# Message from the President

Change. We all experience it. Looking back over my life, I see many changes.

In Pastor's class we are studying the Reformation. I sometimes wonder how the people living during those times of immense change made sense of it. And depending on the time and place, that change could be a matter of life and death, as the church was intertwined with secular political power, capable of inflicting punishment against perceived heresy, like hearing God's Word in one's native language.

Not long ago I was in Zurich and visited one of their older churches, overlooking the river. I have been in many old European churches, and they always amaze with the beautiful windows, carvings and other artwork. This time I was not stunned by the opulence but by the barrenness. Gray walls everywhere. No ornamentation. Just the ghosts of rectangular paintings that had been removed centuries ago from columns throughout the church. Seeing this now, knowing the historical context, was disturbing and made me sad. But imagine the thoughts and feelings of those who had attended this church at the time. Maybe they were elated the "idolatrous images" were removed. Maybe they were heartsick. Maybe they were afraid-for if the church can be altered in this way, what can they do to me? What does that mean for my faith? Do I need to change or abandon it?

One wonders how people can be made to change or alter their faith at the command of those with power. Yet it is important to remember that throughout history, one thing has not changed and is the basis for our faith. Jesus, born of the Virgin Mary, came into this world, was crucified, died and was raised from the dead to save us all from our sins. This is what cannot change and what we celebrate.

# Managing Holiday Stress with Help from the Bible

"Come unto Me all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest." Matthew 11:28

Most times, we are joyful as Christmas approaches, but we can become filled with anxiety. Pressure builds within us as we attempt to create the "perfect" holiday. Shopping, card-writing, cooking, baking, decorating, parties, family gatherings, work obligations, and many other things can leave us feeling overwhelmed.

Let's consider a few Bible verses which will guide us during this season.

"Be joyful always; pray continually; give thanks in all circumstances, for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus." 1 Thessalonians 5:16-18

When we are stressed, we think of our problems. When we are grateful, we are reminded of our blessings. Each day think of several things you are thankful for and be reminded that God is good.

"So then, as we have opportunity, let us do good to everyone, and especially those who are of the household of faith." Galatians 6:10

Studies have shown that being kind and caring lowers cortisol (the stress hormone), helping people to feel calmer. Our church gives us opportunities to reach out. We can donate to the food pantry. We can cook for Meal-a-Month. We can buy gifts for someone who would not receive any. In our daily lives, we can show kindness. Even

small actions make a big difference; hold the door—let someone go before you in the checkout line—show courtesy when driving.

"O Lord, you are my God; I will exalt you; I will praise your name, for you have done wonderful things, plans formed of old, faithful and sure." Isaiah 25:1

Taking time to praise God for His wonderful gift reduces stress. Spending time in prayer and devotion, reading Scripture, attending worship services, singing in the choir, playing bells, etc. Each of these helps us focus on the peace that passes all understanding, rather than pressure and anxiety.

"Cast all your anxiety on Him because He cares for you." 1Peter 5:7


When we are overwhelmed, we need to ask for God to renew us. We can help, too, by caring for our bodies, getting enough sleep, eating healthy foods, getting exercise, and taking a break occasionally.

Jesus is the reason for the season. This is not a Bible verse, but these words help us to focus on God's greatest gift. This thought gives us peace and hope. "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth, peace, good will toward men." Luke 2:14

# The Midnight Library



# **Epic Fail**

f you've spent any time on social media around the holidays, you would have surely stumbled upon the #epicfail phenomenon. This public confession utilizes social media to advertise burnt casseroles, collapsed cakes, and gingerbread houses that appear to have survived a minor earthquake.

While presents and Christmas lights and decorating the tree are typically at the heart of the Christmas season, more often than not, our celebrations come back to food.

The holidays have a way of always drawing our attention back to the dinner table. Recipes are entrenched in tradition. Serving dishes become family heirlooms, and just the smell of grandma's "famous" apple pie can conjure up childhood memories. And yet, in all that nostalgia, things go wrong.

New recipes rebel, timing gets away from us, and that one dish that looked incredible (and completely attainable) in the video tutorial, completely betrays us. Yet hopefully, filled with the holiday spirit, we can laugh it off, and write it off as an #epicfail.

