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So When Is Easter this Year?

s many of you have noticed and pointed out, Easter Sunday seems unusually "early" in 2024. This year, Easter Sunday will happen on March 31. Last year it was on April 9. Next year the grand celebration will fall on April 20. Back in 2008, we celebrated Easter Sunday even earlier, as the big day fell on March 23. Every year, a handful of people will ask the obvious question: Why does the date of Easter vary so much from year to year?

We actually know quite a lot about that very first Easter. As we read in Mark's Gospel account:

When the Sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salome brought spices, so that they might go and anoint him. And very early on the first day of the week, when the sun had risen, they went to the tomb. They had been saying to one another, "Who will roll away the stone for us to the entrance to the tomb?" When they looked up, they saw that the stone, which was very large, had already been rolled back. Mark 16:1-4

We know that Jesus rose from the dead on a Sunday: As Mark details, "the Sabbath was over...and [it was] very early on the first day of the week." We also know it was the Spring season, because God's people celebrated the Passover Meal the week before. The Bible includes some well-known names and events that have led historians to conclude that it probably happened between the years 30 and 33 AD. Yet, even with all that is known about that first Easter, it is simply impossible to identify a precise date.

About 1700 years ago, leaders in the church created a plan to mark the official commemoration of Christ's resurrection. Every year going forward, Easter would always take place following the Vernal Equinox (the start of the Spring season in the Northern hemisphere) on March 20. Easter would be celebrated on the first Sunday, after the first full moon, of the Spring Season. This means Easter could fall anywhere between March 22 and April 25.

If you're anything like me, your first response to that last paragraph was "what?" The formula for determining the official date of Easter Sunday is not easy to understand and even more difficult to explain.

But whenever we "officially commemorate the observance of Christ's resurrection," we are celebrating something that transcends calendars, time, and even life as we know it. We are celebrating Christ's victory over death for all time, something that God has made a part of our lives 365 days a year. As we journey through the somber days of Lent and Good Friday, and contemplate the fact that Christ paid with his life to take away our sin, we also get to always know the story eventually and ultimately brings us to an empty tomb. As we face struggles, disappointments, and grief in this world, we do so knowing that CHRIST IS RISEN! HE IS RIS-EN INDEED, ALLELUIA! Jesus is alive, and sharing his victory over death with us every single moment into eternity. The joy and reality of Easter is not just ours on one big Sunday that takes place sometime between late March and late April. Easter is celebrated every Sunday, every single day for the rest of forever. 1

hen one thinks of swashbucklers, one thinks of Scaramouche, Zorro, the Three Musketeers, even Captain Jack Sparrow. Now add to that group, Resurrection's own Eileen Peers.

Eileen, longtime congregation member, handbell ringer, church choir singer, Altar Guild member

and likely candidate for almost any group looking for volunteers, is one of six members (plus coach) of the Long Island Swordsmen Fencing Club.

Since last September, the club has been meeting in Resurrection's basement on Thursdays from 7 to 10 p.m. The club had been meeting for many years in schools in the East Williston District, but, as Ian Weitz, leader and administrator of the club explained, fees for use of the schools rose dramatically last year and the search began for another venue.

Said Mr. Weitz, "Resurrection and the pastor were nice enough to let us use this space."

Eileen has been fencing for 26 years. She began studying at Garden City Adult Education after seeing a character in a television sitcom dressed for a fencing competition. Charles Oliver was Eileen's first adult ed instructor; today his son, Kevin, is the club's coach.

Club members must have insurance and discounted rates are arranged through membership in the USA Fencing Association, an organization founded in 1891 with a "vision" to "inspire a lifetime enriched by fencing."

It's All An Illusion

ne of my guilty pleasures in life is watching magic shows on TV. I am a big fan of Penn & Teller, Criss Angel and Dan Sperry, and I regularly watch a show called "Masters of Illusion." These performers have figured out how to trick your

eye, confuse your senses, and make you believe that you are seeing something that your brain knows isn't possible. As the show suggests, they are masters of illusions.

While I may not be able to make your Queen of Hearts appear inside a birthday cake or make it look like I am

floating across the Grand Canyon, I feel like I know a thing or two about illusions, specifically, the illusion of control.

