously picks up food from the dockyards of the capital, Port Au Prince

and then distributes the food via motorcycle on back roads. Currently 8,036 children are being fed through C4C, which for many is the only meal they will eat that day, via distribution at its 15 rural church sites and through 10 partner organizations.

Resurrection’s generosity supports the feeding of 510 children in Model, a church community where they are fed three days a week while learning of God’s love. Local workers are employed to transport and cook the food.


Sharon Meyer, Resurrection’s mission chair, and I visited this site in 2019 and witnessed the poverty and need firsthand, but as Pastor Bourdeau (Model) reported in a recent communication, the need is even greater of late as families fight to feed their children. Due to the gang violence and political unrest C4C has not been able to establish agriculture and economic programs in Model designed to lead to sustainability, however it has successfully done so in four other remote villages despite the deteriorating conditions.

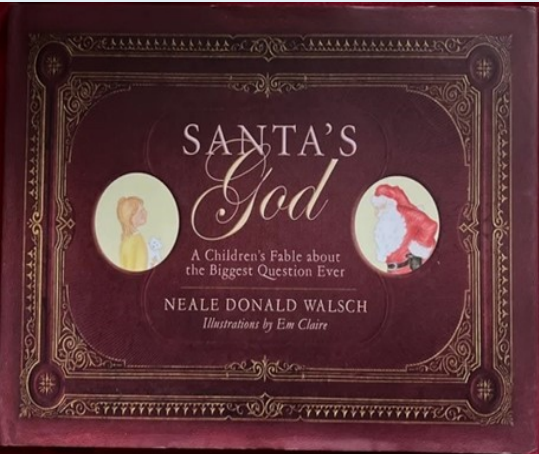

As a Christ-centered organization, land has been purchased to build another church and many of our church sites report new members. The large church in Kenscoff where our compound

containing the creche and medical/dental clinic is located, reported 27 new members and 10 weddings over the most recent 4 months alone.

Thanks be to God that through Resurrection’s ongoing support so many children are able to continue to persevere as C4C shares the hope and love of Christ throughout rural Haiti. 



Santa’s God by Neale Donald Walsch

In my closet of Christmas decoration boxes, is a box of Christmas storybooks I’ve collected over the years. A newer-ish book I’ve added is *Santa’s God*, by Neale Donald Walsch, the *New York Times* bestselling author of *Conversations with God*.

This fable tells the story of eight-year old Melinda, who desperately wants to meet Santa Claus. She tries to stay up on Christmas Eve every year, but always falls asleep. However, this year she is determined to meet him, and she does.

When she is face-to-face with Santa, she has many questions. She tells Santa about the kids in her class and how they are different religions and pray to different gods like Allah, Yahweh, Jehovah, and the Lord. She asks him, “Which God do you pray to, Santa? Who is the real God?”

Santa tenderly answers her question but in doing so delivers a message that is heartwarming and full of insight for both Melinda and the reader.

I haven’t re-read this book in a few years, but plan to make it the first one we pull from the Christmas box this year.

And, I just ordered a copy on Amazon that I am donating to the church library, in case anyone would like to borrow it. Merry Christmas!

As we enter the holiday season, now, perhaps more than ever, we are aware of the abundant needs of our neighbors. We hear the Salvation Army bell tolling when we enter department stores. We see the Toys for Tots boxes situated near the exits of our grocery stores. We see flyers posted in the church lobby with lists of the most needed nonperishable items.

We read heart-wrenching pleas on social media for those who have been tragically swept up in the political conflicts of warring nations. At times, these cries for help feel both deafening and as though they fall on deaf ears. Sometimes, the need feels truly overwhelming.

Yet, what about those, desperately in need, that no one talks about, or posts about, or creates a flyer about? What about all of the people who don’t have anyone advocating on their behalf? What about the people who don’t have anyone to ask to pray for them?

The Psalmist speaks to this feeling of loneliness and abandonment in Psalm 13: “How long, Lord? Will you forget

me forever? How long will you hide your face from me? How long must I wrestle with my thoughts...?” Thankfully, we can provide an answer of hope.

This season, let us pray for the forgotten. Those who have been discarded, written off, erased by society, friends, family or faith.

Let us pray for those who never make the prayer guide, because there is no one in their lives to add them to the list. Let us pray for those who don’t grab our attention, who remain faceless and nameless.

Let “all those we name before You in our hearts now” include those who may not be in anyone else’s hearts. Let us create a space for them, a home for them in our prayers, where we tell them that they do matter, they aren’t forgotten, and they belong with us, among the communion of saints.

All gifts must be wrapped, labeled, and returned to Resurrection by December 10th to ensure that they can be delivered to the New Life Center and distributed to the recipients in time for Christmas.

We also look forward to two wonderful Resurrection traditions for the Christmas season: Advent Night and Christmas caroling. We wel-

come back our “traditional” Advent Night potluck on Saturday, December 2nd at 6:30pm. All are invited to participate as we create a fun Advent-themed craft, and everyone is encouraged to bring a shareable dish for our potluck. Please sign up in the church lobby if you’d like to participate.

Then, on Sunday, December 17th at 2pm, we will be visiting some of our homebound members to sing Christmas carols and spread the holiday cheer! Fun fact: the oldest Lutheran congregation in North America is in our District. The Evangelical Lutheran Church of St. Matthew was founded in 1643 by Dutch Lutheran immigrants. The congregation has moved several times over its 380-year existence. It is now located at the Cornerstone Center on 178 Bennett Ave., Manhattan.

Over the next year, I will also introduce you to our district and our Synod. In the meantime, I encourage you to learn more about Resurrection, who we are, what we have to offer, the programs and opportunities you can enjoy and participate in, and our missions and volunteerism.