But Christmas, in its truest light, was never meant to be about the things that fall apart, scorch, or fail. The heart of the season is not contingent upon flawless menus or meticulously executed traditions.

Christmas is the proclamation that God chose to step into our world—our imperfect, uneven, often burned-around-the-edges world—and bring redemption that doesn't depend on our ability to "get it right". The miracle in the manger did not arrive because humanity finally perfected anything, quite the opposite. It arrived

because God loves us, despite our shortcomings.

So, while our holiday tables may occasionally descend into chaos, the true reason we are gathered together to celebrate stands firm.

Our Savior was born not into a spotless kitchen but into a humble stall. The angels did not sing because the world had achieved perfection, but because perfect love entered a world that desperately needed it.

And that truth echoes most clearly at another table—the Communion table. Unlike our Christmas feasts, the Communion meal never goes wrong. Its power does not depend on our culinary skill, our mood, or the condition of our entrees. This meal is a promise: Christ's body given for us, Christ's blood poured out for us, grace extended to us without hesitation or condition. Where our recipes falter, this gift remains flawless. Where our efforts waver, this covenant stands unbroken.

So even if our own meals are tragically flawed, we are invited to turn our focus from the things that didn't work to the One who did all the work for us: our Savior who came, in complete humility, and set a table for us all—one where, despite all our failures, we are always welcome and embraced.

# Helpful Ideas for Busy Holiday Activities

The holiday season brings excitement, gatherings, and celebrations, but it can also disrupt the routines that help young children feel secure and balanced. Maintaining consistency, even amid the festivities, can help families enjoy the season with more peace and less stress.

Start by keeping the essentials steady: regular mealtimes, naps, and bedtimes. While flexibility is sometimes necessary, children thrive when they know what to expect. Try to plan activities around their natural rhythms rather than forcing new ones. If late nights are unavoidable, schedule a quieter day afterward so they can rest and reset.



Create small daily rituals that reinforce stability, such as reading a bedtime story, saying a short prayer together, or lighting an Advent candle. These moments not only nurture faith but also help children feel grounded in what truly matters.

Remember that less can be more. It's okay to say no to certain events or commitments if they overwhelm your family. The most meaningful memories often come from unhurried time spent together, reflecting on the gift of Christ's birth.

By keeping routines and priorities rooted in faith and family, parents can help their children experience the joy of the holidays with calm hearts and thankful spirits.

# The SymphoNYChorus to Perform at Resurrection

his February, the renowned SymphoNYChorus, under the direction of Henric Ideström, will present "An Evening with the SymphoNY-Chorus" at Resurrection immediately following our Saturday service.

The program will draw on the chorus' broad repertoire of faith-based pieces across religious denominations and musical genres—gospel, classical, spirituals, traditional, Broadway, pop and more.

We will be inviting the community to join us for this special event. Admission is free. Please come and invite your neighbors and friends to join us.

With 35 vocalists and a supporting orchestra of 15, the chorus was founded in 2008 by Ideström to showcase the diversity of religious choral music. Emphasizing passionate authenticity, Ideström is intent on demonstrating that "God's creation is not bland and nor should be our art." Citing his Swedish background, Ideström knows that not all musical tastes, much like foods, are the same; a smorgasbord solves the problem.

The chorus presents two major concert series yearly, Christmas concerts and themed concerts in the spring.

The all-volunteer ensemble—including two members of Resurrection—taps into the extraordinary wealth of musical talent in New York, eager to showcase skills and passion. Coming from as far as California, Wyoming, Arizona and Texas—many in pursuit of Broadway breakthroughs—and others with diverse academic and professional backgrounds, the group is a mix of religious affiliations, ages, ethnic and racial profiles and musical interests that carry over to their eclectic program compositions. The performers all have in common, under Ideström's leadership, musical excellence combined with expressive enthusiasm.

The SymphoNYChorus performs at venues throughout the New York tri-state region, including public stages, churches, synagogues, and corporate sites.

The group has toured cities in the US, Canada and UK, and recently issued its most recent recording, *Live in the United Kingdom*, also available by streaming. For further information, including the group's upcoming schedule, visit its website, *thesymphonychorus.com*.