One of my favorite authors, Kate Bowler, speaks so strongly on this topic. Kate is a professor at Duke Divinity school and was unexpectedly diagnosed with stage IV cancer at age 35. Fortunately, after years of being told she was incurable, she was declared cancer-free, but she speaks profoundly about the conflict between life being beautiful and life being incredibly, unimaginably hard and how desperately we cling to any sense of control we believe we might have.

She recently posted a video in which she said, "Life happens to us... we don't live with control... so let us settle in and *not* know in the presence of the God who *already* knows." If only,

right? If only it were that easy to peel my fingers off the proverbial steering wheel and let someone else navigate. The irony remains that we are so desperate to remain in control, while simultaneously knowing, through both empirical knowledge and first-hand

> experience, that we absolutely have no control.

But Kate is right. Once we allow ourselves to swallow this impossibly bitter pill, we can begin to realize that just because we don't have control doesn't mean that we are out-ofcontrol, because we aren't alone. We hear this in Isiah 41:10: "[s]o do not fear, for I

am with you; do not be dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you and help you; I will uphold you with my righteous right hand." God is with us, and He has it all under control.

In thinking about this topic, I was reminded of one of my favorite poet/ illustrators, Brian Andreas, who wrote: "If you hold on to the handles, she said, it's easier to maintain the illusion of control. But it's more fun if you just let the wind carry you." During this Lenten season, let us challenge ourselves to let go of the handles, and let the wind of the Spirit carry us, hold us, and comfort us in our times of uncertainty.

Emerging Readers

In preschool, reading lays the cornerstone for a child's cognitive development and literacy skills.
Introducing reading at this early age fosters a lifelong love for learning and exploration. Preschoolers are at a crucial stage where their brains are rapidly developing, making it an ideal time to expose them to the wonders of books and storytelling.

Reading in preschool serves as a gateway to language acquisition and comprehension. Through colorful illustrations and engaging narratives, children begin to grasp fundamental concepts such as letters, sounds, and vocabulary. They learn to associate written words with spoken language, enhancing their communication skills and expanding their imaginations.

ne of the lesser-known ministries of our church is the Meal-A-Month program. Once a month on a Tuesday afternoon, a group of volunteers gather in our kitchen to prepare shepherd's pie for 120+ people. It's delivered the next morning to the Soup to Nuts Kitchen, located at Christ Lutheran Church in Freeport. The mission is a tangible way to show God's love to our neighbors.

This mouth-watering endeavor has been going on in one form or another since 1996. It began when Marie Meyer, wife of Pastor Bill Meyer, was inspired to have our congregation join the efforts of the Interfaith Nutrition Network (INN) to feed the hungry on Long Island. With the help of seed money donated by member Dorothy Rupp, volunteers and other donations soon followed, and a legacy was begun.

People ask, "Where did you get this recipe?" Its origins remain a mystery, but

according to Mela Massaro, co-president of the Soup to Nuts Kitchen, it is probably the most popular of the entrees they serve. "The guests look forward to every third Wednesday of the month for your delicious shepherd's pie," she said recently.

Resurrection is one of 13 religious organizations that has committed to provide meals to the soup kitchen on a monthly basis. As Mela noted, our slot is the third Wednesday of every month.

The process starts with shopping: A few days before our cooking date, the ingredients are purchased at nearby Restaurant Depot and placed in our church's refrigerator. When Tuesday afternoon comes, a group of 3-4 volunteers meet for about 90 minutes to chop onions, brown ground beef, and mix mashed potatoes—and have fun while doing it.

"It is such a worthwhile activity," says Su-

san LiCalzi. "I get to meet and work alongside other members of the church in a very relaxed and fun manner." The next day other volunteers deliver the six trays to the Freeport location.

We have a small band of faithful helpers, but we need more! Our most pressing need is for a person to do the shopping every month. In less than an hour, and on your own schedule, you can shop and deliver the ingredients to the church. We also need to build up our corps of cooks.

Does Meal-A-Month sound like something you could be part of? No prior experience is necessary: we will train you! Email elizabeth.bez@resgc.org if you can help. If you would like to support this mission you can also make a donation to Meal-A-Month in the white pew envelopes. As Mela says, "Our Meal-A-Month volunteers have been called by Scripture to feed the hungry."
