Each year, our church recreates the little town of Bethlehem throughout our campus. Hundreds of people walk through our census station, browse the booths in our marketplace, and visit the animals gathered around Baby Jesus and His family. When all of the costumed volunteers gather together, the excitement fills the air as everyone asks, "Where are you going to be?" or "What character are you?"

Last year, when asked, I replied, "I'm the woman at the well." After a few confused, raised eyebrows, I laughed and said, "No, not *that* woman!" This was a new character added to our cast for *Night in Bethlehem*.

Every volunteer in Bethlehem shares the same joyful responsibility—to serve and to tell the story of Jesus' birth. Some help visitors create crafts, others offer tasty snacks, and some demonstrate how to grind grain or toss fish. As we guide and serve, we also share the Good News in meaningful and creative ways.

As the woman at the well, my role was to share what I saw and heard. I told visitors that it had been unusually busy at the well that day—a man had been rushing back and forth between the well and the animal stalls. I thought I remembered his wife being very pregnant when they first stopped for water, but I hadn't seen her in a while. The man seemed concerned, asking for more water and where he could find cloth. And just a little while ago, shepherds had come running through the marketplace, exclaiming that angels in the sky had told them the Savior was born that very night! I encouraged visitors to go check the stalls for the man and his wife—and if they saw a baby, to come back and tell me.

Standing at the well made me reflect on its importance. Water was essential—for people, families, and animals alike. During a census, the well would have been even busier, filled with travelers stopping for refreshment and conversation. Of course, Joseph and Mary would have needed water too—for themselves, for their donkey, and especially for their newborn Son. It was right there, in Bethlehem, that God provided His Son, the living water, as the most essential gift of all.

I love watching families walk through our little town, engaging with the volunteers who stay in character and share the story of Christ's birth. Children delight in the crafts and activities—and even peek down the well! But you can also see the joy of Christmas reflected in their parents' faces as they experience the story from a fresh perspective.

This year, please consider volunteering and becoming a citizen of Bethlehem for a night or two. You, too, can share the Good News of Jesus' birth in a way that brings joy and wonder to all who visit. 

Finishing the Sentence

Our service continues as we confess the ancient Christian faith using the words of the Apostles' Creed. Please stand. 'I believe in God, the Father Almighty..."

...Creator of Heaven and Earth. I'd wager that 99 times out of 100, we could all recite the rest of the Creed without hesitation. These are words we've known since childhood—words we speak both privately and together as a community.

But have you ever found yourself standing in church, saying the Creed or the Lord's Prayer, and suddenly your mind goes blank? Maybe you lose your place. Maybe you can't remember whether it's "the communion of saints" followed by "the forgiveness of sins," or the other way around.

If you're anything like me, when that moment hits, your cheeks flush, your stomach tightens, and it feels like the entire room heard your mistake. And yet—if you pause to listen—you'll notice something beautiful: the people around you keep going. The collective voice carries on, even when ours falters.

The same thing can happen during hymns. Sadly, I've attended many funerals over the years, and many have included the hymn *Abide With Me*. Without fail, there comes a moment when the emotion of the day overwhelms me, and my voice cracks, or I lose track of the verse. But just as with

the Creed or the Lord's Prayer, the voices around me carry me through, singing the words I can't quite find.

That's the power of being part of God's community. As Paul reminds us in Galatians 6:2, "Carry each other's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ." When the weight of the world makes it hard to speak—or sing—we rely on one another. We help each other find the words when they escape us.

In worship, we're reminded of this shared calling again and again: "We join together and sing..." "We confess together..." These aren't just phrases. They're affirmations of who we are as the body of Christ.

T.S. Eliot wrote in *Choruses from The Rock*: "What life have you if you have not life together? There is no life that is not in community, And no community not lived in praise of God."

These words remind us that life in Christ is never meant to be lived in isolation.

So, when our voices fail or the words slip away, let us remember: we are not alone. We are surrounded by the Communion of Saints—those beside us and those who have gone before us—ready to help us finish the sentence.

Building Literacy Skills

Early literacy blooms long before kindergarten, and for 3- and 4-year-olds, it grows best through warm, playful moments with caring adults.

Read together every day, even for 10–15 minutes. Let your child hold the book, turn pages, and "read" the pictures. Talk about the cover, wonder what might happen next, and ask open-ended questions like, "What do you notice?" or "How does the character feel?"

Play with sounds to build phonological awareness. Sing songs, chant nursery rhymes, clap syllables in names, and enjoy silly rhymes—cat, hat, splat! Explore letters gently, starting with the letters in your child's name. Use magnet letters, write in sand or shaving cream, and point out environmental print on signs and labels to show that print is all around.

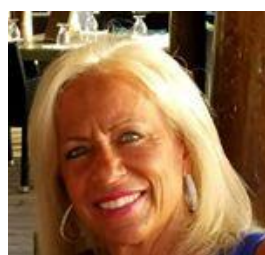


Grow vocabulary through rich conversation. Narrate everyday routines—cooking, getting dressed, going outside and expand on your child's words: "Yes, it's a big, fluffy dog. It's wagging its tail because it's excited!" Encourage early writing with crayons, markers, and chunky pencils. Scribbles and invented spellings are important steps; strengthen little hands with playdough, tweezers, and blocks.

Invite storytelling through pretend play, puppets, and drawing. Most of all, keep it joyful. Follow your child's interests, celebrate effort, and visit the library to discover new favorites together. Have fun with your child, and always encourage play!

Is “Die Hard” a Christmas movie? These are the great debates of our time—but as the air turns crisp and the days grow shorter, one question rises to the top: when is it officially okay to start listening to Christmas music?

For some, the holiday season doesn’t truly begin until Santa makes his grand appearance at the end of the Macy’s Thanksgiving Day Parade. And according to the Journal of Consumer Research, people actively revisit experiences—like listening to Christmas songs or watching favorite holiday movies—because they anticipate the same positive emotions they’ve felt before.

So not only does Christmas music fill the air with joy—it’s actually good for us!

With that in mind, we’re thrilled to



continue our beloved tradition of Resurrection Christmas Caroling this year on Sunday, December 14th! We’ll gather in the gym at 12:30pm to enjoy some festive treats before heading out to bring music and merriment to Resurrection members in need of a little Christmas cheer. Revelation 7:17

OPENING

This powerful passage reflects John’s vision of redeemed people coming out of the tribulation into the presence of God the Father and the Lamb. His chosen apostles endured all forms of torture, torment, and opposition as they spread the Good News. Undoubtedly, God’s grace was sufficient to overcome these challenges, and the Lamb shepherded them to everlasting life and provision. Our difficulties in this world are temporary. Our reward in heaven is never-ending.

PRAY

Heavenly Father, we thank you for your grace, which is more than sufficient to endure the trials and tribulations that this world presents. Help us to remain strong in faith, as we realize eternal comfort and living water awaits us. In Jesus’ name we pray, Amen.

DO

Regardless of the imperfections and difficulties of this world, take comfort that they are fleeting. Remember that Christ’s victory over death has redeemed our souls. He is the Good Shepherd who will guide us to the green pastures and still waters of heaven.
